

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Natrona will have challengers

Four questions to answer

Does Natrona start the season as the favorite? As THE favorite? No. As one of them? Yes. The defending champs lost a ton of quality contributors to graduation but return enough offensive firepower to remain a threat to repeat.

Who else is in the conversation? It's 4A, so Sheridan, Cheyenne East and Thunder Basin. Of those, Thunder Basin appears to be in the best position to actually make a move. After falling short in the semifinals against Sheridan last year, the 'Bolts are motivated.

So, the Big Four again? Yep, the big four again. None of the other six teams in 4A have yet shown they're ready to be seriously considered as title contenders, or even semifinal contenders. However, three new coaches could bring shifting fortunes to 4A's second tier.

What was that about new coaches? Mark Lenhardt moves from back-to-back title game appearances at 3A Torrington to coach at Rock Springs, while Aaron Makelky moves from 2A Big Piney to Kelly Walsh. They, along with Andrew Rose – a promoted assistant at Gillette – will give 4A a new look this fall.

Four key games

Natrona at Sheridan, and Thunder Basin at Cheyenne East, Sept. 13. The third week of the season presents the first matchups of 4A's "Big Four." It's likely that all four teams will be 2-0 at this point, and a victory here sets

up the winners for the rest of the year.

Sheridan at Thunder Basin, Sept. 20. The rivalry game between the Broncs and the 'Bolts doesn't have a name yet. Maybe in its third year, it should get one. How about the "Basin to Bighorns Bowl"? Despite all the "B's," expect an A-level performance in this one.

Natrona at Thunder Basin, Oct. 4. On paper, the Mustangs and 'Bolts have the two most talented teams in 4A this year. This Week 5 game in Gillette will likely set the pace for the second half of the season.

Cheyenne East at Sheridan, Oct. 25. This game between two perennial contenders will have huge playoff implications. The fact that it comes right before the playoffs will only heighten the anticipation.

The 'Bolts' offensive stars will get a lot of the preseason, and mid-season, and post-season, attention. However, an unheralded but, by 4A standards, experienced defense could be the unit that carries Thunder Basin to its first state championship.

Five players to watch

Mason Hamilton and Blaine Allen, Thunder Basin

You can't mention the 'Bolts' quarterback without mentioning his favorite receiver. Hamilton was dazzling as a junior, throwing for a state-high 2,592 yards and 31 touchdowns, while Allen led 4A with 805 receiving yards.

Dante Wallace, Natrona

Wallace was 4A's top rusher last year in basically every category. He had more carries (235), more yards (1,812) and more touchdowns (23) than any other back in 4A. And he's ready to help Natrona in its repeat attempt.

Garrett Coon, Sheridan

Coon is a bit of a throwback. As a mixture of fullback and linebacker, Coon is one of 4A's most physical players. He was fourth in 4A in defensive points and second in the classification with 101 total tackles.

Graedyn Buell, Cheyenne East

It might be easy to overlook Buell, whose sophomore season was cut short due to a broken ankle. But he put up steady stats (1,346 passing yards, 12 touchdowns to just three interceptions, 303 rushing yards) before the injury.

Rose ascends to leading role

During two years of winless football, the Campbell County Camels became complacent.

With a limited number of upperclassmen, the Camels' players didn't have to work as hard to see playing time.

Consequently, in 2018 Campbell County went 0-9 for a second consecutive season and saw its losing streak balloon to 19 games.

However, as the program prepares for 2019 with a full group of seniors for the first time in three years and new expectations, that complacency is dissipating, incoming head coach Andrew Rose said.

"I have demanded just as much and if not more out of players," Rose said. "It has made it to where some are not pleased because they were able to get away with quite a bit. Now it (appears) that I am shaking things up a little bit when in all reality, this is right along the norm for successful teams in 4A football."

The team returns eight to 10 starters on both offense and defense and lost just six seniors to graduation. That added depth has created more competition in the offseason, helping to make everyone better and potentially shaking up the lineups the Camels will have this fall.

"There may be some hurt feelings because others have stepped up to the plate and proved themselves," Rose said. "For the first time in a long time we have individuals on the teams we are in a position to be true leaders, not just verbally but by example."

On offense, the entire starting offensive line returns with seniors Dale Eliason, Adam French, Marcus Wilson and Austin Brandt and junior Colter Rankin.

Senior Kameron Martinson led the Camels with 428 rushing yards last year, while classmate Vijay Pitter added 172 yards and three rushing TDs.

And a handful of receivers, including senior Tanner Hilliard – who led the squad with 15 catches for 180 yards and two scores – return as well.

On defense, the Camels get back their top five tacklers – in order, junior Hunter Kramer, Pitter,

senior Dawsen Hayden, Rankin and junior Xander Beeson.

Kramer led the team in tackles with 21 solo and 32 assisted tackles, while Hayden led Gillette with five tackles for loss.

However, with a group of incoming sophomores who could potentially make moves into the starting lineup, Rose said no spots are guaranteed to returners.

Rose, a Gillette native who spent eight years as an assistant football coach, said the chance to coach his alma mater makes the rebuilding effort more personal.

"I love this team," Rose said. "I want them to be successful. I also want them to come back to their roots a little bit and understand what it means to be a part of something bigger than themselves."







Indians are gaining experience

Cheyenne Central's final game of the 2018 season gave a glimpse into the Indians' future.

In a 34-0 loss to Thunder Basin in the Class 4A quarterfinals, the Indians started sophomores and freshmen in 10 different positions.

This year, with only six or seven seniors anticipated to be out and less than half of those expected to be key contributors, the Indians will have to look to those younger players – now juniors and sophomores – to keep Central competitive.

Second-year coach Mike Apodaca said the players now all have a year in his system, helping them transition into 2019 without having to learn new schemes and terminology as well as developing physically.

"I don't think we have any false impressions of sophomores

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and JV juniors from last year setting the world on fire, but they just need to understand they just need to do their part," Apodaca said.

The Indians return three of their eight all-conference picks in senior quarterback Dawson Macleary, junior tight end Brady Storebo and junior linebacker Carter Lobatos.

Macleary will be one of Central's few, but key, senior leaders. Macleary threw for 1,977 yards and completed 16 touchdown passes against 15 interceptions in 2018.

"He is the general for lack of a better word," Apodaca said. "Dawson is so much comfortable in what we want to do. ... Just the fact that he's had a year in a system and a little more offseason time is critical."

Storebo was fourth for the In-

dians with 18 catches for 181 yards and one touchdown last year. Central graduated its top three receivers, though, making Storebo Central's top returning receiver.

Senior Andrew Johnson chipped in 108 receiving yards to finish fifth for Central.

Defensively, Lobatos led the Indians in several categories, including defensive points (151), solo tackles (43), assisted tackles (36) and tackles for loss (five). Lobatos is also Central's leading returning rusher and was second on the team a year ago; however, he only totaled 82 yards on a team that had just three rushing touchdowns last year.

On the defense, Lobatos will be surrounded by a bunch of newcomers, as Central graduated nine of its top 12 tacklers.

Johnson was fourth on the team in defensive points, while junior Nate Lundberg tied for ninth.

Apodaca said despite its youth, his team has had chances to get better with a full slate of offseason workouts, practices, camps and seven-on-seven tournaments.

"Those kids have been pretty committed to what we're doing," Apodaca said. "(They) just have to learn on the fly a little bit.

"... Those young guys are at least getting a ton of exposure, so hopefully the stage is a little less bright when it comes."

T-Birds have plenty of firepower

When Cheyenne East coach Chad Goff looks at his offense, he sees a lot of weapons.

The Thunderbirds return an explosive quarterback, all-state selections at both running back and wide receiver, and a bunch of other players who can light up defenses if given the chance.

They'll get those chances in 2019.

"We told our skill positions, 'You better make something happen when you touch the ball,'" Goff said. "... It's a good problem to have."

Running back Christian Anderton and wide receiver Chance Aumiller, both seniors, were all-state picks last year, while junior quarterback Graedyn Buell and senior wideout Cole Micheli were all-conference

Buell started the season at quarterback and threw for 1,346 yards and 12 touchdowns – while adding

303 rushing yards and four rushing TDs, as well – before breaking his ankle against Rock Springs.

Anderton led East with 844 rushing yards and nine scores as the Thunderbirds' feature back.

The T-Birds spread the ball out through the air last year, with seven players notching at least 141 receiving yards but none more than 377. Of those seven, four return: Senior Ox Schroeder tied for second on the team with 263 receiving yards and led East with five receiving touchdowns, Aumiller had 255 yards and four TDs before moving to quarterback, Micheli notched 243 yards on 24 catches and Anderton had 10 catches for 141 yards.

The problem for the T-Birds' offense is as simple as its strength. Where the backs and receivers are full

Bison will be tested early

In preparing for their first two games of 2019, Chevenne South has two alternatives.

The Bison can be overwhelmed. Or they can be opportunistic.

South coach Dan Gallas said he's hoping his team will take option No. 2.

By starting 2019 with road games against Natrona and Thunder Basin, who on paper are two of Class 4A's best teams, the Bison could play early spoiler.

Either way, they'll know where they stand early in the season.

"The kids know who we're playing," Gallas said. "Those teams are very good. ... But those are the teams we have to play. That's the great news, that we get to play the best and see how we measure up.'

This year's Bison team lacks depth but returns key players in important spots, enough to keep South's hopes for the program's second playoff berth alive.

Senior running back Alex Soto is the lone returning all-conference choice the Bison have. Soto ran for 515 yards on 107 carries last year, leading the Bison's run-heavy offense. However, he's the only one of South's top four rushers to

"I think that what we're really looking for from him is his leadership," Gallas said. "We need him to lead us not only with his stats but with his attitude and his charisma."

Senior Hunter Scott led the squad with 15 catches and two touchdowns and was No. 2 on teh team with 170 receiving yards. But Scott's return is uncertain, the other two of South's top three receivers graduated, and last year's starting quarterback, Cade Burns, has transferred, Gallas

On defense, senior Macarius Wright was No. 2 for South in defensive points last year and ledthe Bison with 29 solo tackles, four interceptions and four pass break-ups. Senior Joe Hanson was third in defensive points and tops for South with seven tackles for loss.

However, they're the only two of South's top seven tacklers to return this year.

Sophomore Braeden Hughes (eighth) was also in South's top 10 tacklers a year ago.

Up front, the Bison will return a couple key linemen in seniors Griffin Beleski and Christian

"They're going to be young (up front)," Gallas said. "It's going to take some time. We're going to have to gel quick and be ready to play."

Although South has yet to post a winning season since moving to the varsity level in 2011. Gallas said he likes what he sees heading into this season.

"We make little strides all the time and we continue to build on that," he said. "We build on the concept that we're going to bind as a team, work together, pump each other up, and work as hard as we can to make ourselves as good as we can."

Makelky working on new culture

When Aaron Makelky took over as the head football coach at Kelly Walsh, he asked everyone associated with the program - from administrators to coaches to players to supporters – a series of questions.

What emerged from that research was a clearer understanding of the job ahead, as well as a vision for how to get there.


"The resources that they have (at KW) are immense," Makelky said, "the facilities, the coaching staff, people there who care. For a place that hasn't had a lot of win-loss success... there's a lot of people who care and are excited about what we do.'

In 2017, KW finished with a winning record and a playoff victory for the first time since 2009; in 2018, the Trojans struggled and finished 3-7.

Former coach Jon Vance was let go, and Makelky was brought in from Class 2A Big Piney to develop the program.

"Our true focus this year is the culture of the team," Makelky said.

With that, Makelky said he plans to build KW's program by focusing on what the Trojans can do well and how they can cause problems for other

teams, finding ways to out-think and outplay opponents rather than trying to go toe-to-toe with them. That's clear in KW's team slogan for the year: "Built differently."

"When you go against the grain, you have an advantage," Makelky said.

