Four questions to answer

The Big Four again? Yes, the Big Four again. A state championship game involving anyone but Cheyenne East, Sheridan, Gillette or Natrona seems unlikely. The same four teams have occupied the 4A semifinals every season since 2010, and although they'll be challenged this year, these four programs aren't going anywhere.

Which one of the Big Four has the best chance of winning it all? Gillette. In a year where Class 4A is somewhat turbulent due to the number of seniors who graduated, the Camels' two returning all-state selections is tied for the most in 4A. Maybe most importantly, Gillette is fired up to avenge last year's title-game loss.

Who has the best chance of ruining 4A's status quo? Rock Springs. The Tigers finished one point away from a trip to the semifinals last year and showed tremendous improvement. If that improvement continues. Rock Springs could be a title contender.

Will a new coach bring success to Cheyenne South? It will be tough. Dan Gallas takes over at South after a successful career in Colorado. The Bison have won three games in five varsity seasons; Gallas' responsibility will be to move from "patience" to "progress."

This rivalry was already intense enough. This time, though, the two teams are staging not only the Energy Bowl, they're also staging the rematch of last year's Class 4A title game. **Cheyenne East**

Four players to watch Lane Tucker, Gillette

The most college-ready player in the state might be the lineman from Gillette. He drew several Division I scholarship offers before committing to North Dakota State. Tucker's responsibilities will be diverse – he was an all-state selection on both the offensive and defensive lines last season.

Matt Fowler, Rock Springs

Fowler ran for 1,293 yards last season, more than any other player in Class 4A. He's the leading returning rusher in the classification by a wide margin. And he's part of an offense that focuses on the run

Madden Pikula, Gillette

Just in case you forgot, the Camels scored more points in a single season last year than any other team in state history. Pikula was a big part of that; he notched 1,014 receiving yards, more than any other player in Wyoming.

Jacob Hallam, Sheridan

Hallam is the only one of Sheridan's seven all-state players from 2015 to return this fall. But he was an all-state selection on both the offensive and defensive line, and his presence in the middle of the action will help anchor the Broncs.

Camels could finish on top

Everything went right for Gillette in 2015. Except the final game.

A loss to Sheridan in the Class 4A championship ended Gillette's attempt at an undefeated season.

Gillette coach Vic Wilkerson said the returning Camels embraced the challenge of trying to improve on that runner-up finish.

"The players have used last year's championship game as motivation to get better in the offseason," Wilkerson said, "and now a new group of players will have to develop their own team identity and write their own story.'

If the 2016 chapter of the story is anything like the 2015 chapter, the offense will be something to behold.

The Camels set a state record last year with 539 points. Gillette led the state regardless of classification in passing with 278.1 yards per game.

Senior all-state selection Madden Pikula, who led all classifications in both catches (60) and receiving yards (1,014), and six other starters return. Critically, Gillete returns four starting offensive linemen in seniors Lane Tucker, Alex Lumbardy, Bryer Sims and Javd Culey.

And Pikula isn't the only pass-catcher coming back. The Camels also return junior Kade Bradley (24 catches, 331 yards) and junior Austin Clemetson (19 catches, 321 vards) in their aerial arsenal.

However, Gillette lost record-setting quarterback Dalton Holst to graduation. The Camels also lost their top six rushers; Pikula, with 70 rushing vards, is actually Gillette's leading returning rusher.

Wilkerson said the offense's development is encouraging but developing a quarterback may take some time; that race is between Pikula, senior Anthony Johnson and junior Keaton Wilkerson.

"We try and take advantage of our talent and tweak our scheme to match our players, so each year is different and unique," coach Wilkerson said. "We will find ways to use the players we have coming back and get the ball in the hands of playmakers.

The defense has bigger question marks. Tucker, Pikula and Long are the only three of Gillette's top 12 tacklers to return.

Tucker, an all-state pick who has several Division I offers entering this season, is Gillette's leading returning tackler; he was third on the team in defensive points and led the Camels with 7.5 sacks.

This year also presents a unique challenge to the Camels' program. Thunder Basin High School is set open in 2017, halving the talent pool of the largest Class 4A school.

Wilkerson said Thunder Basin's opening won't change the goals he and his staff impart to players.

"Each year, we just try and develop a competitive team while at the same time trying to teach young men skills that will carry over into their lives off the field," Wilkerson said. "Thunder Basin opening will not change that goal or philosophy in our program."



Indians have extra motivation

Chevenne Central missed out on the Class 4A playoffs last year by one point. Twice.

In losses to Laramie (35-34 in overtime) and Evanston (17-16), the Indians wasted their post-

season chance. A victory in either game would have earned Central a playoff berth. Instead, Central missed the playoffs for the first time since 2003. Talk about a motivator.

Severn said he noticed players tensing up in those tight-game situations. Therefore, he said this year's primary focus in practice will be situational drills, helping prepare the Indians mentally so "we're comfortable in

those situations and everyone understands what's going on in the game.'

"If we compete, we will win," Severn said, "that's the biggest thing."

This year, that approach will be tested, as Central graduated all six of its all-conference selections.

Offensively, senior Kurt Simmons, who threw for 101 yards in limited time last season, is the heir apparent at quarterback for an offense that finished third in Class 4A in passing yards per game (191.8). Central also lost its top four re-

"We're going to be young up front and the guys we have up there working right now I've got total faith in them," Severn said. "... We've got to establish the run game, and to do that we've got to establish the line of scrimmage." That goes for defense, too, Severn said; Central led Class 4A in pass defense last year (137.3 yards per game) but also gave up 240.1 yards per game on the ground, next-to-last in 4A.

Junior Keaton Bell, who finished third on the team in defensive points, is Central's leading returning defender. Senior Eric Lundgren was fourth; they're the only two of Central's top nine

East returns enough talented players to again be one of 4A's frontrunners. East returns five all-conference players, more than any other 4A program in the state.

The bulk of that experience is on defense. East returns seven starters on defense, and

they know how to get the job done: The Thunderbirds led Class 4A in total defense at 300.1 yards allowed per game last year.

East also led Class 4A in rushing defense (131.8 ypg). "We've got some really

good leaders coming back in a very important facet of the game," Goff said.

Lineman Jacob Ross and defensive back Braden Morris, East's returning all-state players, front a group of returners as deep as any other team in the classification.

Senior lineman Nate Logemann, senior linebacker Rayce Phipps and junior running back Ethan Ashworth all earned first-team all-conference honors a year ago for the Thunderbirds.



Morris led the Thunderbirds in defensive points last season, racking up a team-high 37 solo tackles. Phipps was fifth, Ross sixth, senior Mitchell Bell seventh and senior Seth Green eighth.

Offensively, East has more question marks; the Thunderbirds only return a pair of starters and will have to break in four new starters on the offensive line.

"Offensively, we're obviously very young as far as playing time, and so that's going to be a work in progress," Goff said.

"It's going to take time for that to gel ... and understand how the guy next to you is going to work. Once they start gelling, the work in progress will get better."

Ashworth was sixth in Class 4A last fall in rushing yards per game (78.7), finishing the season with 866 yards on 163 carries. However, he is the only one of East's top four rushers to return.

Junior Noah James, who caught 21 passes for 421 yards, also returns, as does senior Erik Garnica-Cole, who will see time at both running back and linebacker.

While the T-Birds' theme targets refocusing, Goff said he has no doubt his players can do just that. "I think our program has

been heading in the right direction, and I think our kids understand what it takes to be a part of our program," Goff said.



South welcomes new coach

No program in Class 4A faces longer odds this season than Chevenne South.

The program was winless last year, and the returning players will have to learn new schemes and strategies quickly under new head coach in Dan Gallas.

A complete turnaround isn't likely this season, but Gallas said he has hope he can start the program building for the future.

"I just think that if we stick to a consistent message here with the kids and love on them the best they can so they feel like they want to be around this program, I believe our coaches will get them pointed in the right direction," Gallas said. " ... They've struggled in the past a bit and what we're trying to do is establish a positive atmosphere here that they're proud of and want to be a part of."

In five seasons of varsity play, South has won just three games and has never made the playoffs.

But Gallas has the pedigree to build the program.

Gallas compiled a 101-70 record at coaching stops in Colorado, including five seasons as head coach at Smoky Hill High in Aurora and six years at Grand Junction High, and helped Grand Junction to a state runner-up finish in 1994. Now that he has built his

coaching staff at South, his next goal is to begin to learn his team.

"We feel like we're way behind," Gallas said. "Once we get to know (the players), we'll be a lot better off."

Senior linebacker Caleb Price is South's only returning all-state selection. Price led Class 4A in defensive points last season, finishing with a 4A-high 56 solo tackles. He also had team highs with 11 tackles for loss and 47 assisted tackles.

Senior wide receiver Keyshawn Farmer, an all-conference selection last year, is South's leading returning threat on offense. He led the Bison with 593 receiving yards, notching six touchdowns on 29 catches.

He was also third on South's

defense in total points and led the Bison with two interceptions.

Senior Brandon Holbrook finished seventh for the Bison in defensive points and senior D'Andre "Dre" McCray was ninth.

South had an efficient offense – the Bison were third in Class 4A in yards per game. But the defense was leaky. South finished second-to-last in 4A in vards allowed per game (409.2) and dead last in points allowed per game (41.4).

Gallas said he likes to run multiple looks on both offense and defense, and the playbook will be dictated by the capabilities of the players, something he's still learning.

Still, the goals for building the program start with the right attitude.

"More than anything else, I'd like for the kids to be proud of the program," Gallas said.

Evanston finished last – by far - in offensive yards per game (236.9) and points per game (13.4) in Class 4A. Conversely, the Red Devils' defense remained stout, ranking second in 4A in

yards allowed per game (300.8). And that was no accident.

Evanston forged its path by playing close, low-scoring games, and winning those games when given the opportunity. Two of the Red Devils' three victories last season came by the skin of their teeth, as they beat Chevenne South 12-7 in the season opener and Chevenne Central 17-16 in the regular-season finale.

Coach Pat Fackrell said the approach works for the Red Devils, Class 4A's smallest school in terms of enrollment, because of the buy-in from his players.