Makelky said his opportunities to work with the team prior to fall camp were limited, but he liked what he saw from the players who committed to offseason camps and training.

On offense. Makelky said he planned to run an option offense, but run that offense through wideopen looks that can take advantage of mobile linemen and give athletes opportunities to make plays in one-on-one situations.

"I'd like to think with our kids and our support at Kelly Walsh and our resources, we could do a great job of running it... and be a pain in the butt for scout teams to run and for other defenses to prepare for," Makelky said.

To run that offense, Makelky will look to some experienced linemen – seniors Chance Burton, Bastian Hansen, Gatlin Edwards and Gavin Thomas. Three other seniors – slot receiver Emery Yoosook. running back Kole Kraus and defensive back Jevon Davis – also caught Makelky's eye early.

Yoosook was fifth on the team last year in defensive points and Davis was seventh. Thomas, an all-conference pick, tied for the team lead with two sacks, while Davis had a team-high five pass break-

While the Xs and Os will be important, Makelky said developing the Trojans' attitude and building confidence will be the primary drivers for him and his staff this fall.

"I love the challenge," he said.

of players with experience, the offensive line is full of inexperience. Senior Zach Higgins is East's only returning starting lineman. However, Goff said he saw great progress from his linemen during a camp at Black Hills State in June.

"They started to understand their assignments better and just understand what the guy next to them is going to be doing," Goff said.

Defensively, the Thunderbirds graduated their top four tacklers. leaving Micheli – who had 95 defensive points, 41 total tackles and a team-high seven pass break-ups - as East's top returning tackler.

Aumiller finished seventh for East in defensive points and had a team-high seven interceptions. while Schroeder was ninth and iunior Jaret Taylor was 11th.

Regardless, Goff said continuity will help East continue to be successful. Goff cited the fact that former players return to help the program helps "our youth to see high school football is a pretty

cool thing, and it's important to a lot of people.

Last year, East notched its seventh winning season in eight years.

"I think the biggest thing is we've been pretty lucky and blessed to have good kids, kids that work hard and show up to the opportunities to make themselves better," Goff said.

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Plainsmen building momentum

Laramie's 2018 senior class helped the program take a small leap.

Now, a small senior class, and a throng of juniors and sophomores, are responsible for helping the Plainsmen maintain that momentum.

The Plainsmen jumped from 3-7 to 4-6 last year, but the season still ended the way it has for each of the past six seasons – a loss in the first round of the Class 4A playoffs.

Laramie hasn't had a winning season since 2000, but the incremental steps help keep things moving in the right di-

Coach Clint Reed said maintaining that momentum this year means on relying on a "talented but thin" senior class, 'and they need to step up and be leaders for our team."

Added Reed, "Right now we're relying on a lot of sophomores and juniors. ... We're battling numbers again."

Laramie graduated four allconference choices and almost 20 seniors, leaving the Plainsmen with just three returning starters on both offense and defense.

The offensive line returns two starters in seniors Calvin Webb and Jamen Livingston.

"It's really nice to have a couple guys there with experience who have played," Reed said.

However, the Plainsmen don't return a player who ran for more than 45 yards, threw for more than 88 or caught passes for more than 95 last

Basically every position is up for grabs. The quarterback position is between junior Garrett Dodd and sophomore Jake Vigen, while junior running backs Colter Nunn and Isaac Sell are competing for the starting tailback spot.

The offense will benefit from the return of senior wide receiver Janson Adair, who missed last season due to injury, and juniors Connor Killpack and Caleb Eaton will also see time

The defense will be young, as Nunn is the only one of Laramie's top seven tacklers to return this fall. Nunn, from the inside linebacker position, was second for the Plainsmen with 87 tackles last season and was third in total defensive points in



Business as usual for Mustangs

Tradition alone doesn't win championships. The Natrona County Mustangs know it, too.

One of the most tradition-rich football programs in the state, Natrona won its 18th state championship, and its fourth since 2010, by finishing 11-1 and beating three-time defending Class 4A champion Sheridan 28-14 in the 2018 Class 4A title game.

"Our guys expect to be really good," Natrona coach Steve Harshman said. " ... We've got a lot of tradition. We've been playing in that same spot (where the field is) for over 100 years and in that same stadium for well over 80.

" ... But it doesn't really have any bearing on the work we've got to do this year."

With that in mind, the Mustangs will try to remain competitive behind a small but hard-working senior class and a large group of underclassmen who will try to keep the tradition alive.

The Mustangs get back a pair of all-state players in seniors Dante Wallace and Johnathon True. Wallace was Natrona's featured back; he ran the football 235 times for 1,812 yards and 23 touchdowns last season. He also caught 10 passes for 105 vards.

Harshman said Wallace was aided by an offensive line that had a lot of experience; all five offensive linemen last year were seniors, leaving the Mustangs inexperienced up front this year.

"Like all offense, it begins with those five guys up front," he said.

With the inexperience on the line, Harshman said, "we're going to be really different, and as much as anything. ... (We) have to spread it around a lot, with our running back, quarterback and other skill guys."

Junior Harrison Taubert split time at quarterback, completing 33 of 62 passes for 572 yards and nine touchdowns while running 70 times for 408 vards and six more scores.

Junior Morgan Pickett added 46 carries for 261 yards, and senior Cooper Quig, an all-conference pick, caught 10 passes for 169 yards and two touchdowns.

Defensively, the Mustangs graduated their top five tacklers, with True and his 32 total tackles – including nine for loss and four sacks - the top defensive returner. True is the only one of Natrona's top eight tacklers from last year to return, and Quig at ninth is the only other player out of Natrona's top 14 tacklers coming back.

Harshman said he was confident his up-andcoming players will put in the work to be ready to play in the fall and keep Natrona's tradition going.

Harshman said one of the beauties of football is "you don't play that many games, so you've got to enjoy the getting ready part. ... I think we have a good group of kids who have bought into that and really done that through the years."

In his first year as head coach at Rock Springs, Mark Lenhardt has clear priorities.

Those priorities start with the basics – the same basics that helped turn around the program at Torrington that Lenhardt led prior to taking over the

"It is important we show our players what expect in terms of effort, practice habits and building a fundamental base," Lenhardt said. "Without those three components, scheme means nothing. That will be our primary focus this first year."

After leading Torrington to back-to-back appear-



ances in the Class 3A championship, Lenhardt said making the move to Rock Springs was based in part in the similarities he saw between the two commu-

"I was attracted to Rock Springs because it seemed to be a similar blue-collar, tough football type town as Torrington, but with more students to choose from," he said. "Rock Springs is a growing community and I love the fact that it is a oneschool, one-team place. It has a small-school vibe with a large enrollment."

The Tigers' roster includes both size and experience, Lenhardt said. However, senior lineman Brandon Mortenson is the only returning all-conference player the Tigers have.

Seniors Favor Okere and Landon Toth were two of Rock Springs' top three rushers last year, with Okere notching 380 yards and Toth 358. Several other players could be in the mix in the backfield as Lenhardt looks for players to emerge.

"We will have to be running back by committee



Broncs should be in title chase

For most first-year coaches and most programs, a state runner-up finish is laudable.

Sheridan is no ordinary program. Under Jeff Mowry, in his first year leading Sheridan after several years as an assistant, the Broncs reached the Class 4A championship game for the fourth consecutive year – but for the first time in that stretch, the Broncs didn't win the state championship.

When Mowry looks back on his first year as head coach, he sees as close to a seamless transition as possible, where players and coaches continued the success the program had developed over the past decade. There's still a bit of regret, though.

"A state championship in the first year, obviously, would have been a little better," Mowry said.

As Sheridan tries to continue its program momentum in 2019, it will try to do so with a tested group that hasn't seen a ton of starts but has seen a lot of playing time. Senior Garrett Coon is the only one of Sheridan's five all-state and seven all-conference players to return. He's also one of four returning starters on defense and three on defense.

Coon was Sheridan's top tack-

ler last season, leading the Brones with 167 defensive points, 101 total tackles, 69 assisted tackles, three fumble recoveries and three interceptions.

He was also Sheridan's No. 2 rusher, running 79 times for 458 yards and six touchdowns.

"He's got an incredible work ethic and he's really a guy you can build a program around," Mowry said.

The Broncs also return senior quarterback Jacob Boint, who completed 107 of 203 passes for 1,460 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Senior Toby Jacobs, who caught 16 passes for 237 yards to finish third on the team in both categories last year, is Sheridan's top returning receiver.

The line returns only one starter, but Mowry said he's excited by the potential he sees in a unit that had quite a bit of playing time last year despite not always starting. The offensive line is also typically a key to Sheridan's success.

"We're a smaller team, and we've got to be really solid up front to run the ball against these bigger, more physical teams," he said. "Last year, we started five brand new offensive linemen in our first game, and that's not going to happen this year."

On defense, in addition to Coon the Broncs get back senior Ryan Sessions, who ranked fourth for Sheridan in defensive points last year and was fifth with 48 total tackles.

Senior Camden McArthur was seventh in defensive points and fourth in total tackles with 55. while Jacobs was eighth in defensive points. Of Sheridan's top 13 tacklers from 2018, they are the only four to return.

Senior Justis Reese contributed 448 passing yards, completing 34 of 78 passes; however, the Tigers lose their top three receivers, and Reese will likely move to wide receiver as senior Seth Hymas takes over the quarterback position. Okere, with seven catches for 80 yards, is the only returning receiver with more than 40 receiving

"We have not been a real proficient passing team the last few years, so that will be a work in progress for us as well to achieve the balance we would like to have," Lenhardt said.

The defense returns a similar number of contributors, with five of the Tigers' top 10 tacklers returning in 2019.

Senior Chase Petty leads Rock Springs' returners with 55 total tackles last year, including 24 solo tackles.

Toth was fifth, while senior Randon Gresham was sixth, junior Blaine Richards was eighth and senior Ross Brown was

However, returning players start with no preconceptions on Lenhardt's end, he said, and players may fit into different roles based on the needs the program has.

"I want to evaluate the players with a clean slate and see how they fit into what we will be trying to do," he said.

Bolts building on initial success

From the first day, Thunder Basin football has had little trouble letting the rest of Wyoming know who it was.

Now in its third year as a program, the new guys from Gillette have an established style, attitude and tradition – something that often takes much longer to establish at startup programs.

"We feel like we really took strides in establishing our identity and what it means to be a Bolt," coach Trent Pikula said. "Our kids have bought into who we are and where we want to be every year."

Last season, the 'Bolts reached the Class 4A semifinals but lost 14-7 at home to Sheridan.

From that, though, Thunder Basin enters 2019 both motivated and experienced.

The 'Bolts return a pair of all-state players in quarterback Mason Hamilton and wide receiver Blaine Allen, both seniors, and five all-conference picks.

Hamilton led Class 4A in almost every major passing category; he completed 199 of 326 passes for 2,592 yards and 31 touchdowns. He was the only quarterback in Wyoming, regardless of classification, to throw for more than 2,000 vards last season.

And Allen led 4A with 805 receiving yards, tied for the class lead with 12 receiving touchdowns and finished second among big-school receivers with 46 catches.

"These two make up a pretty nice tandem for us," Pikula said. "They both had incredible seasons as juniors and we hope to see that chemistry work again in 2019."

Moreover, Pikula said Hamilton and Allen have taken on leadership roles beyond the field "and have worked extremely hard this offseason to continue to get better."

The 'Bolts get back their top two rushers, as well. Senior Tyson Edwards was Thunder Basin's top rusher last year with 120 carries for 794 yards and 11 touchdowns, and junior Jaxon Pikula added 67 carries for 486 yards and five

That experience allows the 'Bolts to be more diverse – something opposing teams got a taste of last year and something Pikula said he wants to continue.

"As the year progressed last year, we really opened up our playbook and let the kids run with it," Pikula said.

However, the offensive line loses four starters, leaving senior center Alec Ehrhard as the lone returning starter on that unit.

Thunder Basin's defense does lose its top three tacklers. Senior Colton Randall, who was fourth on the team in defensive points, is Thunder Basin's top returning tackler and leads all returners with 53 total tackles and six tackles for loss. Carr was fifth in defensive points, senior Caleb Driskill was sixth and Richards tied for ninth.

Star Valley, Jackson could collide

Four questions to answer

Can anyone catch Star Valley? Probably not. The Braves return five all-state and seven all-conference players; both those totals are higher than any other 3A team in the state. They return key players on the line and in the backfield.

Who's the Braves' biggest threat?

Someone named the Broncs. Cody has four quality all-state players returning and has the most diversity and athleticism of any potential title-game opponent. Jackson, meanwhile, returns a ton of playmakers and is a legit title

Will the East Conference produce anyone who's a threat for the title? It's not likely. Douglas returns three all-staters and is the early favorite to win the conference, but the Bearcats will need something special to hang with the best from the West.

So, I should watch Star Valley every **chance I get?** If I have a chance to watch any 3A team this fall, I'm watching Jackson. Jeydon Cox is a dynamic rushing threat. Unofficially, only six Wyoming players have hit 2,000 rushing yards in a season, and Cox could be the first to make it happen twice.

Four key games

Jackson at Cody, Sept. 27. Both Bronc squads have visions of championships this season – and for good reason. The West Conference opener for both squads is key to fulfilling that vision, with the winner taking the

early lead for the conference title.

Torrington at Douglas, Oct. 4. Either Torrington or Douglas has won the East Conference championship every year since 2013. One way or another, the path to the East's top playoff seed still goes through this game.

Jackson at Star Valley, Oct. 11. One of the toughest things for Jackson this season is that the games that look like the Broncs' toughest – the ones against Cody and Star Valley – are both on the road. If Jackson can sneak out this road victory in a rivalry game, look out.

Star Valley at Cody, Oct. 18. This game between the Braves and Broncs has always been a key West Conference game. The past two years, though, the rivalry has taken on added meaning, as a pair of semifinal meetings has added a competitive spirit to a game that's already full of it.

The Braves and the Broncs have enough returning talent to be the preseason favorites. Several things could derail this matchup – maybe a Cody victory in the West Conference opener, maybe a surge from Douglas, maybe a playoff upset.

Bearcats have strength in numbers

The past two seasons have brought the Douglas Bearcats both frustration and an opportunity for reflection.

For the second straight season, Douglas finished 6-3 and lost in the first round of the Class 3A playoffs – the first time in coach Jay Rhoades' 13 seasons in Douglas that the Bearcats haven't won a playoff game in back-to-back seasons.

However, Rhoades said he was happy with the effort his players gave regardless of the outcome of the postseason games.

"I don't really feel like any season is not a success when our kids go out and play as hard as they can," Rhoades said. " ... When it's all said and done, you really just have to evaluate where vou're at as a program by the kids who are coming out of it. It can't be just

about whether you're going to the finals every year.

Consistently competitive. the Bearcats will have a good opportunity to capitalize on their effort and cultivate postseason success.

Douglas returns three allstate selections – triple the rest of the East Conference combined – and boasts one of the most formidable offensive and defensive lines in 3A.

The offensive line has four returning starters in seniors Edel Diaz-Jaime, Cody Pinkerton and Dawson Stinson and junior Kody Micke. Diaz-Jaime and Pinkerton were all-state selections last year.

"Returning four starting offensive linemen is always a huge plus," Rhoades said.

Senior quarterback A.J. Yeaman threw for 1,082 yards and 20 touchdowns last year, earn-

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ing all-state honors in the process. He also ran for 166 vards and seven touchdowns. With Douglas' top two rushers graduating, Yeaman is Douglas' top returning rusher.

The Bearcats will also have to break in a new receiving corps; Douglas doesn't return any receivers who had more than one catch last year.

"Last year being a first-year starter, a lot was kind of thrust up on him, but he had senior receivers and backs to rely on," Rhoades said. "So this year, it's going to be his turn to be relied

Junior Gabe Borman, who was third on the team in defensive points and second in total tackles last year, is Douglas' leading returning tackler. Pinkerton was fourth in defensive points and tops for Douglas in tackles for loss with six and fumble recoveries with

However, Borman and Pinkerton are the only two of Douglas' top nine tacklers to come back in 2019.

Rhoades said he's still pleased with the direction of the program and what's been built there in the past decadeplus. It's a method that's brought both stability and success: The Bearcats have had just one losing season since Rhoades took over in 2006.

"We stay pretty consistent with what we do," he said.

Tigers looking to take next step

The beginnings of a remarkable program turnaround began last season in Lander.

In coach John Scott's first season, the Tigers doubled their win total from the previous four seasons combined; the Tigers went 2-31 between 2014-17 but went 4-5 and qualified for the Class 3A playoffs in 2018. Ask Scott what changed, though, and it's tough to pinpoint.

"Not a lot changed," Scott said. "Much was in place from previous head coach. The seniors took the opportunity upon their shoulders and we prepared and played with a purpose. The seniors realized they had a one-time shot and made the most of it."

For the Tigers to continue their success in 2019, they'll need to rely on another group of seniors to preserve the momentum built in Scott's first year, much like last year's seniors.

However, Lander graduated all three of its all-state picks and four of its five all-conference choices, as senior John Fawson is Lander's only returning allconference player. **Key Players**

"I am sure we will have more than our share of growing pains," Scott said. "The few upperclassmen we have must provide to the younger players a sense of confidence that they are not alone out on the field. Young guys basically have to learn how to survive first. Then once they realize that they can compete, we move forward."

Scott refused to discuss any specific returning players and would not confirm if players who played key roles on last year's team as underclassmen were returning to the team.

However, juniors Jack Sweeney and Eli Mazurie led the Tigers in rushing last year. Sweeney carried 96 times for 401 yards, while Mazurie added 92 carries for 319 yards.

Senior Ty Massey had some reps at quarterback, finishing 17-of-31 for 221 yards. Fawson is Lander's top returning receiver; he was second last year with 19 catches for 248 yards.

Sweeney led Lander in defensive points last season and fronted the Tigers with 28 solo tackles. He's the only one of Lander's top five tacklers to return, as only two of Lander's top 10 defensive players are anticipated back for 2019. Mazurie tied for sixth in defensive points, while Fawson was 11th.

Scott – a former head coach at Black Hills State who's also led Gillette, Kemmerer and Tongue River to either championships or championship-game appearances – said the rebuilding process at Lander has bresembled his other coaching efforts.

"It is all the same," Scott said. "We go through almost exactly the same scenarios. Unlike the game of Monopoly, there is no 'Advance to Go.' We are enduring and battling through the same issues."

Offseason regimen could pay off

Riverton finished 0-9 last year – just the program's second winless season since 1932.

Following that finish, coach Pat Patterson used the lessons learned to bring the Wolverines, and everyone associated with the program, to an awakening.

"You've got to work in the offseason," Patterson said. "Last year we took 18 kids to camp, and we didn't have great turnout for our summer weights. So at the end of the season, I confronted the parents and said, 'This is what happens when we don't do what we need to do to get better in the offseason."

This year, the Wolverines took 40 players to summer camps, about two-thirds of their roster. Weight room attendance is up. Seniors have been vocal leaders.

"We've had a much better summer," Patterson said. " ... We've got a different mentality."

Patterson said he's hopeful the changes will pay off this fall, turning close losses into victories

 Riverton lost two conference games by three points apiece and another by eight.

Coming into 2019, the Wolverines have some holes to fill; Riverton graduated its top two rushers, its quarterback and its top receiver. However, the team still returns more than half its starters and a huge chunk of contributors on defense, including four of its top five tacklers.

Seniors Cade Werbelow and Zane Taylor, both all-conference choices last year, and junior Brock Hinkle were Riverton's top three players in defensive points last year. Werbelow led the Wolverines with 66 total tackles, 20 solo. Hinkle had 36 total tackles while Taylor and senior Blake Rumery-Rico had 35 apiece.

Senior Dillon Lange was eighth in defensive points and had 26 total tackles, while juniors Broden Mathes and Kaden Gautenbein each added more than 20 total tackles last year.

Patterson said that while the returners notched lots of tackles

in 2018, his hope is for those tallies to go down.

"We don't want to be on the field. Defensively, we want to be three and out," he said. "... That's just something we haven't been very good at."

Offensively, Patterson said the Wolverines don't have much speed but do have talented linemen and depth at running back, leading to a change in offensive philosophy.

"Where we've been more of a run-and-gun team, we're going to be more ground-and-pound," Patterson said.

Hinkle, who ran 46 times for 113 yards in 2018, is the team's leading returning rusher, and Werbelow, Rumery-Rico and senior Cade Campbell will also see time in the backfield. Junior Treyson Draper, who caught seven passes for 122 yards, is the leading returning receiver.

Outlaws continue building process

When Clayton McSpadden looks back at his first year as Rawlins' head coach, he sees bright spots.

All too often, though, those bright spots are overshadowed by the Outlaws' 2-6 record.

"If you win everything as a new coach your first year, I'm not sure if it's a good omen or a bad one," McSpadden said.

Although McSpadden said he wanted to send last year's seniors out with more success, the 2018 season could eventually be seen as the one that helped put Rawlins on a path to more success.

This year, the Outlaws start ahead of where they were last year. Multiple factors work into that: McSpadden and the other Rawlins coaches



had more opportunities for offseason work, including camps and individual work; the team will bring back 15 seniors; two of those seniors, Kadin Forney and Kie Foster, are returning all-conference choices; and maybe most importantly, Rawlins installed new weight room equipment this summer, prompting a resurgence in offseason weight training.

"Kids have been pumping iron like crazy," Mc-Spadden said. "It's everything a coach dreams of." McSpadden said he will rely on those 15 seniors to lead the Outlaws, leading a team of about

50 total players.

Forney was Rawlins' No. 2 rusher a year ago, running 103 times for 472 yards. Senior Kenny Raymond also returns in the backfield; he ran 37

times for 110 yards last year.

The Outlaws will need to fill the quarterback spot, but McSpadden said senior Quinten Romero should fill that position. Foster and senior Victor Fonseca will provide experience on the offensive and defensive lines.

Forney is also Rawlins' top returning receiver; with the Outlaws' top two receivers from last year graduated, Forney's three catches for 43 yards last season is enough to give him that honor.

The Trailblazers will have a new coach and almost an entirely new lineup; however. new head coach Russell Stienmetz has spent 12 years on the Trailblazers' staff as an assistant, easing the transition into

"We know what the expectations of the program are and we will strive to keep that reputation going," Stienmetz said. "I am fortunate to have this group of (coaches) around me during the season. I trust and believe in my assistant coaches to demand a great deal from the players, (and) that will in turn keep the program at or near the

top."

The players on the field will be almost completely new, though. Torrington graduated all eight of its all-state choices, and seniors Corbin Harris and

Tyler Schaub are the lone holdovers from 11 all-conference picks. Gone from 2018 are Torrington's top five rushers, its quarterback, its top six receivers and its top nine tack-

When Stienmetz looks at his team, he sees some bright spots - namely an offensive line that returns three starters.

"The experience is in the offensive line and this is where we will build from," Stienmetz said.

"This is a good place to build from as I believe if we are going to be successful, then our line needs to be good and we have to establish a running game."

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Up front, the 'Blazers bring

back Harris, Schaub and junior Rhiley Grubbs on the offensive line. Senior Sam Firminhac will likely be called on to lead the team at quarterback, and a sophomore class that's raw but talented could be asked to fill other spots.

Stienmetz said senior tight end/linebacker Jackson Jones and junior lineman Gabe Mitchell will help add experience and depth to the roster.