"I think our kids understand our system, and, really, our system is built around our kids,' Fackrell said. "They know who they are and they know who we are, so they buy into that." The Red Devils' approach is

centered on neutralizing deeper teams by slowing the pace and creating problems for other teams.

"We're not an offense that tries to score early and often and as fast as possible," Fackrell said.

... The goal is to control the ball, control the clock and play great defense

"Hopefully it works out even better for us this year.'

However, the Red Devils have some holes to fill. Evanston graduated all six of its all-conference selections; three of those players were also Class 4A all-state picks. Even so, Fackrell said the Red

Devils will have a strong and deep senior class. "We're going to have some kids that are experienced," he

said. "We have great leadership." Senior Jesse Barker will return under center; he threw for 829

vards and six touchdowns last year. More importantly, he has the confidence of his coach to run the system.

"I think he's got a better understanding of the game and a better understanding of our system," Fackrell said. " ... He's going to get better and better each game."

Senior Malek Wagstaff is Evanston's leading returning receiver and defender. He was fourth on the team in defensive points and led the Red Devils with five pass break-ups and also caught a team-high 33 passes for 253 yards.

However, Evanston lost five of its top six tacklers and nine of its top 12. Senior Kaleb Fackrell was seventh on the team in defensive points, and senior Griffen Mitchell was eighth.

Offensively, junior Brendan Mathson, who ran for 298 yards and three touchdowns, is Evanston's leading returning rusher. Junior Jess Richins also had 193 rushing yards, including 127 in Evanston's playoff-clinching victory against Central in Week 8.

LARAMIE PLAINSMEN

Plainsmen are on the upswing

The Laramie Plainsmen have finished 3-7 for three consecutive vears. However, with a core group of players returning, Plainsmen coach Chuck Syverson has more reason for optimism heading into his fourth season.

"I feel this can be a breakthrough year for us," Syverson said. "We have a passing game that will be very difficult to defend and if we can develop a compatible running game, our offense should be very good. Defensively, if we can bounce back from last year and improve on some key aspects, we should be much improved and

should be much more formidable." Laramie returns three of its four all-conference picks with senior wide receiver Conner Beeston, senior quarterback Taylor Dodd and senior linebacker Carless Looney all coming back.

They're building off a season that saw its momentum crest toward the end of the year. The Plainsmen started 0-4 but beat Cheyenne Central – a team it hadn't beaten since 2001 - 35-34in its fifth game. That victory kick-

started a resurgence. Laramie beat Cheyenne South the next week and walloped Kelly Walsh 48-14 in a must-win playoff qualifying game in the final week.

Even though Laramie lost to Gillette by 40 in the first round of the playoffs, the Plainsmen return enough weapons on both offense and defense to break out of its 3-7 rut this fall. Syverson said the key to doing so rests on two pieces: consistency and depth.

"I feel we are very solid with our No. 1s but when we suffer injuries, our second groups are not at the level they need to be," he said. "We need to continue to develop numbers and improve our offseason lifting adherence for us to crack the next level."

See if this sounds familiar: Senior-laden Natrona County makes a deep run in the playoffs; those seniors graduate, leaving a group of unexperienced underclassmen to fill their void.

It happened in 2015. And it will happen again in 2016. Even though the Mustangs return only a handful of players with any varsity playing time – Natrona lost all 10 of its all-conference selections, all four of its allstate selections – coach Steve Harshman said he feels optimistic his team can still remain competitive with any team on its schedule.

The biggest difference, though, comes in senior class size. Last year's senior class was large; this vear's senior class, by Natrona standards, is small. only 15 players deep.

However, the Mustangs have familiarity on their side. Last year, Natrona lost 13 of 14 all-conference selections. Yet the inexperienced players developed quickly and the Mustangs finished 8-3, reaching the Class 4A semifinals.

Harshman said toughness made the difference. Natrona only out-gained teams by about 3 yards per game. The Mustangs' offense was ninth in the 10-team 4A in yards per game; its defense was third. Consequently, NC won some grind-it-out affairs: 16-0 against Cheyenne Central; 17-6 against Cheyenne East; 12-0 against Evanston; 20-14 against Kelly Walsh; 19-14 against Rock Springs.

"I think the key for us last year winning eight games was that we won five close ball games, several that we trailed in," Harshman said. "I think it was a testament to the toughness of our kids.

Trojans want to take next step

its experienced linemen and an explosive quarterback to improve its fortunes, not only in the first two weeks but also throughout the season.

The Trojans return all four of their starting defensive lineman. including senior all-conference selection Tanner Bloom, and Vance said the team's success might start there. Vance said senior edge rushers Joel Strube and Hunter Wright have good speed, while interior linemen are good with their hands.

"If they can do a good job on the line of scrimmage, that will set a good tone for us," he said.

On defense, the Trojans return five of their top six tacklers. Senior Kenny Manasco was second on the team in defensive points

last season and led the Trojans with 51 solo tackles and two interceptions. He is KW's leading returning tackler. Bloom was third on the team in defensive points and all-conference senior safety Sam Marsh was fourth, while senior Hunter Wright was fifth and senior Ben Gallagher sixth.

Offensively, senior Lamont Frisby returns as KW's quarterback. He threw for 810 vards and five touchdowns last year after sharing time with Jacob Kostal as Frisby fought off injury and played some wide receiver late in the year. Frisby is also KW's leading returning rusher (436 yards, team-high six rushing touchdowns).

Gallagher, who caught 28 passes for 261 yards, is KW's leading returning receiver.

Vance said the experience in the trenches will help set the tone for Frisby and the offense, as Bloom, Strube and senior Kyle Bacon will be called on to keep the heat off their signal-caller.

"If we can get Lamont free, he's definitely got some gamebreaker speed for us," Vance said

Springs' 2015 season. Eight points or fewer decided eight of Rock Springs' 10 games in 2015, and three were decided

by one point. The Tigers went 4-4 in those games, beating Laramie, Kelly

Walsh, Evanston and Cheyenne South (combined record 9-27) by a combined 12 points but falling to Cheyenne East, Sheridan, Natrona and East again (combined record 20-6) by a combined 18 points, including 14-13 to East in the 4A quarterfinals.

The big takeaway: Rock Springs played close games with the best teams in 4A but also played close games with the worst teams in 4A.

Even so, Rock Springs finished with its best record since 2003 and improved significantly from its 1-8 record in 2014.

"We feel like we now need to take that next step and get a little further into the playoffs and go from there," third-year coach David Hastings said. " ... There's

a lot higher expectations because of what we were able to do last vear."

Well, that and the Tigers' significant number of key returners.

Seniors Matt Fowler, Isaac Huffman and Marcus Kalista were all-conference selections last year; Fowler, the Tigers' only returning all-state selection. ran for 1.293 yards and 18 touchdowns while gaining 5.9 yards per attempt.

Broncs have holes to fill

The Sheridan Broncs' situation this fall is not a bad one to have.

Last year's Class 4A champions lost a big group of seniors from that title team that finished 11-1 overall and avenged a loss earlier in the season to Gillette. The Broncs have another talented senior class ready to make their own mark, however.

At a relatively small 4A school like Sheridan, perpetual success is built on perpetual renewal and the Broncs appear to have that pipeline of talent in place. Coach Don Julian has led seven teams to state championships as a head coach, and he said the success of the team that follows a championship team depends heavily on the incoming senior class avoiding an "inferiority complex."

"Sometimes you're able to really get a lot out of that class, (and) sometimes they just struggle with having to lead," Julian said.

Julian said the initial approach of this year's seniors "has been very, very good, that they'd kind of like to make a name for themselves in their own way. I like what I'm seeing so far."

The losses to graduation were significant: Senior lineman Jacob Hallam is the only one of Sheridan's seven all-state and eight all-conference players to return this season.

Senior Coy Steel injured his ACL midway through last season but still managed 333 receiving yards and six touchdowns. He'll be the Broncs' leading returning receiver.

Junior Kyle Custis ran for 341 yards and is by far the Broncs' leading returning rusher. He is the only Bronc player returning this fall who had more than four carries last season.

Only two of Sheridan's top 10 tacklers return. Hallam was fifth on the team in defensive points, and senior Hayden Hastings was eighth.

However, Sheridan benefits in other ways from its usual deep playoff runs by gaining additional weeks of practice late in the year other teams don't.

"I think the fact that we've been able to play late in the year adds to the experience level of next year's team," Julian said.

Additionally, Julian said Sheridan is constantly trying to put younger players in varsity situations to build depth – a strategy implemented to offset Sheridan's lack of pure numbers of players. With that in mind, Julian said this year's seniors and juniors will have more experience than it appears.

Seniors like Drew Boedecker, Jacek Aksamit, Zach Gale, Derek Vela and Andrew Boint and juniors like Aaron Sessons and Connor Jorgenson should be ready to step in on Friday nights.

However, Julian and his staff constantly remind players that the journey is more important than the destination. Sheridan works on renewal 365 days a year with his players, not just on game days.

"We are continually talking about process with our kids," Julian said. "It's not about this Friday night. It's about a process instead of results."

"There's different ways to measure success, but unfortunately in our society it's always kind of measured on your wins and losses." Rhoades said. "... Every game, we learned something. Finishing up the way we

DOUGLAS BEARCATS

Rhoades said Douglas' two games against the eventual state champions epitomized the season. In the first, the Braves blew away the Bearcats 66-21. In the second, the Bearcats played tough, trailing only 21-13 after three quarters before eventually losing 35-13.

"The strides we made from the first game versus Star Valley to the second game were huge,' Rhoades said. "At the end of the season, I felt really good about where we were at.

And almost everyone is back. Led by a senior class that could be as deep as 20 players, Douglas returns 10 offensive starters and nine defensive starters, including all three of its all-state selections in seniors Zach Hoopman. Eric Jamerman and Gage Pitt.

Senior Trey Young, Rawlins' only allstate selection last year, will likely move from receiver to quarterback this year. A player Wheeler called "the most coachable kid I've ever coached," Young brings a run-pass versatility to the position that might inspire some scheme changes on offense.