"Our skill players are going to be inexperienced, but us coaches have talked about how simplicity will be significant for the growth of the players," Stienmetz said. "Once these players get some confidence, they should be ready for some challenges."

The transition on defense will be eased by Stienmetz, who spent nine years as the defensive coordinator. The Trailblazers led Class 3A in total defense, allowing only 235.4 yards per game, but only two starters return from that unit.

Harris is Torrington's leading returning tackler. He was 10th on the squad in defensive points and sixth in tackles with 43. Grubbs, who had 31 tackles last year, is the only other player on the team to have more than 10 total tackles last

piecing together the elements not only for a breakthrough season, but also for a breakthrough program.

Entering his third season as head coach, Ryan Utterback is excited to see what his returners can do with both experience in his system and experience on the field.

"I think having the same things in place for a while and knowing what to expect is something that's definitely helping the program," Utterback said.

Last year, Worland qualified for the playoffs for the second consecutive year. And for the second consecutive year, the Warriors were outmatched by a conference champion in the first round of the playoffs, as eventual Class 3A champion Star Valley ended Worland's season with a 48-0 shutout in the first round last year.

However, the Warriors return seven starters on both offense and defense. The defense in particular is one of 3A's most experienced, boosting Worland's excitement for 2019.

Moreover. Utterback said the Warriors can add, change, remove or rework bits of their approach thanks to the continuity that already exists in the program, something that was tougher to do prior to this year.

Two of Worland's top three receivers also come back in senior Luke Mortimer (13 catches, 172 yards) and Mercado (eight catches, 150 yards). Up front, Worland doesn't

have much size or experience, but senior Brody Hernandez returns as a starter in that unit, and "we've got some good athletic

guys we can put in there," Utterback said. On defense, the Warriors get

back a huge group, with eight of the team's top nine tacklers scheduled to come back. That group is fronted by sen-

ior Chase "Tudge" Hofmann, who was second on the squad with 80 total tackles last year. Mercado led the squad with

three interceptions and three pass break-ups and added 41 tackles.

In addition, Mortimer, Sanford and Hernandez will join seniors Jaime Luna, Domanic Hartley, Brandon Haun and Regan Schmeltzer and junior Luke Goncalves to form a solid returning group. Each of these returners had at least 20 tackles last season.

"It's nice when you have guys who have been there a number of years and know the system," Utterback said.

Broncs have seasoned group

This year, the Cody football eam has what every program wants year in and year out.

Success usually happens when talented, hard-working seniors lead the squad, and that's exactly what the Broncs have this fall. Cody returns four senior allstate players – second only to Star Valley in Class 3A. Beyond those four, the Broncs have a senior class that's not only deep but has also developed good chemistry.

"They have good numbers and have played together for a long time," McFadden said. "They are multi-sport kids that work year-round to be better athletes and leaders."

Those returners include the four all-state choices from a year ago: Charlie Beaudrie, Tristan Blatt, Keith Conner and Jeff Williams. In addition, seniors Devon Brown and Hunter Havs were all-conference picks, and seniors like running back/linebacker Matt Sandoval and lineman Duncan Radakovich add depth and expertise.

Together, McFadden said the Broncs have good team speed and depth at several positions, although several offensive linemen will be enthusiastic but, early in the season, will be untested.

McFadden said the Broncs will "have some very talented (linemen) waiting for their chance to step it up."

Beaudrie is the Broncs' main offensive threat. He led the team with 134 carries, 960 rushing vards and 16 rushing touchdowns. He also tied for the team lead in catches with 15 while piling up 212 receiving yards.

"He is a threat to score any

time he touches the ball," Mc-Fadden said.

Hays, who McFadden called "a coach on the field," completed 65 passes for 874 yards and eight touchdowns last year, and Blatt led Cody in receiving yards with 243 on 11 catches.

Together, McFadden said Hays' experience will allow for an expanded passing game that can take pressure off Beaudrie and the other running backs.

Senior Matt Sandoval leads a deep crew of returners on defense that returns four of its top five tacklers – a fact not lost on McFadden.

"It allows us to play faster and to get deeper into our playbook," he said. "These kids are very versatile and athletic."

As a unit, the Broncs return seven defensive starters, including all of their linebackers and most of their defensive backs.

Sandoval was second on the team in defensive points and notched 71 total tackles, including a team-high 33 solo tackles.

Connor added 67 tackles and tied for the team lead in tackles for loss (eight), sacks (four) and fumble recoveries (two).

Beaudrie was fourth for Cody in defensive points and was second with 29 solo tackles, while senior Paul Lovera was fifth.

Blatt was sixth, Williams ninth and Radakovich was 10th in defensive points, all racking up at least 40 points.

New coach to lead Red Devils

A football season tends to be full of peaks and valleys, but Evanston's 2018 season was basically one big peak followed by one big valley.

Evanston started 5-0 but finished 0-3, compiling an overall mark of 6-4. The 2019 season will be one of transition, as the program looks to reinvent itself with a new coach, a new offensive philosophy and a cadre of up-andcoming players all looking to bring the program out of the vallev that ended last season.

New head coach Jim Burton brings 13 years of coaching experience, including the past three years as the freshman team's head coach at Evanston.

"It has always been a goal to head coach high school football," Burton said. "The players here are hardworking and very passionate about the game. I am excited to be a part of that."

Entering 2019, Evanston has work to do. The Red Devils graduated all seven of their all-conference choices. They also lost their top six rushers, their top two re-



ceivers and seven of their top 10 tacklers.

Consequently, Burton said the team he inherits will be "very young on both sides of the ball."

"The younger group is talented, but needs to come together and work hard to fill some big shoes," Burton said.

The biggest change Burton brings to the Red Devils comes on offense, where the team will change to a triple option offense, one that fits small, but tough, offensive linemen.

"We have had some time to work on it," Burton said. "It'll be a big adjustment and take some time. The system fits the type of lineman that we have year in and out. ... Players are getting more excited about it as we go.

Senior David Baxter took

for Evanston last year, finishing with 242 passing yards and three touchdowns. However, Burton said the Red Devils will enter fall camp with open competition for the quarterback spot between Baxter, junior Jagger Mitchell and sophomore Jaxon Moore.

The top returning receiver is senior Rigden Wagstaff, who was third for Evanston in 2018 with eight catches for 75 yards. Senior Jesus Quintano returns as a key leader on the offensive line.

Burton enters 2019 excited for the potential he sees in the defense. The Red Devils return seven players who saw time as a starter on that side of the ball.

Wagstaff was second for Evanston in defensive points, finishing with 61 total tackles and five tackles for loss.

Mitchell was sixth and senior lineman Bryson Davis eighth in defensive points last season for the Red Devils.

"(The) offseason is progressing and looks good, but (we) can always improve," Burton said.

The 2019 version of the Green River Wolves will have a new look – both by design and by necessity.

After finishing the 2018 season as the only team in Class 3A with more passing yards than rushing yards on offense, coach Marty Wrage said one of his goals for this season is to nudge the Wolves in the direction of a more ground-based attack.

While the passing game gave Green River balance in 2018, it also didn't hide inefficiency in the running game. Consequently, Green River finished without a playoff victory for the first time in three years. Beyond that, at 2-6, the Wolves didn't even qualify for the postseason.

Re-establishing the running game is now one of Wrage's priorities for 2019.

He noted that the Wolves will try to put 70-75% of their offense into the running game.

Last year, the Wolves' playcalling almost matched that ratio - they were about 65 percent running plays to 35 percent passing plays – but the passing game gained 123.8 yards per game to the rushing game's 115.6. Green River finished 11th of

the 12-team Class 3A in rushing last season.

"We (will) look to be more dynamic on offense," Wrage said. " ... We return four varsity running backs. We return an athletic receiving crew. (The) offensive line is developing depth and will be improved.

The Wolves lost five all-conference players to graduation, but they do return six players with starting experience on both offense and defense.

Junior James King took the reins at running back last year and led the Wolves with 474 rushing yards.

Green River will need to find a new quarterback, and Wrage said the competition right now is between junior Jachob Fuss and sophomore Davis Wrage. However, the Wolves return one of their top receivers in junior Seth White, who had 308 receiving yards on a team-high 22 catches

Meanwhile, Wrage said the defense will need to continue to work on defending the run – the Wolves finished eighth in 3A in rushing yards allowed per game - but the experience returning on that side of the ball should help Green River improve its defensive output.

"On defense, we have to fill some spots but hopefully depth with be an advantage," Wrage

The Wolves do return a solid core of defensive contributors, including two of their top four tacklers from last year in King and senior Payton Tucker. Tucker was second on the team in total tackles last year with 57 and led the squad with seven tackles for loss. King was third in tackles.

Seniors Thomas Harvey, Riese Allison and Tayler Jensen and junior Gabe Burdette also all finished among Green River's top 12 tacklers last year.

Broncs have head of steam

After going 0-9 in 2017 – and entering 2018 on a 15-game losing streak – the Jackson Broncs turned it around in 2018.

And how.

Jackson finished 8-3 in 2018. finishing second in the Class 3A West Conference and winning a playoff game for the first time since 2015.

Although the season ended with a 22-21 loss to Torrington in the 3A semifinals, coach David Joyce said the foundation of work ethic and toughness laid in 2017 paid off in 2018.

"When you do that, you lose a lot of kids that first year," Joyce said. "(In 2017) we had 19 kids.

... But the kids who were there were the ones who bought into the standard. The foundation is laid. and over time they can grow and the system can grow."

The Brones ran for 321.2 yards per game and gained 439.4 yards per game, both tops in Class 3A. The defense, meanwhile, allowed only 243.7 ypg, third-best in 3A.

The Broncs lost four of their five all-state players, but the one returner – senior running back

Jeydon Cox – has teams keeping an eye on the Broncs.

Cox ran 299 times for 2.257 yards and 21 touchdowns; his total carries and vards gained were tops in 11-man regardless of classification in Wyoming last year. Cox was also Jackson's No. 2 receiver, catching 22 passes for 253 yards.

'He's probably the best player in the state," Joyce said. " ... Having a kid like that back just enhances everybody else's ability to have opportunities."

Cox is surrounded by other playmakers on offense, too.

Senior Kirby Castagno – an all-conference pick – ran 103 times for 519 yards and 10 touchdowns, good for second on the team in all categories. He also

snagged 17 passes for 231 yards.

Senior Peter Goettler was Jackson's top receiver last year, grabbing 28 passes for 424 yards and five touchdowns. And senior quarterback Pearson Evans, who threw for 1,179 yards and 10 touchdowns while chipping in 244 rushing yards, also returns.

"We'll have a lot of experienced players on the field, which is always a positive," Joyce said.

The defense returns eight players who started at some point last season. Castagno is Jackson's leading returning tackler; he was second on the squad in defensive points and total tackles last season. Senior A.J. McCool was third, while sophomore Colter Dawson was seventh, Goettler was eighth and Cox was ninth. Goettler led Jackson with four interceptions in 2018.

'We are a defensive football program through and through, and we don't get too cute," Joyce said. "We want the other team to have to physically beat us."

For the rest of Class 3A, that's becoming tougher and tougher to do to Jackson.

The Braves have rolled up three championships in four seasons and four consecutive double-digit-victory seasons.

With five returning all-state selections, more than any other program in Class 3A, the Braves enter 2019 ready to add to their program's tradition.

"This senior class has been among the most committed groups I've ever been around since they were coming out of middle school," coach McKay Young said. "They've looked forward to this fall for a long time."

They're building on a tradition that's been rolling strong through the back half of the 2010s. The 2018 chapter showed the Braves overcoming losses in two of its first three games to out-of-state opponents to roll to nine straight victories to close the season. In the playoffs, the Braves won by scores of 48-0, 33-0 and 35-14.

"The grit of last year's team was unlike any other group I've coached," Young said. "They never gave up on their goals no matter the adversity."