Sophomore Damon Taylor, who led



the Outlaws with 582 rushing vards and also had 18 catches for 226 vards, returns to anchor Rawlins' backfield, while senior Colton Garlington, who led Rawlins with 49 catches for 640 yards, will lead the way for the receiving corps.

On defense, Rawlins returns exactly half of its top 10 tacklers. Senior J.D. Smith, an all-conference selection, was Rawlins' top tackler a year ago and returns to anchor the defensive line. Young was second, while Taylor, Garlington, senior linebacker Jeremiah Nicholson and junior linebacker Tristan Mikesell also will be key on defense.

Now that Rawlins' players have begun to understand how to buy into the program's development, Wheeler's optimism is high.

"I do believe with the commitment our kids have shown this spring and summer we will put our best product since I've taken over on the field this fall." Wheeler said.

Ouestionable defense.

"When we look back on what we've done since I've been here, every year we've improved offensively," said coach Pat Patterson, who's entering his fourth year with the Wolverines this fall. " ... We just haven't been that stout on defense, so this year we've put a lot of emphasis on improving on defense."

The stats illustrate that gap between what the Wolverines accomplish on both sides of the ball.

Riverton's offense (410.4 yards per game) was one of the best in Class 3A; its defense (379.2 yards allowed per game) was second-worst in the classification

Also, Reinig was injured during the wrestling season and sat out most of the spring and summer, although Patterson said he expects Reinig to be at full strength in time for the season.

Offensively, the Wolverines return a bevy of weapons for its passing attack but will need to replace a 1,000-yard rusher in Steven Reinig and a nearly 2,000-yard passer in Brayden Draper.

However, Teron Doebele, Riverton's lone returning allstate selection, returns to lead what might be the best receiving corps in Class 3A.

Doebele, senior Brady Fullerton, senior Kyren Higgs

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and senior Kylan Shultz were Riverton's top four receivers last year; Doebele's 40 catches, 821 vards and five touchdowns were team highs.

Less than a month after being left for dead at 2-4, the Wolves were in the 3A championship game.

"Our seniors had endured two difficult seasons and were determined to finish well," Maggi said. "That is what we did by continuing to work hard and believing in ourselves when nobody else did."

No one will make the same mistake of leaving the Wolves for dead this year.

With eight offensive and six defensive starters returning including four players who were all-conference selections last year, tied with Star Valley for the most in the 3A West – Green River is one of the most dangerous teams in 3A this fall. "I do think that we have car-

ried some momentum from last

Spartz, meanwhile, helps anchor both the offensive and defensive lines.

Junior Chance Hofer and senior Drew Wilson were both all-conference picks.

Wilson, who ran for 445 yards, is Green River's leading returning rusher; Hofer had 209 receiving yards and Wilson had 100

Junior Candon Croft is Green River's leading returning receiver with 303 vards. He added 420 rushing yards.





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Broncs will be experienced Cody had the most decep-

tive finish in Class 3A last year. The defending Class 3A champions started their season 3-0 but crashed hard in West Conference play, losing all five conference games to finish out of playoff consideration.

Yet the crash wasn't as bad as it looked. Cody actually outgained its opponents by about 37 yards per game and its defense ranked second in 3A in yards allowed per game (226.9).

In the process, a bunch of young players earned valuable experience after being forced into action by injuries higher on the depth chart.

"With sophomores comes a steep learning curve," coach Matt McFadden said. "We were in many games and played with tremendous effort but were not as strong mentally or physically as we needed to be.'

Now, those sophomores are experience-rich juniors, and

Where other programs might see that as a crisis, coach James Howell and the Broncs see a chance for redefinition.

And competition for those 11 spots on the field may bring out the best in the Broncs this fall.

"We have a lot of hard work ahead of us and have many players that are hungry to get varsity time," Howell said. "The young crew of players we have coming up are extremely excited to get their shot at playing varsity football."

Last year's Class 3A West Conference champions graduated 17 seniors and return just three starters on offense. On defense, the Broncs return four starters from a unit that led Class 3A in total defense last year, allowing just 211.9 yards per game.

The Broncs had six all-state players last year, but five were seniors, including Gatorade Player of the Year Theo Dawson, who took his 2,283 rushing yards and 27 touchdowns to the University of Wyoming. The only all-state player who was set to return, junior Josh Dawson, won't be with the program this year, Howell said.

Jackson loses its top seven tacklers, its top four rushers and three of its top four receivers from last year.

However, Howell has confidence in his younger squad this year.

"We do have many young players in our program with tremendous potential," he said. "We are excited to see what many of them can do as

they compete for starting roles."

Senior Erich Elzemeyer and junior Ronnie Kaye, all-conference selections last year, are both back. Elzemever threw for 923 yards and 11 touchdowns; Kave, with 156 receiving yards and two TDs, is Jackson's leading returning receiver.

Senior linebacker Brayden Gaston will be Jackson's leading returning tackler; he was eighth on the team in defensive points last year. He also returns as a starter on offense, splitting time between center and fullback.

Senior lineman Vinny Caffaro will help anchor both the offensive and defensive lines, as will junior Said Jiminez.

Senior Alex Martinez, junior Adam Meadows and sophomore Spencer Berzey will be key on both sides of the ball, while senior kicker Lucas Shelton will give the Broncs a consistent special teams threat.

And Jackson is motivated to redefine itself after falling short in the semifinals last year, losing to Green River. The Broncs beat the Wolves 26-15 in the regular season, only to lose at home 24-15 in the playoffs.

"We were highly disappointed that we did not make the title game last year, Howell said. "Considering we beat the state champion (Star Valley), it was very frustrating."

But 2016 brings opportunity - disguised as inexperience.



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Panthers aren't one-man show

Powell's biggest asset this season will also be its biggest challenge.

Senior T.J. Abraham led the Panthers in rushing, tackling, punt and kick returns and scoring. He was an all-state selection and one of just six juniors named to the Casper Star-Tribune's Super 25 first team.

Now, the challenge for coach Chanler Buck and the rest of the Panthers is to find ways to stop teams from keying on Abraham - and to find ways to take pressure off their top players.

"We're not asking him to do it all, and we won't," Buck said. "That's something that we're very much aware of, and we're planning for it."

Abraham will be the focus, and Buck said Abraham has embraced the idea of spreading the responsibility. Buck said he hopes the approach will both allow Abraham to play to his potential while allowing the rest of the team to have confidence in each other.

That means finding ways to diversify on offense to mix pass and run plays. What form that takes – either play-action throws or more read option plays - remains to be seen.

both (passing and running)," Buck said. "We've got to be pretty dynamic on that side of the ball to be competitive."

Powell returns every player who rushed for at least 10 yards last year; Abraham ran for 987 vards and had a team-high 14 TDs, while senior Mason Olsen, who ran for 454 yards and threw for 531 last year, returns under center. Senior Page Gann, who was Powell's leading receiver with 13 catches for 165 yards, also returns.

Buck said the depth in the backfield might allow him to move some running backs to tight end positions to give the offense more flexibility.

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Buck said.

Defensively, Abraham, senior Zach Easum and junior Max Gallagher were Powell's top three tacklers last year, and they're all back. Abraham led Powell with 33 solo tackles, 48 assists, four pass break-ups and three blocked kicks, while Easum, an all-conference choice, added team highs with six sacks, five tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries.

With those players returning, "vou get that leadership and also that confidence on that side of the ball," Buck said.

Olsen and senior Brekyn Herd were also among the Panthers' top tacklers last year.

However, Buck said the Panthers' depth and experience on both the offensive and defensive lines, where Powell returns just two starters, will be a weakness - but not for long.

"They're bright football players and they'll be great leaders." Buck said.

One statistic defined both success and struggle for Big Horn in 2015. The Rams had a plus-18 turnover ratio, the best in Class 2A. However, in the biggest game of the season, Big Horn's turnover advantage disappeared, and the Rams' season ended early. The 27-25 quarterfinal loss to Greybull was the only time all season Big Horn had more turnovers than it forced. Forcing turnovers while pro-

The Rams return a pair of allstate selections in seniors Nolan McCafferty and Colton Williams. They also bring back five of their eight all-conference selections, as seniors Andrew Ratty, Tanner Warder and Colton Bates were allconference picks in 2015. They are part of a group of seven seniors.

McCafferty is Class 2A's leading returning tackler; he averaged more than 20 defensive points per game last year.

Williams finished in the top 10 in Class 2A for both rushing and receiving vards; he ran for 1,069 yards and 16 touchdowns and also had 318 yards receiving. He led

Burns' good news: The Broncs return nine starters on both offense and defense.

Burns' bad news: The Broncs didn't win a game last year.

The team's fortunes in 2016 will rest on an experienced group of players: however, those players haven't had much success in the win-loss column.

Part of the problem is depth: The Broncs didn't graduate many seniors in part because they didn't have many players, period.

Coach Mary Mirich said Burns started four freshmen in varsity games last year, and this year's team, for better or worse, shapes up similarly.

"Depth is always something we're going to fight here," Mirich said. "A good year here is going to be 35 (players). We're never going to get more than that."

This year's team, though, could be a peek at what's to come.

Mirich said he might have as many as 18 freshmen out this year, coming up from a junior high team that went undefeated last year.

Even so, this team will in big part belong to senior Klayton

Člark led Burns in rushing (588 vards, 6 touchdowns), passing (380 yards) and defensive points in 2015. His 51 solo tackles were a team-high, as were his two interceptions.

Mirich said Clark has played at both quarterback and wide receiver, giving him a unique perspective under center.

"He's got a pretty good grasp of what's going on," Mirich said. He's going to have to know what's going on at the line of scrimmage."

Senior linebacker Roman Delgado was Burns' No. 2 tackler, but Burns lost its next three top tacklers to graduation.

Seniors Sam Sharpe and Isaac Ronning were also important cogs in the defense last year. However,

the Broncs' defense finished last in Class 2A in yards allowed per game, giving up 415.3 – almost 43 yards per game more than any other 2A teams.

Offensively, Clark will lead the show, but sophomore Alex Pyle will help. He was Burns' top receiver last year with 10 catches for 125 yards, finished third on the team with 239 rushing yards and was 11th in defensive points.

For what it's worth, Mirich said Burns' offseason has gone well.

"They seem plenty motivated," he said.

In part, that's because Burns' players know they are not far off from being a contender.

Mirich said two games in particular last year showed just how close Burns is to playing with the top 2A teams in the state -a 28-14 loss to playoff qualifier Mountain View in which Burns played well and a 20-16 loss to playoff qualifier Thermopolis in which Burns had opportunities but couldn't quite capitalize.

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GLENROCK HERDERS

Herders back to their winning ways

Glenrock spent the 2015 season focusing on restoring its identity and legacy. Consider both goals met.

The Class 2A runners-up last year, the Herders refocused their offense on executing their traditional double wing to perfection – re-establishing their hard-nosed identity in the progress.

At the same time, Glenrock proved itself to be one of 2A's top teams, a legacy it established in six title-game appearances between 2002 and 2009 but had fallen off recently, failing to reach the playoffs in 2013 and 2014.

"I think we really challenged the senior class last year to make us relevant again." longtime Glenrock coach Ray Kumpula said. "We had gone a couple years without the playoffs and we were nowhere where we needed to be in the upper echelon of our league."

Those seniors answered the challenge. They left behind an established set of traditions from which future teams will build.

"We kind of got away from what we had done with the double wing," Kumpula said, "and I think we just got back to that, and I think that legacy will help us going forward. We know who we are. We know what we do."

Glenrock led 2A in rushing (296 yards per game) and finished last in passing (20 ypg) last season, a combination that works on a team built on establishing control of the line of scrimmage. The Herders executed a similar run of success

on the defensive side of the bal. The Herders finished second in Class 2A in both vards allowed (170.8) and points allowed (8.1) per game; they were second only to 2A champion Wheatland in both categories.

2A EAST

The Herders return three all-state players – the highest total in Class 2A – in seniors Logan Downs, Cooper Fargen and Garrett Schwindt.

In addition, all-conference picks Blake Hall and Kia Sexson also return.

Schwindt led Glenrock with 1,341 rushing vards and 14 touchdowns and also led the Herders in defensive points. He had a team-high 8.5 tackles for loss and also blocked two kicks.

Fargen was Glenrock's leading receiver with six catches for 101 yards, an expected limited role in Glenrock's run-oriented offense, and finished third on the team in defensive points.

The Herders did graduate three of their five top tacklers, including both linebackers, but still return a solid core of defenders. Downs was sixth on the team in defensive points, Hall seventh and Sexson eighth.

Offensively, Glenrock returns four of its five offensive linemen, "so that is going to be helpful in the double wing," Kumpula said.

The Herders should also be deeper: Glenrock lost six seniors to graduation but will likely have 12 players in both their senior and junior classes. "It'll be a learning process for us more than a

physical process for us," Kumpula said.

Wolves stepping up to 2A ranks

Perhaps no football program in the state has a bigger adjustment to make this season than Moorcroft.

2A EAST

Moorcroft is the only program in the state moving up a classification this year.

The move from Class 1A 11-man to Class 2A will be tough on the Wolves, who finished 1-7 last year.

For now, all Moorcroft's players and coaches can do is keep working, and that's the approach coach Dusty Petz is taking with his players.

"We're keeping kids in the weight room and keeping our nose to the grindstone," he said. " ... It's definitely going to be an adjustment to 2A, with the different types of competition we're going to see night in and night out."

The Wolves' lone victory last year came over

a struggling Wyoming Indian squad in Week 1. Moorcroft had its chances but couldn't keep pace in close losses to Tongue River (26-16), Lusk (20-17), Southeast (22-14), the Gillette JV

(21-14 in overtime) and Pine Bluffs (36-21). Now, the Wolves will need to find their way in 2A after losing their quarterback, top three rushers, top three receivers and four of their top six tacklers to graduation.

Senior Chace Peterson, who had 314 passing yards, 69 receiving yards and 68 rushing yards last year, is Moorcroft's leading returner in all three categories; this year, his efforts will be concentrated at quarterback, Petz said.

However, the Wolves' line is experienced, with junior center Tucker Allison leading a group that's as good as Moorcroft has had in several vears.

"For so long, our line has been young," Petz said. "We've played a lot of freshmen and sophomores the past couple years, and now they're iuniors and seniors.

"Going into what we are up in the 2A level, we're going to need to have some experience on the line and size as well in order to compete with those (schools)."

Senior Brett Wassberg was fifth on the team in defensive points last year, while classmate Trev Fischbach was seventh.

Defending champs have new look

About the only similarity between last year's Wheatland team and this year's will be the colors.

The defending Class 2A champions lost a massive senior class as well as their head coach. That combination of turnover means the Bulldogs will gain a new identity this fall.

Of course, that doesn't mean there won't be carryover from last year's title, the first state football championship for Wheatland since 1984.

"State titles are hard to come by," incoming head coach Tom Waring said. "I think this one will give the program a bit of a bump. The key is to continue the success of the past teams and build a program that will continually be in the playoffs."

The Bulldogs weren't just good last year - they were dominant. The Bulldogs led Class 2A in both yards per game (364.7) and vards allowed per game (100.6), as well as points per game (43.5) and points allowed per game (5.1). Defensively, the Bulldogs led Class 2A in both rushing defense and passing defense.

To be in the title hunt again in 2016, the Bulldogs will need to rely on a senior class that has

experience but not necessarily extended responsibility; only four starters return.

Six of Wheatland's eight allstate selections have graduated; seniors Josh Madsen and Jacob "Bubba" Ward are the lone returners from that group.

But they're a pretty potent duo.

Ward, who ran for 915 vards and 12 touchdowns, was Wheatland's leading rusher last year. Meanwhile, Madsen had 37 catches and 634 receiving yards, the highest totals in 2A last year.

After Ward, the Bulldogs' next five top rushers graduated; after Madsen, the only other player returning who caught a pass at the varsity level last year is Ward.

Defensively, senior Poston Anderson is the only one of Wheatland's top eight tacklers to return; he finished sixth for the Bulldogs in defensive points a year ago.

Even so, numerous players are lined up to assume key roles on both sides of the ball.

Seniors Cody Cagle, Wes Taylor and Nick Trujillo will be critical on both the offensive and defensive lines, and senior Hayden Madsen will be a threat at wideout and will help Madsen lock down the Bulldogs' pass defense.

"I think the guys who will be stepping into starting roles are excited for the opportunity to show what they can do," Waring said.

Waring, who is the principal at Chugwater and was previously the head coach in both Rawlins and Hanna, said Wheatland has good speed on both sides of the ball. Most of the players had varsity experience last year, although some of it came late in blowout victories. That's a trend the Bulldogs

wouldn't mind continuing this year.

Of course, Big Piney will still rely on seniors. Senior lineman Adam Raza is the only one of Big Piney's five all-conference selections to return this fall, while classmate Beau Hansen will join Raza in leading Big Piney up front.

However, most of their experience is on offense; the Punchers graduated all of their defensive front seven.

"That's going to be a challenge to overcome," Makelky said.

Two of the four players from Big Piney's rush-by-committee approach, where four players carried the ball between 64 and 79 times but no other players carried the ball more than twice all season, return for 2016.

Hunt led the team in rushing (370 yards); Pape added 247 rushing yards and threw for 289 more.

However, Barney, who threw for 193 yards in spot duty, will also compete for the starting quarterback spot.

"Two returning starters at quarterback, that's a good problem to have," Makelky said.

Pape, who was fourth on the team in defensive points and had a team-high three interceptions, is Big Piney's leading returning defensive player. Only three of the Punchers' top 10 tacklers come back this fall; Willoughby was sixth for the Punchers in defensive points and Aguirre was eighth.

"They know they've got work to do because we graduated 10 great seniors and someone's going to have to step up and fill those roles," Makelky said.

As far as expectations? Well. for a team that has gone five straight years without a playoff berth and has finished five straight years below the .500 mark, they're appropriately low. Prior to this stretch, Big Piney had not had five straight losing seasons in more than 60 years. Makelky has challenged his team to break that streak.

"Why not us?" Makelky said. "Why not the guys in the room now? Because somebody's got to do it."

Four players to watch

Brennan Kutterer, Tongue River

There wasn't a player in the state who averaged more defensive points per game last season than Kutterer, who led 11man football regardless of classification with 282 defensive points (25.6 per game) and 76 solo tackles.

J.J. Pingetzer, Shoshoni

The player closest to Kutterer's heels in defensive points last season was Pingetzer. The Wrangler senior was the centerpiece of Class 1A 11-man's best defenses last season, winning West Conference defensive player of the year while notching nearly 12 tackles per game.

Ruger Lewis, Pine Bluffs

The senior led Class 1A 11-man with 168.4 rushing yards per game, the best of all returning players statewide, and finished the year with 1,179 yards. On an improving Pine Bluffs team, Lewis might be primed for an even better season.

Dawson Butts, Upton-Sundance

As a sophomore, Butts was a huge part of the Patriots' title run, leading the team in rushing yards (1,202), receiving yards (181) and interceptions (four). Now that opponents know what he is capable of doing, he may be keyed on more this season.

Upton-Sundance favored for another championship

Four questions to answer

Can Upton-Sundance repeat? Not only can the Patriots repeat – they will be the favorites to do so. Of the Patriots' six all-state selections last year, four were underclassmen. The Patriots will be the odds-on favorites to win Class 1A 11-man.

Is anyone else even in the discussion? Yes, but not really. Shoshoni could be Upton-Sundance's biggest challenge to a title defense. Sure, you can throw in Tongue River, Cokeville, Rocky Mountain and Southeast into the conversation... but for now, these teams have more to prove than Upton-Sundance.

How much did reclassification affect 1A 11-man? In some ways, a bunch; in others, hardly at all. Riverside, Burlington and Lingle made the move to six-man, while Wright and Moorcroft flip-flopped spots between 2A and 1A 11-man, but the biggest ripples from those changes will be felt in the nonconference schedule.