And with five returning allstate selections in seniors R.J. Cazier, Trent Clark, Chase Merrell, Branden McDonald and Parker Merritt, as well as allconference returnees in senior David Castillo and junior Brant Nelson, Star Valley is ready to continue its success.

On offense, the discussion be-

Cazier benefited from that last year, carrying 209 times for 1,212 yards and 20 touchdowns. while Castillo added 93 carries for 542 yards. Nelson completed 34 passes for 608 yards and nine touchdowns. Senior Dean Shaw

started at quarterback but was injured early in the season; he returned in time for the playoffs and finished with 15 completions for 263 yards.

Young said both Nelson and Shaw will play this year, and he said he has faith in both to run the offense.

Merrell was the Braves' top receiver, catching 23 passes for 496 yards and seven touchdowns, all by far team highs.



Four questions to answer

Was Buffalo's championship the start of a new 2A dynasty? Possibly. The Bison return five all-state players from last year's title team, setting them up well for a repeat. If that momentum can keep building, the Bison could be the team to beat in 2020, too.

Who's Buffalo's biggest threat? Mountain View. Just like Buffalo, Mountain View returns five all-state players. And like Buffalo, Mountain View has seen a ton of success in the postseason recently. Mountain View is the favorite in the 2A West.

Will anyone else challenge for a championship? Probably not. Mountain View and Buffalo return five all-state players apiece; the rest of 2A, combined, has four (Burns' Boe Clayson, Kemmerer's A.Q. Martinez, Moorcroft's Rowdy Pfeil and Thermopolis' Logan Cole). The talent gap between Buffalo and Mountain View and the rest of 2A is pretty wide.

Will the West Conference have as much parity in the middle as it did last year? Almost certainly. With basically every team (outside of Mountain View) returning similar talent at similar levels, the rest of the West appears to be a crapshoot, one that will be decided in tight games week after week.

Four key games

Pinedale at Kemmerer, Sept. 20. With the parity on display in the West Conference last

year, this Week 3 game will tell us a lot about the makeup of a tumultuous West Conference.

Buffalo at Burns, Sept. 20. The Bison's first road conference game of 2019 will be in eastern Laramie County against an up-andcoming Burns squad. A Buffalo victory here will be key in a repeat attempt.

Greybull at Mountain View, Oct 25. These two teams have been in the West Conference's top three finishers every season since 2014. A Week 8 showdown could determine the conference champion again this year.

Thermopolis at Burns, Oct. 25. Both teams are ready to make leaps up the East Conference standings this season. If they both capitalize on that potential through the season, this Week 8 meeting could be absolutely huge

Champs have returning firepower

To everyone else in Class 2A, it must have looked like Buffalo pushed the Staples "EASY"

The Bison romped in their first year in Class 2A, winning all but one game by double digits and losing only to Class 3A Douglas in the season opener. A 43-18 victory against Mountain View gave Buffalo its sixth state title and its first since 2005.

To Buffalo, though, the title was the product of hard work, a trend coach Rob Hammond said has continued into offseason preparation for 2019.

"I think that they have stayed hungry and they've stayed motivated," Hammond said. "We've talked every single year that we have to start every year brand new.

Consequently, Hammond said the Bison have had "great turnout in the weight room, (and) our numbers have been higher than ever in our summer camps. We even had an extra camp. ... Kids are just excited and proud to be a part of the football team."

The Bison return five all-state players – matched by Mountain View for the most in 2A – in seniors Dawson Hatch, Hunter Pope, Rowen Ruby and Nathan Swanston and junior Hyrum Hatch.

Hammond said the all-state returners set an example for the rest of the team to follow through hard work, leadership and confidence.

"If you want to be successful, this is the path vou have to take." he said.

The rushing game is in good hands. Ruby led Buffalo with 1,072 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns. Also, the entire starting offensive line returns with Swanston, Pope, senior Austyn Carder, and senior Anthony Graves – who missed almost all of last season due to injury but who Hammond said might be Buffalo's best player – leading the charge

"We're pretty intact there," Hammond said of his linemen. "They understand our schemes and they've played together."

That experience could shift the Bison's offensive approach this year to more of what Hammond called "old-fashioned Bison football" that emphasizes the running game, with Ruby earning touches in different ways depending on who emerges as Buffalo's quarterback.

Additionally, the Bison they lost four of their top five receivers to graduation. Dawson Hatch had 21 catches for 378 yards and six touchdowns – second for the team in all categories.



Yes, the double wing is staying at Glenrock.

New head coach Ryan Collier isn't removing the characteristic that makes Glenrock unique – a double wing offense that has its roots in the community's youth football programs.

Although Collier, who spent six years as an assistant with the Herders before ascending to the top spot, will institute some changes, "for most people, they won't even notice the change," he said. The system has worked.

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

Chauncey Jenerou (21 tackles) the only other returner to tally any more than 15 tackles last season.

New coach likes what he's inherited

When Ryan Visser started investigating the head coach opening at Big Piney, well before he interviewed for or accepted the position, he figured out quickly that the Punchers were not part of a program in disarray.

Visser, who was an assistant coach at Preston, Idaho, for six years, learned quickly that Big Piney had a solid foundation, both physically and culturally.

He said building culture is "a huge part of building a high school program. ... It's a lot easier when there's some kind of culture actually built."

The Punchers are coming off back-to-back winning seasons, something that hasn't happened in the program since the 2006 and 2007 seasons. Visser also was impressed by Big Piney's facilities, including weight room equipment and a recently upgraded stadium and turf that helped show both investment and commitment from the community and from administrators. Visser also said he came away with a good feeling after conversations with people in the school and community.

Even without a new coach, Big Piney would have been in a time of transition: Big Piney loses all three of its all-state selections and all but one of its seven all-conference picks from 2018. Junior quarterback Kaden Raza is the lone all-conference returner.

However, Raza will be a key cog in Visser's offensive approach, which will rely on spread formations.

"My objective every week is to stretch the defense both vertically and horizontally and make them have to cover every blade of grass," Visser said. "It's a scheme that underutilized at this level sometimes.

... If you've got a quarterback, and we do, then it puts a lot of stress on a defense.'

Raza threw for 649 yards

and nine touchdowns last season. By default, Raza is also Big Piney's leading returning rusher with his 60 yards from last year, as the Punchers graduated their top three rushers from 2018.

Senior Teagan Elliott, who was fourth on the squad with six catches for 65 yards, is the Punchers' top returning receiver.

Junior center Wyatt Mager will help lead the offensive line, Visser said.

Defensively, Visser said the Punchers will run a base 4-3, "but it's much more complicated than that."

Senior Bryan Pluid is Big Piney's top returning tackler; he was fourth for the Punchers in defensive points in 2018. Junior lineman Cam Thomas was fifth and is the team's leading returner in tackles for loss with five. They're the only two of Big Piney's top eight tacklers returning.

Elliott was ninth and led Big Piney with four interceptions last year, while junior Tayton Wing was 10th. Both topped 60 defensive points for the season.

Buffaloes have unfinished task

Greybull finished 2018 feeling closer to a state title than its finish showed.

That finish - a 21-14 loss to Wheatland in the Class 2A quarterfinals – came with several key contributors sidelined due to injury and an offense that wasn't quite complete.

The Buffaloes and coach Eli Moody are ready to atone for that with "a new look, a new feel and a new swagger" for 2019, Moody said.

"I believe we have the tools to take our game to that next step," Moody said. "We lost some of our big-name kids that everyone planned for, but we still have plenty of weapons and are getting some key (players) back from injury that will boost the team."

Seniors Felipe Gaytan and Ben Kraft were all-conference selections last year. However, they both finished 2018 on the sidelines with injury

They weren't alone, as senior lineman Ethan Dalin (who missed the last half of the year) and senior tight end/defensive end Carlos Garay (who missed the entire season) also feel victim to injuries.

All four are back this year – and all four are healthy. Their returns will help bolster a team that returns six starters on both offense and defense but also has significant gaps to fill.

On offense, Greybull graduated its quarterback, its top two rushers and most of its offensive

highs last year – and he also ran 34 times for 174 yards and two touchdowns

Senior Elian Davila added 12 catches for 247 yards and four scores, while Gaytan chipped in nine catches for 111 yards; however, Gaytan will likely move to quarterback this season, Moody

While the offense had a good bit of diversity, Moody said in his second season as head coach, the Buffaloes should have more chances to present different looks and keep opposing defenses

"It took us a lot of the season to get the bases of my offense down, so we didn't have a lot of

time to get into the more advanced aspects of it," Moody said "Now with a large number of the kids still on the team, we can dive deep into that stuff, the misdirection, setting up plays better, even how we are lining up."

Rebuilding the defense will be more challenging.

The Buffaloes graduated their top six tacklers. Davila is the team's top returning defensive player: he was seventh in defensive points and led Greybull with four interceptions and eight pass break-ups.

Kraft was eighth and notched 41 total tackles, including four tackles for loss, while Bottom was ninth and Gaytan was 10th.

Rangers relying on new leaders

Surely and consistently, the breakthroughs keep happening for the Kemmerer football program.

The Rangers finished 3-5 and reached the playoffs last season – a big step for a program that had just one victory from 2013-17 and hadn't made the playoffs since 2012.

Now, with a group of streak-breaking seniors gone, the question for coach Bart Jernigan becomes finding a way to repeat success rather than trying to instigate it.

"Qualifying for the playoffs last year meant a whole lot to this program," Jernigan said. "We knew as a coaching staff that the talent was there to do so, but the question of getting our young men to believe that."

With the belief of success now in place, Jernigan said upcoming players have a renewed vigor, but the program still has room to grow.

"(A playoff berth) had been a long time for this team and town," Jernigan said. "Going forward, our boys have a focus on making the playoffs perennially. That is the new expectation and belief in Kemmerer."

This year's team will be younger, but "scrappy and resilient," Jernigan said. Junior A.Q. Martinez was an all-state choice last year and is the only returning all-state choice in the West Conference outside of Mountain View. Senior Dawson Schramm was an all-conference choice.

Jernigan said rebuilding the defense will be a priority, as the Rangers lost their top six tacklers to graduation. Senior Colter Brunski, who had 50 defensive points and 27 total tackles last year, is Kemmerer's top returning tackler.

Schramm was ninth and Martinez 10th in defensive points for Kemmerer last year. They tied for the team

lead with two interceptions apiece.

"The hallmark of last year's team was the defense," Jernigan said. "We have to be ready to step in and find ways to get to the ball. Our youngsters have some passion and grit."

On offense, both Martinez and Schramm will be key, with Martinez leading the rushing game and Schramm the passing game. Martinez led Kemmerer with 167 rushes for 795 yards and six touchdowns, while Schramm ran for 118 yards and threw for 196.

"We have to be able to pass the ball a little better to maximize our offensive efficiency," Jernigan said.

Even with some success and a playoff berth now a reality instead of a dream, Jernigan said his hopes for the program remain, at their core, the same as when he took over in 2017.

"Last season does not necessarily change my expectations for our players or program," Jernigan said. "
... At its heart, my expectation is that our players play hard and compete well while striving to maximize what we have both on and off the field."

New coach bleeds Bulldog blue

When victories don't happen as often as they used to, confidence doesn't come naturally.

The Lovell Bulldogs are living that fact right now.

In 2018, the Bulldogs produced just one victory, their lowest single-season total since going 1-6 in 1996. And the program missed the playoffs for the second time in three years.

New head coach Nicc Crosby will be Lovell's third head coach in three seasons, but he brings with him a special connection to Lovell – it's his hometown.

"It's an honor, privilege, and an incredible responsibility to be coaching at my alma mater," Crosby said. "I followed Lovell athletics while I was away from home, and I always felt a sense of pride as I observed their accomplishments."

With that, he said his top priority for rebuilding the Bulldogs is to rebuild confidence.

"I don't think these kids realize how good they can be yet," he said. "When things aren't going well, one of the first things players struggle with is confidence. It has been great to watch that confidence level grow in my short time with this group."

Crosby said he plans on adopting a physical style that will give players a chance to showcase their speed – something the Bulldogs have this year. The defense will be simplified to allow players to "play fast."

Crosby started working with Lovell's players in early June.

"I have been quite pleased with the participation and commitment level of the players," he said. "They have been more than willing to put in the required work to turn things around in our program."

Lovell graduated its three all-conference picks but returns five starters on both offense and defense. Junior C.J. Lindsay led Lovell with 102 carries for 443 yards and five scores. Seniors Hunter Harris and Thomas Hinckley also contributed significantly to the ground game, with

Harris carrying 43 times for 192 yards and Hinckley 48 times for 123 yards.

Junior Tyler Nichols saw some time at quarterback last season, completing 15 passes for 192 yards. The Bulldogs lost their top three receivers, with Lindsay and junior Aden Mayes, who each had 60 receiving yards last year, returning as the team's top returning pass-catchers.

Lovell also returns a significant number of key defensive players. Harris was second and Nichols tied for third in defensive points last season.

Sophomore Quinn Lindsay was fifth, senior Quinton Hecker seventh, Hinckley 10th, C.J. Lindsay 11th and Mayes 12th in defensive points. Quinn Lindsay led Lovell with three sacks.

Crosby also noted that several other seniors, including line-backer Coy Trainor, lineman Jaxson Jasso and defensive back Zane Hitz, have been key players and leaders in offseason preparation

Eagles will be numbers challenged

The scoreboard hasn't always flickered in favor of Lyman the past couple seasons.

The Eagles finished 2-6 last season and missed the playoffs for the second consecutive year, the first time that's happened in the seven years that Dale Anderson has been Lyman's head coach.

However, Anderson said the scores – while important – aren't a reflection of how hard his players worked or how far they've come.

"As coaches, you look for successes in different ways," Anderson said. "You might not always be winning games, but you can see improvement and focus on their effort. ... The wins come when you do the right things the right way."

This year, Lyman faces a challenge similar to squads of the past couple years – competing in the Class 2A West Conference with fewer players than typical. Anderson said he anticipates about 25 players to come out this fall, including about five or six seniors.

"That (senior) experience is invaluable," he said. " ... They understand what we're trying to accomplish."

However, Brendan Martin, who led the team in rushing yards and defensive points last year, left Lyman over the summer, leaving a bigger gap to fill than the Eagles had anticipated after last season.

Senior quarterback Hagen Lamoreaux had 120 carries for 467 yards and five touchdowns "We just find some ways to do the same things to take advantage of the kids we have."

Brewer and Lamoreaux split time at quarterback but combined for only 10 completions and 157 passing yards in Lyman's run-heavy offense. Senior Blake Palmer was the main target in that area of the offense, catching five passes for 109 yards and three touchdowns.

"We get a lot of our skill kids back, and a couple of them have started even since they were freshmen," Anderson said.

"... We have some experience there, and some kids that have put in some time and done some things, so I think that'll be something we can build on.

"It does help to have kids like that that know what we're trying to accomplish and we're not having to reteach everything."

However, the offensive line is inexperienced, with junior Hansen Bradshaw, the Eagles' only returning all-conference pick and the only returning starter on the offensive line, providing the most experience.

"That'll be one of the big keys for us this year, is to put a decent offensive line in front of some pretty good skill kids," Anderson said.

Lamoreaux and Brewer were also among Lyman's top five defensive players last year Brewer had 32 tackles and a team-high three sacks, while Lamoreaux had 30 tackles.

Bradshaw, Palmer and senior Hunter Gines also contributed on defense last season, each notching at least 20 tackles.



"It was good to go to a highly competitive camp versus a lot of highly competitive teams," Cundall said.



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

Four questions to answer

What makes Big Horn the favorite again? Returning firepower. No other team returns what Big Horn returns this fall. The six returning all-state players is the highest number in the state regardless of classification.

Who's most likely to challenge Big Horn for the top spot? Is "pick 'em" an option? Several squads return key chunks of players, including Upton-Sundance, Pine Bluffs and Lusk from the East and Cokeville, Rocky Mountain and Shoshoni from the West. They're all capable of pulling off a first-round playoff victory given the right circumstances.

What was that about Lusk? The Tigers return four of their five all-conference choices from last year, including a pair of all-staters in senior Damien Molzahn and junior Drake Lamp. After missing the playoffs last year thanks to a little bad luck in a coin flip, Lusk should be a contender this year.

What about the West Conference? With Saratoga playing six-man and Wyoming Indian playing a patchwork schedule, four teams are eligible for the four playoff spots out of the West - not exactly conditions conducive to creating playoff-ready, tested squads.

Four key games

Big Horn at Upton-Sundance, Sept. 27. This showdown between the Patriots and the Rams is always key – and the Rams have always had the upper hand. Big Horn is 2-0

Rams have tough act to follow

When the 2019 season starts, every team in Class 1A 11-man will look at Big Horn as the pacesetter.

Big Horn is coming off one of the most dominant seasons not only in school history, but in state history. The Rams won every game last year by at least 21 points and won every playoff game by at least 53. They set all-time 11-man state records for most points (577) and most average points (52.45).

But for coach Kirk McLaughlin, and for the Rams, last year's title and the respect it brings only goes as far as the next game.

"Last year was a special year, but we need to stay focused on the present and do what we have to do to reach the success levels that our seniors and leaders wish to accomplish," McLaughlin said.

From last year's title team, six all-state choices return – seniors Cutler Bradshaw, Quinn McCafferty, Kyler Ostler, Will Pelissier and Nolan Rader and junior Car-

"Day one will be great because we have a good number of returning players that can help our young players learn our schemes, drills, and our culture," McLaughlin said. "Our seniors are also aware of what it takes to get to the top."

The Rams run a diverse offense; they led Class 1A 11-man in both rushing yards (262.8) and passing yards (168) per game last year.

McCafferty led the classification with 1,731 passing yards, tossing 27 touchdowns to just three interceptions.

"Knowing we have someone special like Quinn (at quarter-back) can really open the door to many different offensive schemes and possibilities," McLaughlin said.

Pelissier is Big Horn's top returning rusher and receiver. He was second on the team last year with 653 yards and 10 touchdowns on the ground; he was also No. 2 on the team in receiv-

ing yards (429) and catches (20). Bates added 488 rushing

yards and six TDs, while McCafferty contributed 140 yards and five touchdowns. Bates was also third on the team with 255 receiving yards and second with six receiving touchdowns.

The defense doesn't have quite the returning experience as the offense, as Bradshaw is the only one of Big Horn's top six tacklers back. Bradshaw was second for Big Horn in defensive points last season, finishing with 92 total tackles and a team-high 67 assisted tackles.

Ostler was seventh, Pelissier eight, McCafferty ninth and Rader 11th in defensive points for the Rams last season.

Big Horn enters 2019 without the depth it had last year. With that, the Rams still have unanswered questions about several spots.

"This year we will be asking a lot of players to step up and fill positions left open by graduating seniors," McLaughlin said.

The Hornets have put together three consecutive winning seasons, the first time the program has had that many consecutive above .500 finishes since garnering nine consecutive winning seasons from 1963-71.

And although last year's 6-4 finish wasn't the same as winning a state championship, as the Hornets did in both 2016 and 2017, Pine Bluffs showed it plans on remaining competitive for years to come.

"As a program we've really keyed on developing our young players into guys that can be successful at the varsity level," coach Will Gray said. "We've had good numbers, which has essentially allowed us to redshirt our freshmen and use practice time to focus on fundamentals and specifics of our schemes without having to throw them into varsity roles that they are not ready for."

Last season, Pine Bluffs started 4-0, but three consecutive losses to Big Horn, Burns and Upton-Sundance derailed conference championship hopes.

Gray said the difference was simple: The Hornets didn't run the ball well and didn't tackle well down the stretch.

"The kids know we weren't good (in those areas), and they want to fix it," he said.

Senior Brian Steger is Pine Bluffs' only returning all-state player from a team that reached the Class 1A 11-man semifinals, but senior Donte Jacobsen joined Steger on the all-conference team.

Jacobsen returns as the Hornets' quarterback; he completed 87 of 162 passes for 1,281 yards and 12 touchdowns last season. However, three of Pine Bluffs' top four receivers graduated, leaving senior

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Justus Golding (14 catches, 181 yards in 2018) as the Hornets' top returning receiving threat.

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Steger was Pine Bluffs' No. 2 rusher last year, running 129 times for 517 yards and six touchdowns. However, Gray said Steger – as well as senior Kyle Thurin – volunteered to move to the offensive.

"They are team-first guys who want to do everything they can to be successful as a program," Gray said. "We struggled to run the ball against good teams last fall and that has been a focus for us this offseason. We were able to throw the ball consistently for the most part, but we have to fix out run game to be successful late in the season."

Thurin is the only one of Pine Bluffs' top five tacklers to return this fall. Thurin was No. 3 on the team in total tackles and led the squad with 32 solo tackles; he also had seven tackles for loss.

Steger was sixth in tackles and led Pine Bluffs last season with seven sacks, while senior Thayne Vialpando was 10th on the team with 57 total defensive points and 31 tackles.



made the postseason last year.

"The guys were upset," Nelson said, "but all agreed if we'd taken care of business on the field it would have came down to a coin flip."

Senior Damien Molzahn and junior Drake Lamp were both all-state picks last season, and senior James Stone and junior Jasper Caldera were both named to the all-conference team. Lusk returns four of its five selections from that all-conference team, second only to Big Horn in the East Conference.

The Tigers' offense returns its top four rushers, four of its top five receivers, its quarterback and several offensive linemen; the defense returns its top five tacklers and 10 of its top 12.

"We're as experienced as we've been since I took over, and the upperclassmen are very motivated," said Nelson, who's in his fifth year as head coach. "They've committed to summer

"I am very confident in this team and what they can bring," Hanson said. "We are not going to shock anyone athletically, but this team is very eager to prove that last year was not the norm."

Therein is Tongue River's problem. In finishing 2-6, the Eagles were out-gained by more than a 2-to-1 ratio, giving up 291.3 yards per game while gaining just 141.9 yards per game.

However, Hanson said he has faith in his team to not only pick up the lessons he's teaching but to make the team their own, as well.

"I think my boys know who I am and what I want and expect," he said, "but more than that I think they know it is their team, and they are beginning to own that idea.'





Panthers trending in right direction

A noticeable shift has taken place in Wright's offseason.

After last season, in which the Panthers made the playoffs for the first time since 2009, weight room attendance has been up, a supportive team culture is strengthening and excitement is build-

"Our weight room numbers are as good as any year I've coached," coach Larry Yeradi said.

'The kids are spending time with each other outside the weight room, and the culture of working for something bigger than self is growing.

"I don't know if this is from a playoff appearance or just the next group of kids and the leadership upperclassmen are providing."

Whatever spurred the change, Yeradi said he appreciates the work he's seeing from his players



so far. To continue success, they'll need it.

After last year's playoff berth, the Panthers lose some key players; they only return six letterwinners, lost an all-state player to transfer, and can count the number of seniors they'll have out this year on one hand. However, they also return two-time all-state senior Dax Yeradi and about half their starters on both offense and defense.

Yeradi led Wright in both passing and rushing. He completed 38 passes for 541 yards while running 89 times for 533 yards.

He had 1.510 yards of all-purpose offense – exactly half of Wright's total from 2018. In part, that success "creates challenges for our staff to find packages that help alleviate tendencies," coach Yeradi said.

Dax Yeradi also led the defense in almost

every conceivable category and finished with more defensive points than any other 11-man player in the state regardless of classification (266). That total that includes 125 total tackles. 63 solo tackles, eight tackles for loss, seven interceptions and four pass break-ups.