Is the East Conference still ahead of the West Conference? Yes. Although it's unlikely the East will sweep the West in the first round of the playoffs as it did a year ago, the East Conference league schedule is definitely more challenging – and probably will prepare those teams better for the postseason.

Four key games

Shoshoni at Southeast, Sept. 9. These teams both have lofty goals this fall. Throw in the revenge angle – Shoshoni's loss to Southeast in last year's quarterfinals ended an undefeated season – and the game takes on a significance in early September.

Pine Bluffs at Upton-Sundance, Sept. 23. The Hornets' 3-4 finish in 2015 was a huge step forward. Their growth will be tested, though, in their first conference game, which just happens to come on the home field of the defending state champions.

Shoshoni at Cokeville, Oct. 21. For now, the Wranglers are the favorites in the West Conference; the Panthers aren't. How that role reversal changes this Week 8 matchup will be intriguing to see.

Tongue River at Upton-Sundance, Oct. 21. The rematch of last year's 1A 11-man title game doesn't happen until the final week of the regular season. But that will only add to the suspense.

Tigers looking for strong finish

Lusk's season began so well. The Tigers started the season 3-1 and notched a huge victory in Week 4 when they beat eventual state runner-up Tongue River 28-21.

Then their season fell apart. Lusk lost its final three games by massive margins: 32-0 to Pine Bluffs, 53-16 to Lingle and 51-18 to Southeast.

Just like that, the Tigers' season was finished at 3-4 – the program's first losing season in more than a decade of high school football.

"Our youth and inexperience really began to show along with a few injuries that took what little depth we had," coach Ryan Nelson said. "Last year we largely only had two guys that had ever played significant varsity ball.

"For the most part, the kids never quit and kept on fighting 'til the game was over. Several of the younger guys became better leaders, which should be a real asset moving towards next season."

The Tigers return seven starters on offense and eight on defense – and Nelson, entering his second year as head coach, said he has already seen more commitment to improving on last year's record than he did in his first season.



He said he consistently had 15 to 20 players in the weight room for early summer workouts.

"We'll probably have around 25 (players) out, so we're off to a much better start than last summer," he said.

Offensively, the Tigers graduated their top rusher, passer and receiver but return four starters on the offensive line and three running backs with significant experience.

Lusk's running-back-bycommittee approach netted five running backs with triple-digit yardage for the season but none with more than 385.

Senior Jacob Haney, who ran for 363 yards, leads the returners in the backfield; senior Riley Ross added 245 yards last year and junior Kyle Anderson had 119.

Nelson said that returning experience in the backfield coupled with an experienced line fronted by senior Monte Wade – Lusk's only returning all-confer-

ence player – and juniors Jake Heil, Garrett Wurdeman and Cole Mellot will give the Tigers some expanded offensive options.

"It should allow us to add some new wrinkles to the playbook," Nelson said. "I've challenged them over the summer to make sure they have the offense down well so when preseason hits we can work on building more in to it. The biggest challenge will be whether our quarterback is ready to step in and play."

Defensively, the Tigers lose three of their top six tacklers but return most of their other defensive stalwarts.

Wade was second on the team in defensive points last year while Mellot was third and Wurdeman fifth.

Even with those eight returning starters, Nelson said Lusk still needs to develop depth to compete.

The Tigers learned that lesson too late in 2015.

In March, Pine Bluffs won the Class 2A boys basketball championship.

In May, Pine Bluffs won the 2A boys track and field championship. In November, Pine Bluffs hopes to be in position for a football title, too.

That might be a tall order for a program that went winless just two seasons ago and finished with a losing record while missing the Class 1A 11-man playoffs last year.

However, success in the school's other sports has definitely raised expectations on the gridiron.

"Thankfully for us it's the same kids having all of the success," coach Will Gray said. "It might be different kids leading the way in the different activities, but they all play a role, and they all have a common purpose. This is a great group of kids to be around – they are hungry for more success and they are willing to put the time in to earn it." Expectations are high for Pine Bluffs this fall not only for what's gone on off the field but for who comes back on the field.

"It's going to come down to three things," Gray said, "how well we can run the ball, can we avoid giving up the big play on defense, and can we continue to improve our physicality in the trenches."

Senior Ruger Lewis and junior Haize Fornstrom were allstate picks last year, and they lead a team that returns five of its top six tacklers on defense and returns eight starters on an offense that produced Class 1A 11man's top offense last year.

Lewis led the Hornets with 1,179 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns; Lewis' 168.4 yardsper-game average was the best in the classification.

Fornstrom added 736 passing vards; junior receiver Ishmael Depaulitte led the Hornets with 13 catches for 308 vards. Pine Bluffs' 370.1 vards per game led Class 1A 11-man.

Senior Kyle Steger was sec-

ond on the team in defensive points and is Pine Bluffs' leading returning tackler on a unit that has seven returning starters.

Lewis was third, senior Alex Graves was fourth, junior Wyatt Fornstrom was fifth and sophomore Hunter Jeffres was sixth.

Lewis led Pine Bluffs with six tackles for loss; Haize Fornstrom led Pine Bluffs with two interceptions.

Senior lineman Tristan Lind. senior wideout/defensive back Cade Kissinger, senior wideout/defensive end Hunter Thompson - a Division I basketball commit - and junior lineman John Merryfield will also be critical to Pine Bluffs' success. Gray said their versatility gives him options.

"We don't have to label kids at certain positions or skill types," Gray said. "They are all very versatile, which allows us to do different things, but also allows us to play a base defense and not have to change from

The difference between having talent and capitalizing on talent is small.

For much of the 2015 season, Southeast had talent but didn't capitalize on it.

Scott said the trip to the championship game was validation for the communities and for the players who stuck with the program after 2011.

"It was all those things that I envisioned in coming back to a town that had lost football." he said. " ... It was really an overwhelming experience just to se the uplift that it did for the school and community."

Still, the Eagles lost the title game to conference rival Upton-Sundance, 33-14. Even though the trip to Laramie was both validating and uplifting for a program that had seen so much struggling, the fact that Tongue River lost the title game is never far from Scott's mind.

"We're not resting on our laurels, and there's something just a little better to shoot for," he said.

Panthers drop down a division

There's never been a better time to be a Patriot. The Upton-Sundance co-op football team is coming off its first state championship, and with eight starters returning on both sides of the ball, the Patriots have the goods to repeat.

The Patriots return four all-state selections from last year in seniors Thomas Davis, John Sullivan and Hunter Woodard and junior Dawson Butts – double the number of any other program in Class 1A 11-man.

Senior Donovan Gray was also an all-conference selection. In all, the Patriots return five allconference picks, the most in the East Conference. In short, the Patriots' first title may not be their last.

Coach Andy Garland said the championship was "special for us with the co-op. It has been a four-year thing. We'd been increasingly getting a little better each year and this year was the first year where the kids have been together for all four vears."

Garland added the title was a tribute to those people in both communities who traveled the 30 miles between Upton and Sundance "and all the sacrifices they put in to make our co-op work." The program's combined success starts with the players, though.

Offensively, Butts, Woodward, Davis and senior Cort Ingalls were all critical pieces in Upton-Sundance's backfield last year, although Butts' 1,202 yards drew the majority of attention.

Woodard was the Patriots' No. 2 rusher last year, going for 625 yards; both Butts and Woodard had 17 rushing touchdowns apiece.

Davis added 400 yards rushing and Ingalls 217 Butts was also U-S's leading receiver last year with 13 catches for 181 yards; Ingalls added 152





receiving vards on 10 catches.

The Patriots also return sophomore quarterback Clayton Louderback, who split time with Woodard under center last year.

Meanwhile, Upton-Sundance's defense was tops in Class 1A 11-man last year in yards allowed per game (143.7) and points allowed per game (6.5).

The Patriots do lose three of their top five tacklers but return Sullivan, who tied for the team lead with 50 assisted tackles and was No. 2 on the team in defensive points, and Davis, who was third and had team-highs with 14 tackles for loss and four sacks.

Gray, Butts, Woodard, senior Yuli Viergets and junior Payton Watt were all among the Patriots' top 11 tacklers last year; Butts had a team-high four interceptions.

Now, Garland said, the Patriots have to make sure they put in the requisite amount of work to repeat the title run they had last year.

"We've already been talking about that in the weight room," Garland said. "... We know there's going to kind of be a bull's eye on our back. We're not going to get ahead of ourselves.'







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Wright will start the 2016 season riding momentum from a pair of changes – one brought on by the team itself, the other brought on by outside forces.

The first change: Wright enters the season coming off a victory. More specifically, the Panthers

entered the offseason off their first victory in two seasons.

A 22-19 victory over winless Burns in the season finale – a victory that broke a 15-game losing streak – had deep reverberations, coach Larry Yeradi said.

"The final win over Burns has shown to provide a boost of confidence and has seemed to bring football back to the forefront. Yeradi said. "We had a record number of kids attend summer camps and have a wonderful number bettering themselves in the summer workouts. Hopefully, this will spill over into the fall."

The second change: the schedule. The Panthers will move from Class 2A to Class 1A 11-man this fall. Changing the competition level may pay off for Wright, which missed the playoffs the past

"I'm not sure how it will really affect our program other than now we will compete against schools in football that we compete against in almost all of the other sports we offer," Yeradi said. "Our football team will still strive to be well prepared, play with enthusiasm and desire, and compete to the best of our ability.'

Still, the two momentumbuilders come at a good time for a struggling program.

Wright's offense finished last in Class 2A last year in yards per game (140.4). The defense was second-to-last in vards allowed per game (372.4) and allowed 44.9 points per game, the highest

Cokeville was the master of its own undoing last year.

Despite finishing with a winning record and qualifying for the playoffs, the Panthers failed to win at least one playoff game for the first time since 1992. They lost a game by shutout for the first time since 1997 and failed to win a conference championship for the first time since 2008.

Coach Todd Dayton said the problem was simple to identify. "Last year, we'd self-destruct

about two or three or four times a ballgame," Dayton said. "and hopefully we don't do that this year."

The statistics bear out that insight: The Panthers finished minus-14 in turnover ratio, worst in Class 1A 11-man.

"We worked as hard as any team we've had," Dayton said. "We just made mistakes. We'd shoot ourselves in the foot. Right now I think we've got the confidence that we can go out there and not hurt (ourselves)." Cokeville returns eight

starters. However, the Panthers once again are thin in the senior

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mark in the 32-year history of the program.

The Panthers never managed to stay any closer than 24 points in its seven losses. But the two big changes, combined with Wright's returning players, make those struggles look like afterthoughts.

The Panthers return 10 of their top 12 tacklers, including seniors Kane Leithead and Ryan Speidel - both all-conference selections last year. Speidel, who was second on the team in defensive points in 2015, is the Panthers' leading returning tackler.

Offensively, the Panthers return eight starters.

Junior quarterback Shayne Belt returns after throwing for 605 yards in 2015.

Leithead had 150 receiving yards on a team-best 16 catches, while Speidel had 138 rushing yards and 136 receiving yards and is the Panthers' leading returning rusher.

"With a large number of returners, we should be able to start off jogging day one instead of a slow walk," Yeradi said.

Nate was fourth in Class 1A 11-man with 131.8 rushing yards per game; he finished with 1,186 yards.

Sophomore Bentley Johnson added 533 rushing yards and 222 passing yards last year.

Defensively, the Panthers lose

three of their top five tacklers to graduation.

Junior Antheny Petersen was second on the team in defensive points and is the team's top returning tackler. King was fourth.

Juniors Sterling Murdock, Tristan Nate, Rick Nate and Hunter Cheney also figure to be prominent pieces of Cokeville's defense.

"We're not as big and as strong as a lot of teams we're going to play," Dayton said. "We're going to have to be fundamentally better than them."

Execution has long been Cokeville's calling card. As consistently the smallest school in Class 1A 11-man. the Panthers have long relied on execution to beat bigger and deeper teams.

Time to work on those fundamentals may help bring Cokeville back to the heights it's enjoyed.

"We've got a year of experience under our belt," Dayton said. "We were all new last year and they're all coming back (this year), so I think that year of experience is going to help us.'

New Grizz coach has pedigree The new era of Rocky Mountain football will take its cues from another successful program right down Highway 14.

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The Grizzlies enter 2016 with a new coach, Richard Despain, who was an assistant coach at nearby Powell during the Panthers' championships in 2006, 2011, 2012 and 2013.

The Powell influence will be felt throughout the Rocky program, from offensive and defensive philosophy to offseason approaches.

"If we can learn to trust our reads, our game plan and our teammates to do their jobs, I believe we can find success." Despain said. "With new systems, we have a lot to learn, and I am looking forward to that with this group this year."

It helps that Despain already knows most of Rocky Mountain's players from his time as a volunteer assistant two years ago.

"That will be nice," he said. Despain already knows about the Grizzlies' potential. Rocky returns four of its five all-conference selections from last year: seniors Gehrig Sweat, Brian Crawford and Garrett Vezain and junior Tristan

Panthers start with momentum

Six teams in Wyoming enter the 2016 season with at least three straight victories.

Five of those six won state championships last year. The sixth is Saratoga.

The Panthers started 0-5 last year but won their final three games, including one by forfeit, to close out the season. Although the victories didn't earn Saratoga a playoff berth, they did give the Panthers a nice confidence boost.

The offseason did bring change, as Kegan Willford took over as the head coach, but Willford said the momentum is noticeable.

"We're going have new systems, new philosophies this year, but hopefully with that experience we'll get some leaders," he said.

The Panthers' optimism isn't wide-eyed naiveté, though. Before winning three in a row, the Panthers had some clear struggles: In their first four conference games, Saratoga lost by scores of 55-0, 55-0, 57-0 and 56-0.

Willford's addition to the program is a call back to earlier Saratoga football. Willford's father Burt coached the program from 1992-2002, and Kegan Willford played in the Saratoga program in the early 2000s.

Willford teaches in Encampment and has been the Tigers' track coach for the past six years, but he said taking over as Saratoga's football coach was something he always wanted to do

"After I was able to come back here and get a teaching job, that was definitely a motivation of mine and something I wanted to be involved with someday," he said. " ... I have a lot of pride with this program still, and my goal is to bring it back and be competitive again."

The Encampment connection has already drawn dividends for the Saratoga football program. The Saratoga-Encampment football co-op hasn't been fruitful lately – only one Encampment player joined the team last year, and none participated two years ago – but Willford said between





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seven and 10 Encampment players will join Saratoga's team this fall.

They're joining a team that's already deep. The Panthers lost just three seniors from last year's team; however, among the three seniors Saratoga lost were its quarterback, its top rusher and its top two tacklers.

Seniors Alex Ziegler, Max Schneider, Jerriah Gonzales, Matt Lincoln and Morgan Rempel will all be key to the team this fall – Lincoln is the team's leading returning tackler, Rempel the team's leading returning rusher. Juniors Cameron Travis and Preston Dew will give depth.

Willford said he's been happy with the leadership from the upperclassmen but has been excited to see large numbers of freshmen and sophomores in the weight room during the offseason.

"I think having that youth is really going to help and we're going to be able to build this program from the ground up," Willford said.

Chiefs take pride in play

One word comes up often when Wyoming Indian coach Todd Ghormley talks about his team: pride.

At every opportunity, Ghormley brings up how proud he of his players who come back day after day, week after week, to a perpetual on-field struggle.

Football ranks third in Wyoming Indian's fall athletics hierarchy, behind a championshipladen cross country program and preparation for basketball.

That's why football players at Wyoming Indian have to bring that pride to the program daily. When that happens, Ghormley sees the type of development he wants from his squad.

"It's hard to be a ballplayer out here, especially with not a huge following, but the coaches and I really stress (to players) they need to be proud of themselves after each game, after each practice, because we as coaches are proud of them," he said.

Last year, the Chiefs started with about 28 players but finished with 11. In five games, the Chiefs lost by scores of 61-0, 55-0, 56-0,



after missing last year while recovering from surgery.

And Wind River's returners are consistently improving. Trujillo said part of gaining the players' trust was making sure their offseason commitment was in the forefront

Cougars continue to improve

The biggest difference between the first year and the second year for Wind River coach Mykah Trujillo hinges on a single word: trust.

Trujillo was Wind River's sixth head coach in 12 years when he was hired last year. That turnover had created some skepticism among the Cougars, who weren't sure what to expect from their latest coach.

Slowly but surely, Trujillo has started to break down those barriers, and he's hopeful the players' trust in him – and vice versa – will lead to improvements on the field.

"You can see some of them starting to trust (me)," he said. ' ... They've learned that I'm pretty straightforward, I have pretty high expectations for them and I'm not letting up my expectations.'

Nevertheless, Trujillo enters Year Two optimistic, in part because the Cougars only lost four seniors but gain a big freshman class.

"We do have more upperclassmen this year than we did last year for sure, about double the upperclassmen." he said. "We're still pretty bottom heavy, though."

The Cougars could end up with as many as 30 players this fall, but Trujillo said 25 is more realistic.

Wind River does return players in key positions, though, with seven starters returning on both offense and defense. Senior Xavior Oats returns at quarterback, while senior Taylor Tidzump will be one of the team's top wide receivers.

The Cougars return three of their top four tacklers in Oats, Tidzump and senior John Thoman.

Trujillo said having that much returning experience will give the team a great point from which to start the season.

"It's going to be huge because (of) the learning curve," Trujillo said. "Those guys already know what to expect, they know plays, versus last year, everything was new to them

"Having that experience and having guys that know what's going on and what's expected will be huge.

The newcomers will help, too. Trujillo said he has at least three freshmen who could make an immediate impact, while Kaiden Burk, a 215-pound junior, returns

How will six-man's newcomers affect the state title chase? Not all that much, to be honest. Three programs – Lingle, Riverside and Burlington – will move from 11-man to sixman this fall, but only Burlington will be eligible for the playoffs.

Who should be in the title chase, then? The usual suspects. Kaycee and Meeteetse, last year's state champion and state runner-up, have the talent needed to again be contenders. Only six players return from last year's sixman all-state team, and half of them play for either the Buckaroos or the Longhorns.

Who's everyone overlooking? Farson. The Pronghorns have some young but talented players returning - the team's top three tacklers last year were all freshmen – and also play what will likely be their most strenuous West Conference gamesat home.

So there's not a lot of parity, then? Wait, wait, wait... I didn't say that. Actually, coaches say this may be the most wide-open year in recent six-man history, with six or seven teams possessing legitimate ability to run at a title.

Four key games

Midwest at Normative Services, Sept. 9. The Oilers lost just one senior from last year's team. The Wolves are coming off their first six-man playoff qualification. Both teams are

eager to prove they belong.

Burlington at Farson, Sept. 10. The Huskies' first conference game comes on the road against the Pronghorns, a team that could be one of the classification's best. This will be a good litmus test for both teams.

Meeteetse at Snake River, Sept. 16. The Longhorns and Rattlers finished 1-2 in last year's West Conference standings, and this Week 3 showdown in Baggs may again decide who takes the top seed into the playoffs.

Kaycee at Guernsey-Sunrise, Sept. 30. Kaycee's only conference loss last year came at the hands of the Vikings. Both teams figure to be chasing the East Conference title this year, so this one will again be important.

All four seniors will play big roles for HEM, which will put its hopes on the shoulders of its most experienced players this fall.

Red Devils have some holes to fill

Boz Backen's promotion to head coach of the Hulett football team came as a surprise.

Prior to Hulett's first game last year, former head coach Ryan Neiman started telling Backen all the responsibilities a head coach has prior to a game.

"I told (Neiman) that's his job," Backen said, "and that's when he said, 'Not this year."

Neiman stepped down to devote time to his wife, who was expecting the couple's first child. All of a sudden. Backen was head coach.

"The transition was a little difficult at first," Backen said, "coming from being just a volunteer coach and helping with just special teams to being in charge of managing practice and having an input in all parts of the game. Coach Neiman did a fantastic job of helping when I had questions.'

Hulett did well in Backen's first season, finishing 7-3 and earning a home playoff game, Hulett's first in five years of six-man play.