To keep the pressure off the quarterback, coach Yeradi said several young players will have to step up. After all, Wright's next three rushers graduated; no returning player outside of Yeradi had more than five rushing yards last season.

And the Panthers also graduated their top two receiving threats, leaving senior Chase Lewis – who had four catches

Senior Jayden Caylor is the only one of the Patriots' four all-state choices to come back in 2019. He was huge for Upton-Sundance a year ago, leading the rushing game with 90 carries for 779 and 13 touchdowns, leading the receivers with a team-high 331 receiving yards on 20 catches, and leading the team in defensive points, total tackles (91) and solo tackles (35).



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"He's very vital," Garland said. "We're going to be doing a lot with him. He's a very versatile player."

Senior Kye Taylor was also an all-conference choice; he added 22 catches for 323 yards and a team-high five receiving touchdowns.

Junior Jess Claycomb added 25 carries for 201 yards and 11 catches for 170 yards last year.

The Patriots averaged 382.8 yards per game, second in 1A 11-man and one of just two schools to gain more than 300 yards per game.

While the Patriots retain many backs and receivers, the offensive line loses four starters.

"Filling those spots up front will definitely be a challenge," Garland said.

The defense lost six of its top nine tacklers to graduation.

Claycomb was fifth in defensive points and added 29 tackles and team highs with four interceptions and five pass break-ups.

Senior Jo Bishop had 39 tackles, junior Wyatt Gillespie added 34 and Taylor chipped in four interceptions and 10 tackles.

lose as many key players as Cokeville lost this year.

At the same time, few Class 1A 11-man teams return as many key players as Cokeville returns this year.

That dichotomy – the ability to reload – helps keep the Panthers in contention for state titles every single year.

Cokeville lost all eight of its all-state picks to graduation. However, the Panthers had 13 all-conference choices, and five of those – seniors Devyn Donahue, Garrett King and Matt Thomas and juniors Nate Barnes and Tyler Moyes – return to try to get the Panthers back to the title game after finishing as the 1A 11-man runners-up last year.

"I've got a lot of confidence in these young kids," said Cokeville coach Todd Dayton, who's entering his 40th year as head coach. "We may not be as good as we want to be at the beginning of the year, but I have a lot of confidence we'll be where we want to be by the end of the year."

Donahue is Cokeville's leading returning rusher and receiver; he was fourth on the team last vear with 259 rushing yards on 40 carries and he was third on the squad in both catches (five) and

Sophomore Treyson Dayton added 150 rushing yards on 41 carries, while Moyes added 144 yards on 25 carries.

Cokeville will need to find a quarterback, but Thomas will likely take over that position after playing backup in 2018.

On defense, the Panthers lose six of their top seven tacklers to graduation. Barnes was second on the team with 166 defensive points, notching nine tackles for loss and four sacks. Dayton was eighth on the team in defensive points, while Moves was 12th and Donahue 13th.

The lesson last year's Panthers learned – both in going undefeated for the regular season as well as a crushing 53-point loss in the championship game – will be part of this year's team.

All of that aside, coach Mykah Trujillo said the coachability and work ethic of the returning players will help keep the Cougars competitive and the keep the program growing.


Last year's team didn't quite catch that lesson.

New coach has unique background

New Wyoming Indian football coach Nate Reinhardt was attracted to Fremont County by, of all things, the Lander swimming program.

Reinhardt said his daughter is one of the top swimmers in the country in the 11-year-old age bracket. When the Wyoming Indian football job came open, along with an opportunity to teach business classes at WIHS and to move his family to a city where swimming is a priority, Reinhardt said it was "now or never" to take the chance.

Although this is Reinhardt's first head football coaching job, he has almost 20 years' worth of coaching experience at various levels. He has previously been a head basketball coach at Kemmerer (girls) and Guernsey (boys) and was also Guernsey's head track coach. He also coached at Poplar, Montana, and was an assistant at Highwood, Montana, where his teams won four Montana six-man championships in his five years as the defensive coordinator.

He said his philosophy with the Chiefs will center on his experience with six-man football as well as his prior experience with a reservation school at Poplar. That philosophy includes a quick short passing game that uses space to create mismatches and score quickly.

For now, Reinhardt said his focus will be to build up the offense to score points and bring the

defense along as the season progresses.

"It's not that we'll forget about defense, but we want to get some points out there and get the kids excited." he said.

He installed a similar system while the head coach at the middle school in Poplar. His first year, he had 18 players; after that, he consistently had 30-40 players out each year, after the excitement grew.

The plan is to develop something similar for the Chiefs, who early in the summer had more than 20 players signed up to be a part of the team.

Among some of the Chiefs' players on last year's roster are seniors Theron Mason, an all-conference choice last year, and Enean Bitsinni and sophomores

Santee Frost, Xavier Albright and E.J. Enos.

Much like last year, the Chiefs will play a patchwork schedule of mostly junior varsity teams. Reinhardt said his goal this year is to build the program up to a point where it can return to a full varsity schedule when the program transitions to the new nine-man division in 2020.

Reinhardt also said the eightand seventh-grade classes have large numbers of boys, meaning the future is bright if the excitement can be cultivated.

"Hopefully we can get some excitement going and get more kids interested in it," Reinhardt said. " ... We've got to learn to compete first. Once we learn to compete, then we have a chance to win."

What's different about six-man this

Kaycee at Burlington, Sept. 7. Both programs have had recent success, but neither is in the early talk for state title contenders. That could change with a statement victory against the other on opening weekend.

Farson at Snake River, Oct. 12. This Sat-

urday matchup between the Pronghorns and Rattlers in Baggs might determine the West's No. 1 seed. On paper, they're the two best teams entering 2019, which means something will have to give.

Burlington at Farson, Oct. 18. The rematch of last year's state championship game comes in Week 7 in Farson – and both teams will need to win here to keep hopes of a No. 1 seed alive.

Hanna at Guernsey, Oct. 25. Hanna finishes its schedule with its two toughest games – at Kaycee in Week 7 and at Guernsey in Week 8. Whether the Miners muster a postseason push that gets them to Laramie may well depend on whether they can win here.

Vikings focus on making stops

GUERNSEY-SUNRISE VIKINGS

Guernsey-Sunrise this fall is clear: Get better on defense.

Vikings coach Curtis Cook said his experienced offense has time and again proven it can move the ball and score, but its defense has yet to show it can stop an opponent from doing the same.

"We're going to have to find an identity," Cook said. "That was our biggest problem last year. ... We've got to turn that around. We've got to get more guys involved and find some stability in our defense, and that's going to be a focus for us."

The Vikings return a trio of allconference selections in seniors Alex Delgado and Jeremy Hartt and junior Justin Malcom.

Their impact last year was felt most acutely on defense, where Malcom, Hart and Delgado were first, third and sixth, respectively, in defensive points. Senior Preston Elmore, who was fourth for Guernsey in defensive points, will join them in forming an experienced defensive unit.

Malcolm led Guernsey with 48 solo tackles and 25 assists, while Hartt and Elmore each finished with 55 total tackles.

Sophomore Rawland Isabelle also saw significant playing time on defense in 2018.

There's just one problem with having so many returners on that side of the ball – even with all the individual talent, the Vikings finished last in six-man in yards allowed per game.

Cook said the solution to the problem rests with a more physical approach in practice.

Delgado completed 32 passes for 588 yards and 11 touchdowns last year.

Malcom is Guernsey's top returning rusher; he was third on the squad with 56 carries for 306 yards last year.

Elmore led the Vikings with 254 receiving yards on just nine catches. Of the three Guernsey receivers who broke 40 total yards last year, he's the only one who's

The experience of the seniors – including Delgado, Hartt and Elmore – gives the offense stability and flexibility.

"From their sophomore year on, they've been starters," Čook said. " ... It gives me a lot of confidence. In the past, we were really young."

Buckaroos always have tradition

Small senior class. New head coach. Key losses to graduation.

From an outside perspective, Kaycee's 2019 season shapes up to be one of transition.

From inside the program, new head coach Dave Largent said he sees a chance for new players to emerge and a program tradition to continue.

"We're a family, we work together, we're a team, we're a unit, we watch out for the guvs next to us, and I don't think that's going to change," Largent said.

That approach has been fruitful for Kaycee from the start of the program. The Buckaroos have posted at least four victories in every season they've had since starting six-man football in 2009.

However, after three consecutive Class 1A six-man championships, Kaycee finished 5-4 last season and lost in the playoff quarterfinals.

Kaycee graduated four seniors from last year's squad and may only have 10 players out this year, including potentially only one senior in Dion Ealy.

For Largent, though, he knows what kinds of players will make up the program – he was an assistant on last year's team and spent the previous three seasons working with Kaycee's middle school program – and he remains confident. He also said he's not planning any big scheme changes, giving the program con-

"They're tough and they work well together as a team, and I think they're pretty focused on coming out and doing the best job they can," he said.

Ealy and junior Nathan Largent were all-conference choices in 2018. A handful of other juniors, including end Rhys Stafford and running back/linebacker Dylan Fauber, will give the program stability.

Ealy was Kaycee's No. 2 ground gainer, rushing for 559 yards on 91 carries; he also completed 16 of 23 passes for 302 vards. Largent had team-highs in both catches (12) and receiving yards (257).

Stafford added 198 receiving yards on 12 catches, while Ealy had seven catches for 141 vards. Together, they represented Kaycee's top three receivers in

Largent was second for the Buckaroos a vear ago in defensive points and led the team with 57 total tackles. However, he's the only one of Kaycee's top four tacklers to come back in 2019.

Stafford was fifth, Ealy sixth and Fauber seventh in defensive points. Stafford tied for the team lead with 39 assisted tackles and Fauber was second with five pass break-ups.

Coach Largent said his motivation in his first year as the program's leader is simple.

"I care about the kids, I care about the program, I want to see it continue on," he said. We've had a history of having some pretty good coaches in Kaycee and some pretty good kids, and I just want to see that program (tradition) continue."

Oilers looking for new leader

The Midwest football program will have a different look this fall.

What exactly that look will be is still in ques-

As of deadlines for this magazine, Midwest had not yet hired a new head football coach for 2019. Former coach Ken Swieter, who led the Oilers

for 12 seasons, resigned in June to take an assistant coach's position with Kelly Walsh, his alma mater.

This year's Oilers will need to find a way to reestablish some competitive base after struggling in 2018, failing to win a game in the Class 1A six-man East Conference.

The Oilers never quite found their footing after beating Dubois in last year's season opener. After that, Midwest didn't win a game, finishing 1-6 – the program's worst record since going 0-7 in 2007.

Midwest also went winless in East Conference play, the first time the program had done that since six-man was reinstituted in 2009. Consequently. Midwest missed the playoffs for the first time in three seasons

However, a lack of depth played a role in that, as the Oilers had only 11 players on the roster for last



Of those 11, three graduated, leaving the Oilers potentially reliant on a young group this year. Of the 11, the Oilers potentially return two seniors, two juniors and four sophomores.

Statistics provided for last year's team were incomplete, showing totals only through the team's first five games, but they do show some trends.

Senior Zack Kohtala was the Oilers' No. 2 rusher a year ago, running for 163 yards and three touchdowns through the first five games.

Senior Austin Sansoucie and junior Justin Robles were the top two receivers for Midwest a year ago, with Sansoucie going for 140 yards and Robles 113 through five games. Midwest will need to find a new quarterback to run its system, though, as Kaleb Smith – the team's top rusher and the only passer the Oilers had – has graduated.

Sansoucie led the Oilers' defense in several key categories – defensive points, solo tackles and tackles for loss. Robles was fourth and Kohtala fifth in defensive points for Midwest through five games.

Junior Peter O'Brien and sophomores Lawson Lawrence and Will Gottsch also chipped in defensively last season for Midwest.