The seven victories were the most for Hulett at the six-man level and the program's highest total since winning eight in 1994.

However, Hulett lost its top three rushers, its quarterback, its top receiver and its top four tacklers – as well as all four of its all-conference players – to graduation.

In addition, the Red Devils lost junior Josh Stevens, who had 419 receiving yards and was slated to be Hulett's top returning tackler. Stevens tore his ACL during basketball and won't be ready to go for football.

Clearly, the team Backen inherited last year will be much different from the one he builds this year.

"We did have a really good group of seniors last year." Backen said. "I really don't know how we replace those guys. Hopefully last year our sophomores and juniors paid attention and will be willing to step up and fill that void."





And senior Brandon Scott added 403 receiving yards and ran for 108 more. Stop one, and opportunities open for another.

But they can't do it alone. The Miners' offense lost its top rusher, passer and receiver to graduation but get back their No. 2 players in all three categories. The Miners do return three of their top four tacklers from a year ago. Jones was second on the team in defensive points,

while Scott was third and Matthews fourth.

Jones led the Miners in tackles for loss and sacks. Even so, on a roster of about 15 play-

"I expect them to come in and be the leaders that our last years senior group showed last year," Backen said. "I want them to take the young kids coming up under their wings and help them get better."

Offensively, Penning finished third in receiving for the Red Devils with 249 yards. Also, with 178 rushing yards last vear. Penning is Hulett's leading returning rusher.

However, the Red Devils don't return any players who threw a pass at the varsity level last season.

Backen said he expects to have about 10 players out this year; of those, five will be freshmen.

"This year with the youth we will have. I think we're going to start at the basics to catch them up and getting them to feel comfortable in any situation that we put them in," Backen said.

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Buckaroos ready for title defense While Kaycee was winning its first state football championship in school history, it was also working

on its second. The Buckaroos won the Class 1A six-man title last year, and in doing so gave their underclassmen significant varsity minutes.

Those opportunities will bear fruit this year as Kaycee goes for a second consecutive title, relying on players who saw extended varsity minutes in 2015.

"All season long, we got to work on next year's team," coach Lee Kremers said. Although underclassmen will

Doggers transition to new class

Lingle-Fort Laramie's decision to move to six-man football was no decision at all. Keeping football alive meant opting down to six-man.

The consequence is steep: Since Lingle is technically classified as an 11-man program, the Doggers won't be eligible for the playoffs. However, with only 11 or 12 players expected out this fall, the Doggers' choice was straightforward.

New head coach Matthew Cornelius said of all the changes he's seen the program undergo the past few months, the one that brings him the most pride is how his returning players have made the most of a tough situation.

"They realize we won't even be eligible for the playoffs, so I'm proud of the kids that have sacrificed this summer," Cornelius said.

The Doggers lost 13 seniors but still return all-state selections Garrett Cooper and Dallen Fleenor, both seniors. Fleenor ran for 872 yards and was also Lingle's top receiver in its run-heavy offense with 103 yards on nine catches. Cooper was fourth on the team in defensive points while Fleenor was fifth.

Cornelius said Cooper and Fleenor form a dynamic pairing at the six-man level; they'll likely form a fullback-tailback pair on offense and a linebacker-safety pair on defense. They've earned those roles, Cornelius said, by being Lingle's leaders in the transition from 11-man to six-man.

While they could have dropped football or played other sports, Cornelius said, "it's really great for them to understand it's a character-building process and I'm really proud of them for that."

A core group of seniors, including Fleenor, Cooper, Preston Bowers, Jared Shepardson and Taylor Wagner,

were among Lingle's top 10 tacklers a year ago.

From 2009-14, the Oilers made the playoffs every year. Last year, the Oilers' string of good fortune ran out.

Coach Ken Swieter said he knows how big of a motivator it is for his players to have the opportunity to play in the postseason, and he saw how much missing out on that opportunity frustrated his players.

"I want to get back to the playoffs," he said. "Last year was the first year we didn't make the playoffs in six-man. I didn't like that. We didn't like that.

"It stung for many of those kids, especially the ones that did put a lot of work and effort into

Fortunately for the Oilers, the sting has morphed into motivation, and nearly every player returns for vindication.

The Oilers only graduated one senior from last year's 3-5 team but suffered a big offseason loss

when Dylan VanFleet, who ran for more than 1,000 yards last year as a junior, moved to Tennessee.

But everyone else is back. Midwest could have more than 20 players out this fall, including as many as eight seniors. Those seniors are part of a program that reached a state championship game their freshman year.

Defensively, the Oilers have back eight of their top nine tacklers, including seniors Nick Ray - Midwest's only returning allconference player - Dustin Bogart, Kia Hudson and Logan Drinkwalter and junior Will Chapman. Those players all averaged at least seven defensive points per game last year.

Offensively, VanFleet's presence will be missed, but Ray had 259 rushing yards and 150 receiving yards and is the team's leading returner in both categories. Junior Kayden Best also returns after taking the reins at quarterback last fall.

Junior Dakota Holaday and sophomore Tristan Bunce also played key roles in the Longhorns' defensive rotation last year.

Huskies make move to 6-man

After one game last season, Burlington's players knew a change had to come.

The Huskies finished last season with about 14-15 players but only had 11 in their first game against Lusk - the 52-0 loss that ended up being Burlington's last 11-man game of the year.

Soon after, the Huskies forfeited the remainder of their games, knowing that playing without a single player on the bench wasn't an option.

Instead, Burlington tried sixman football. The Huskies went 4-2 in six-man exhibition games, beating JV teams from Meeteetse, Midwest and Kaycee and the varsity squad from Billings (Montana) Christian and losing to the Hot Springs (Montana) varsity and the Custer (Montana) JV.

This year, the Huskies made the move to six-man official, joining the Class 1A six-man West Conference. The adjustment to six-man, even with a year of exhibition game, will still take some time.

"A lot of these teams have been playing six-man for awhile," new head coach Trent Aagard said.



"Even though we were able to play against a few Montana schools and some Wyoming JV games, there is still a bit of a learning curve when switching to six-man.

"Football is still football, but it seems like there is less room for error in six-man. I hope we can take some of the stuff we saw last year and try and (shore) up parts of our game.

Aagard, a Burlington native, has been an assistant coach with the Huskies for three years and is the vounger brother of former head coach Mike Aagard. Aagard said he was pleased to see the team's resilience shine through during tough times last season.

"Last year, we didn't know

what if any games we were going to be able to play, but the kids showed up to practice and worked hard every day," Aagard said. "It would have been easy to say, 'We aren't going to play anyway, why practice?' But they showed up and went to work every day."

From that group, Burlington only lost two seniors, and one of those seniors missed most of the year due to injury.

Senior running backs Kyle Broederlow and Dallin Christiansen have the most experience at the running back position, with Christiansen the speedy outside option and Broederlow a runner who can get tough yards.

Senior Austin Nicholson missed some time due to injury but is a big, physical presence who can disrupt opposing offenses.

And junior Talon Wiles has been Burlington's quarterback the past two years.

"I think the kids really enjoyed the switch last year," Aagard said. "It is a learning process, but most of what I have heard has been positive in terms of the switch. At least we will get to play.'

Pronghorns seek playoff success

Farson has figured out ways to win in the regular season. This year, the Pronghorns' challenge will be to win games in the postseason, too.

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With only four seniors slated to come out – but only three seniors lost from last year's 6-3 team – Farson is in a unique situation of having high expectations without a massive senior class to accompany those expectations.

"We have to have people step up to leadership positions," coach Marvin "Trip" Applequist said.

The Pronghorns return almost every key contributor from last year but do lose their only all-state selection in Neale Jones. Jones led the team in rushing and passing and was fourth in defensive points.

However, Farson returns two all-conference selections from last year, senior Jake Richey and sophomore Clancy Gines, and the Pronghorns will line up a defense whose top three tacklers last year were just freshmen.

For two consecutive years, the Pronghorns have finished 6-3, but both seasons ended with first-round playoff losses. Applequist said both players and coaches around the program are no longer satisfied with reaching the postseason - their goals include winning playoff games.

"I think we have very high expectations," Applequist said. "I think all the players are expecting to make a run through the playoffs.

The leadership from that run will in part come from the seniors, including Richey, Ed Barlow,



Thomas Rezzonico and Ryan Curtis. But sophomores will be a key part of

the Pronghorns' attack, too, especially on a defense that returns eight of its top nine tacklers. As freshmen last year, Lain Mitchelson, Gines and Cortland Barker occupied the top three spots, respectively, on Farson's defensive points tally.

"They're really solid football players and have a good grasp of the game," Applequist said. "It's a bonus for us for sure'

Barlow, Richey, Rezzonico, Braxton Applequist and Zack Gail will all be key pieces of the defense.

Offensively, the team will need to find a new identity without Jones, who was by far the team's leading rusher and top scorer.

"It's definitely going to be a hole that has to be filled, but I think we have the talent coming up to fill those spots," Applequist said. "And it may not be all in one person.

Gines and Mitchelson - the team's leading returning receiver and rusher, respectively - figure to be part of that.

Farson's path to a championship isn't smooth, though. The entrance of two new teams into the West Conference, Burlington and Riverside, will make conference play that much deeper and that much more challenging.

"Teams are really going to have to play well just to make the playoffs, because the teams that are coming in are going to be solid teams," Applequist said.

MEETEETSE LONGHORNS Longhorns motivated by loss

One of the biggest challenges in six-man football is preparing younger players for varsity play.

With so few players on each roster, junior varsity games are rare. Meeteetse has found a workaround.

The Longhorns won their first 10 games in 2015 by at least 21 points – and won six of those by at least 40 points – and those large margins gave the Longhorns' younger players extended varsity playing time.

"Those freshmen and sophomores got to play a lot," coach Matt Jensen said. "They're not going to get shocked by going out into a game, because they've done it "

The 11th game was the toughest of the season, though, as the Longhorns lost to Kaycee 51-32 in the six-man championship.

Meeteetse graduated three allconference players and might also lose senior all-conference pick Adam Poole, who might transfer to Colorado. Even so, the Longhorns are still in position to be one of sixman's best teams, thanks in part to



younger players with enough experience to contribute immediately.

"We know the system really well," Jensen said. "They know what to expect. They're smart kids when it comes to football, and just continuing on with the program is going to be really huge for us."

The Longhorns return three of their seven all-conference selections from last year, including senior Dalton Abarr and juniors Josh Graybill and Braenn Smith.

Abarr. an all-state selection last year, led the Longhorns in rushing yards (881) and passing yards (1,391) and accounted for 52 total touchdowns either via his arm or his legs.

Abarr threw 30 touchdowns last year without an interception.

Jensen said Abarr relied a lot on the Longhorns' other weapons last

year; this year, Abarr will have to transition from facilitator to leader.

"I've been impressed with the way he's taken some of those sophomores under his wing," Jensen said. "... You're really going to start to see some of those younger kids emerge because of him."

The Longhorns do lose three of their top four tacklers to graduation, with Smith - who was second on the team in defensive points last year – the top returning tackler.

Graybill was fifth, senior Owen Burbank sixth and Abarr seventh.

The younger players, including sophomores Kerwin Johnson, Anthony Kluesner, Clayton Corbin and Nick Anderson and junior Jack Fremlin will be in position for extended minutes this fall.

Senior Cole Burbank could also be key on both sides of the ball. The title-game loss has the

Longhorns motivated, too. "Our kids didn't sit and dwell

on it," Jensen said. "We had a real strong presence in the weight room for kids who weren't out for basketball. I really think it's made our kids pretty hungry."

Rebels transition to six-man game

In all facets, this will be a transition year for the Riverside football program.

The Rebels will make the move from 11-man to six-man football this year, a move with both benefits and drawbacks.

The biggest benefit? Football survives at Riverside. Coach Sam Buck said he will probably have 10 to 14 players out this fall – a number not beneficial to either the Rebels or potential opponents in 11-man. Buck said having six-man football is better than not having football at all.

"I'm excited about the opportunity," he said. . Now that we're in this situation, I'm definitely taking it on with enthusiasm and excitement for what the six-man game has to offer. I know it can be a fun and exciting game."

The biggest drawback? No playoffs. The Wyoming High School Activities Association classifies Riverside as an 11-man program by enrollment. Since the program opted to play sixman instead, it is ineligible for postseason play.

That has Buck frustrated.

"We want to do what's right for the players," Buck said. "It's almost like your getting penalized by doing what's best for the players.'

However, Buck said he won't dwell on that lost opportunity, nor will he let his players. Instead, the team will focus on taking their one shot at the opponents on their schedule.

"That's your one shot at these guys, and that's

kind of like your championship, your playoff," Buck said. "... At the end of the year, (if) these teams go on to win the title, you kind of know where you stack up. Whether or not you have a trophy to show for it, you'll have proven it to yourselves."

When the Rebels take the field this fall, not only will they be playing a new version of football, they'll be doing so with basically a whole new cast of players.

Only one of Riverside's five all-conference picks returns this fall - senior Jack Kimsey. The Rebels lost every single player who threw the ball, every single player who caught the ball, their top six rushers and their top seven tacklers to graduation

Kimsey is the team's leading returning tackler. Kimsey and senior Zach Owen will anchor Riverside up front, while junior Justen Miller and sophomores Ryan Vigil and Sterling Foss are the Rebels' most versatile threats on the outside. However, Buck said the team needs to develop a dependable skill-position player who's a consistent offensive threat.

Buck said Kimsey and Owen might lead a power running game, but he also flexibility will be important to fit how six-man is played. "We've just got to get our selves right and make

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sure we're competent and have our players ready to compete at the six-man game," he said.

Pioneers will be youth challenged

By now, Snake River's down years are other programs' dream The Rattlers finished 7-3 last

year - their sixth consecutive winning season. They reached the Class 1A six-man semifinals and lost all three of their games to the two teams that played in the state championship game (Kaycee and Meeteetse).

Although the Rattlers lose some experienced players to graduation, coach Mike Bates' plan is to keep the program moving in the direction it has already established.

The one new wrinkle in Snake River's approach is new opposition. The Rattlers will see two new opponents this year in conference play with Riverside and Burlington moving down from 11-man and into six-man's West Conference.

"It keeps six-man going strong and that is important," Bates said. "I believe the competition statewide is going to be amazing, and that of itself makes this season fun because it could be wide open or it could have a team that no one expects.

What is expected? Snake

River, as always, will field a team capable of playing with the best in six-man.

Junior J.D. Corson was an allstate selection last year and will be a key piece of Snake River's approach on both sides of the ball in 2016.

Corson, the Rattlers' quarterback, threw for 1,220 yards and 22 touchdowns; he was also Snake River's leading tackler, topping the team in solo tackles. assisted tackles and defensive points

The Rattlers did lose their top two rushers and top two receivers to graduation, though.

Experience at quarterback and inexperience at running back might mean Snake River changes its offensive approach. However, Bates said that decision won't be made until later.

"We have some years where

you can grind and some you have to be more air (oriented)." he said. "(We're) not sure where we are at yet in that equation, but summer and two-a-days will hopefully get it answered.'

Junior Kameron Evans and senior Eric Ortega - the Rattlers' only anticipated senior this year were all-conference picks last

Evans was second behind Corson in defensive points last year for Snake River, notching team highs in both interceptions (four) and fumble recoveries (five).

Junior fullback/defensive end Trenton Jeanerett will add depth to the squad.

However, of the six players who saw the most consistent time on defense, three of them graduated. And Snake River could go deep into its roster to replace their contributions.

"We have a crop of freshman (players) who will get playing time for sure... but we will have to acclimatize them to high school play, of course," Bates said.

"Most schools, you can't even hit freshman with upperclassmen, so how they will figure in is still vet to be seen."

Most football players have three years to learn a system before they're asked to execute at the varsity level. Players at Ten Sleep have

three weeks.

Coach Jake Zent said the team has a theme for its incoming players: "Start fast, go hard, hold on and hope it's enough."

With limited players – Ten Sleep ended 2015 with seven players in uniform - the Pioneers' younger players don't have the luxury of time.

"You really have to manage playing time and injuries and practice time very carefully," Zent said. "You have to be kind of cognizant of how much contact they're getting in practice. ... You can't take the chance of getting a kid hurt in practice if you need them in the game." Of the seven players listed

on Ten Sleep's roster last year, three were seniors. This year, Zent said he hopes he can have a dozen players out; that's the magic number in six-man, because that allows teams to scrimmage in practice.

Ten Sleep hasn't consis-



tently had that kind of depth. "For years we've run drills against trash cans or had older guys from the community come in," Zent said.

Zent, who was Ten Sleep's coach from 2007-12, retakes the helm this year. And he inherits a team that runs into a problem he's faced before.

"We're a very young team at this point," Zent said. "We don't have any seniors, so it'll be our juniors' responsibility to step up and show that leadership.

"They're eager to learn and they want to play hard."

Junior Corey Rice returns as the team's top offensive threat. Rice led the Pioneers in both passing and rushing, throwing for 912 yards and running for 281, and was also the team's No. 3 receiver with 181 yards

Eagles stress the fundamentals

When the season starts, St. Stephens will go through the mandated three days of no-contact practices, just like every other program in the state. But when the Eagles finally

put on the pads, the true work will begin.

Coach Lyle Valdez has a clear vision in mind for what that first full-contact practice will be: one big lesson in tack-

"That's all were going to do, work on tackling," Valdez said. "... We need to learn how to tackle. When we get that down... we can stop anybody."

Valdez said the emphasis on tackling is rooted in the team's biggest problem, one that was clear in 2015.

Last season, the Eagles gave up 80.1 points per game, a state record. The Eagles' closest game in their 0-7 season was a

61-18 loss to Rock River, a team came against St. Stephens.

The Eagles lost their seven games by a combined score of 561-113.

"That was our problem last year, was tackling," Valdez said. "We were tackling high. We were tackling with our arms, rather than tacking and driving." The Eagles enter this season

on a 23-game losing streak, every game since the program's six-man varsity revival in 2013, and fundamentals – the basics of

how to tackle, block and play certain positions - continue to be the focus.

But there's reason for optimism

The Eagles could have one of six-man's deepest teams, as Valdez said he could have more than 20 players out this fall, including as many as 11 sophomores and a sizable incoming freshman class.

Juniors Robert Hernandez, Thomas Moss and Antonio Divers will all be called on to lead those younger players. Sophomores Be'enoo Bell,

Winter Hawk Felter, Roberto Hernandez and Brian Williams Jr. were on the roster last year as freshmen, and Ward Spoonhunter and Isaih Divers will also contribute as 10th-graders.

Another reason for optimism? Most of those players were part of a team that aver-



aged 16.14 points per game on offense, the highest total for a St. Stephens team in three years of six-man varsity player. However, most of the returning players will need to apply what they've learned quickly to fill spots left by a big graduating class.

"I lost all my offensive guys, our top guys who played a lot, Valdez said. " ... (But) those freshmen, coming up as sophomores, they'll know their assignments now.

Valdez said he's motivating the players this year by encouraging them to get their first victory to give the team a much-needed confidence boost.

"If we get that first win, they'll realize we can play with anybody now," Valdez said.

For St. Stephens, the path to that first victory starts in practice.

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on 12 catches.

However, Ten Sleep will need to overcome the loss of Quentin Fettig, who was the team's top receiver and scorer, and J.D. Nelson, who was an all-around offensive threat and finished as Class 1A six-man's top tackler.

The three seniors Ten Sleep graduated last year (Fettig, Nelson and Luke Fenton) were the team's top three tacklers.

Rice was fourth on the team in defensive points and junior Byron Powell was fifth.

Junior Zach Dorn is also slated to return.

Zent said one of the challenges Ten Sleep faces this fall is how to use size. Powell is 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs about 225 pounds; incoming freshman Zane Taylor is 6-4 and almost 300 pounds.

"We've got to figure out how to use his strengths and figure out how he can be successful," Zent said.

At Ten Sleep, one thing's for sure: He'll be called on to play right away.