The Oilers' upper classes might be a bit thin this fall. Sansoucie and Kohtala were the only juniors on last year's roster, and Robles and O'Brien were the only sophomores.

Swieter finished a combined 58-51 in his 12 seasons in Midwest. The Oilers' best finish under him came in 2013, when they finished as state runnersup. Prior to Swieter taking over in 2007, and aside from a non-varsity season in 2002, Midwest had not had a winning season since 1991.

New coach wants to create bonds NSI Academy's new head football coach knows all about Lobdell said the biggest challenge at NSI is "trying to bring progress, though. The Wolves" Last year's team showed some progress, though. The Wolves

football coach knows all about the challenges the Wolves face to put together a competitive sixman football team.

Chad Lobell said he hopes the team can overcome all those obstacles, both on the field and off, to put together a team capable of hanging with squads that have all the advantages the Wolves don't.

"I think football is very important to our kids," Lobell said.

"... It allows them to build some teamwork and build some positive relationships and play on an organized sports team. A lot of our kids don't have that opportunity."

As a residential institution for teens with emotional or behavioral problems, NSI's enrollment is constantly shifting. Students typically stay less than one year.

Consequently, the rosters for NSI's sports teams are always in flux. Last year's roster of 17 players had no seniors and only two juniors; of those, only sophomore running back/linebacker Greg Bolds returns this year.

Lobdell said the biggest challenge at NSI is "trying to bring kids from all different backgrounds to try to form a team. ... Creating that team atmosphere is super difficult."

Lobdell is NSI's admissions director and has worked at the academy for five years. He was part of the Wolves' football coaching staff in both 2014 and 2015 before taking time away to pursue a master's degree.

He said this year's team has some potential, including some players from Montana who have some six-man experience and a player who was a backup quarterback last year at one of Montana's larger schools.

Lobdell said he hoped for a roster of about 20 players this year.

"Granted, many of them don't make it through the season," Lobdell said. "By the end of the season we're usually down to about 14, and we have kids discharge in the middle of the season or we get new kids in. It's constantly changing."

Last year's team showed some progress, though. The Wolves finished 3-4 and actually outscored their opponents 389-363, the first time NSI had been able to claim that since 2004.

NSI started the season 3-0, beating Riverside, Lingle and Midwest, before a four-game losing streak ended postseason dreams. Even so, the Wolves played within 12 points of Guernsey, 11 of Hulett and nine of Kaycee, all East Conference teams that reached the postseason.

Lobdell said he would likely preserve elements of the Wolves' offensive approach but might change depending on the players on the roster – something that's even more challenging at NSI.

"I love our offense that we've used in the past," Lobdell said. "I love that wide-open style, but I also might have a running back that can allow us to run some power football."

Panthers return to varsity scene

Last year, this year, and next year, Saratoga is a program in transition.

In 2018, after a late switch to six-man, the Panthers finished 4-2, with the only losses coming to six-man championship game participants Farson and Burlington.

This year, Saratoga is a member of the Class 1A six-man East Conference, with a fully fledged conference schedule but, as the Panthers are opting down, no chance at a playoff berth.

Next year, the Panthers will make the move to nine-man football. Through it all, coach Logan Wright said he has found a handful

Rimmer was a force on defense,

leading not only Saratoga but the entire six-man classification in defensive points per game. He put up 106 total tackles, including 43 solo, and led the Panthers with five tackles for loss and four sacks.

"Noah Rimmer's one of the best linebackers in the state, definitely in terms of six-man, so I think if we can keep teams toward the middle of the field, we should be able to get some stops," Wright said.

Irby was third on the squad with 49 total tackles and had a team-high three fumble recoveries. Love was fourth on the team in defensive points and led Saratoga with two interceptions, and Smith had more than 50 defensive points last season as well.

Irby, who ran 18 times for 174 yards, is Saratoga's leading returning rusher. Love added 18 more carries for 145 yards and also completed 11 of 16 passes for 279 yards to be Saratoga's No. 2 passer last season.

Wright said he anticipates about 14 players on the roster this fall.

"I like our chances to win some games and be competitive," Wright said.

Huskies breaking in new group

The 2018 season was the breakthrough the Burlington Huskies needed.

As a No. 4 seed, they beat East No. 1 seed and undefeated Hanna in the first round of the playoffs before coasting past Meeteetse in the semifinal.

Although the Huskies lost to Farson in the six-man championship – the program's first championship appearance since 2008 – coach Trent Aagard said his players came away from last year's runner-up finish inspired to do more.

"I don't think anybody would say they didn't want to do that again," Aagard said.

Entering 2019, the Huskies will likely have only one senior on the roster and just two returning starters on both offense and defense. Still, Aagard said the team's attitude is in the right place.

"I think we are a hard-working group," Aagard said, "and although we are going to miss some of our playmakers, there is going to be a great opportunity for some other kids to contribute and make a name for themselves."

Senior Jarom Davidson is the



team's only returning all-state or all-conference selection. Davidson led the Husies in catches (45), receiving yards (583) and receiving touchdowns (11), defensive points (247), total tackles (127), solo tackles (48), tackles for loss (11), fumble recoveries (three) and blocked kicks (four) last year.

"He is a great competitor (and) leader, and is a very hard worker," Aagard said. "If some of your better players are the hardest workers it goes a long way."

Junior Kolby Broderlow, who ran for 301 yards and three touchdowns, is Burlington's top returning rusher – the only player coming back with more than 20 yards under his belt from last year.

The Huskies worked four different players under center last year, and two – junior Kody Gotfredson, who threw for 269 yards and five scores, and sophomore Brac Walker, who notched 157 passing yards and five more scores – return this year.

Junior Eric Davidson bolsters the receiving corps. He was third for Burlington with 375 receiving yards. The Davidsons are the only two of Burlington's top six receivers to come back this year.

On defense, the Huskies lost several key pieces but do return Jarom Davidson, Eric Davidson, junior Gideon George, Broderlow and junior James Aagard, who all saw significant time and finished among Burlington's top 10 tacklers in 2018.

Eric Davidson was Burlington's leader in interceptions (two) and pass break-ups (seven). George added eight tackles for loss.

"Most years we have had around five seniors coming back, so we will be a little greener in other positions," coach Aagard said. "It's hard to replace athletes like some of the ones we lost, but it seems like every year someone is ready to step in a fill a role."

Trembly said junior James Dowd will help provide experience and depth this season, as well. However, the Rams will likely have no seniors and not enough players to run a full scrimmage. Regardless, Trembly likes his players' attitude and focus.

"They have been learning and lifting," he said. "We will still be (young) but a year older."

Defending champs have holes to fill

If Farson coach Marvin "Trip" Applequist had any fears about a postchampionship lull, his players gave him reasons not to worry.

Applequist said the Pronghorns' summer weight room ran at 6 a.m. five days a week. On a team that's only expected to have 18 players, the Pronghorns consistently had 15 show-

That commitment, coupled with a successful showing at a team camp in Chadron, Nebraska, has Applequist optimistic about 2019.

"They're coming along nicely," Applequist said. "I was really pleased with team camp, with how we looked and how they performed. We definitely have some things to clean up, but it looked pretty promising."

After back-to-back runner-up finishes, the Pronghorns broke through for their first state championship in 2018, going 11-0. However, the Pronghorns graduated all five of their all-state choices and all six of their all-conference picks.

"We lost a lot of seniors, and so we have a lot of people that need to step up into roles," Applequist said.

One thing about going 11-0 is that the Pronghorns played in several lopsided games, which gave younger players a chance to play against opposing varsity squads.

Sophomore Levi Johnson, junior Colin Malec and junior Carson Jones all topped triple digits rushing last season; Johnson, with 200 rushing

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307-273-9496 35 M and M Avenue - Eden WY yards on 19 carries, is Farson's top returning running back.

Junior Colby Jones – Carson's twin brother – was Farson's starting center and top receiver last year with 13 catches for 289 yards. However, he's the only returner to have more than two catches last

Carson Jones, Farson's only returning defensive starter, was fourth on the team in defensive points last year, finishing with 52 total tackles and tying for the team lead with eight pass break-ups, but

he is the only one of Farson's top seven tacklers to come back this fall. However, both Johnson and senior Karson Keeler both logged significant defensive playing time, as well, each finishing with 31 total tackles.

During the Chadron camp, Applequist said he could see the returners' experience on display.

"It's obvious these kids have played a lot of football," he said. "They've been in game situations, they've been out on the field and know how our system works, so I think that's huge for us.

... These boys work hard and they've had that (in-game) experience, so we're really optimistic about how this next season will go.'

The other piece of the equation this year is that Farson is now the defending state football champion, something other Pronghorn teams haven't had the opportunity to say.

"It was really special," Applequist said. "We'd come close a couple times and had not been quite able to get over the hump."

As coaching transitions go, Meeteetse's has gone about as smoothly as possible

The switch from former coach Matt Jensen to new coach Zeb Hagen went without too many hitches, in part because Hagen was the Longhorns' defensive coordinator last year and has also spent the past two years as Meeteetse's boys basketball coach.

Therefore, when the Longhorns start play this fall, they'll use many of the same schemes and approaches they already understand.

The biggest changes will be attributable to different players fulfilling key roles on both offense and defense.

"I'm pretty big on keeping similar terminology, especially being involved with that program last year," Hagen said. " ... But I'm also pretty big on adapting to who your current kids are, your current team is, and it's definitely a different team from last year."

From that team, though, senior Asa Eldredge is Meeteetse's lone returning all-state player, while classmate Kaden Redding was an all-conference choice for the Longhorns last season. They. along with fellow senior Courtney Braten, will bear the leadership role this fall.

"The seniors themselves are pretty hardworking group of kids," Hagen said. "They just go out there and get it done. They're not flashy by any means, they just work hard for you."

Eldredge was Meeteetse's No. 2 receiver last year, finishing with eight catches for 222 yards. He's the only one of the Longhorns' top three receivers to re-

Junior C.J. Justice was third on the team with 42 carries for 407 yards; he's Meeteetse's lead-

Four different players completed passes for Meeteetse last year, but none more than sophomore Dace Bennett, who completed 32 of 76 passes for 586 yards and 13 touchdowns.

On defense, the Longhorns graduated their top two tacklers but return Eldredge, Justice and Redding, who went 3-4-5, respectively, in defensive points for the Longhorns in 2018.

Redding finished with a teamhigh nine tackles for loss, while Justice leads all Meeteetse returners with five pass break-ups.

Braten, sophomore Kalvin Erickson and junior Hadley Abarr all finished with at least 50 defensive points a year ago, as

Hagen, who was the Longhorns' head coach from 2006-08, said offseason preparation has gone well, and the team should pick up on changes quickly when fall camp starts.

"It's nice to be able to not have to spend the first couple weeks of two-a-days not going over that (offensive and defensive systems), or going over your expectations, because a lot of them already know that," Hagen

Eagles are gaining steam

In his second full season as head coach at St. Stephens, Billy Brost's overhaul of a football program that needed it is beginning to show progress.

"We've had to implement a ton of change in a very short period of time, and it's probably overwhelming to a lot of our kids," Brost said.

Now, though, the Eagles' framework leaves nothing untouched, from offense to defense to special teams to offseason training to fundraising to staffing to working with the middle-school program. Consequently, he's seen more buy-in from players.

"The dedication to becoming better football players and better athletes has improved tenfold,"

Although the Eagles finished 1-6 last year, notching their only victory against winless Dubois, the squad still scored more points and gave up fewer points than at any point since brining back varsity six-man football in 2013.

Senior Trenton Friday was St. Stephens' only all-conference

choice last year. Friday and classmates Little Sun Felter and Ronnie Monroe, junior Isaiah Felter and sophomores Jeremiah Willow and Jude Jenkins are among the Eagles' key returners this fall.

"Now they're comfortable," Brost said. "Last year, there were still growing pains."

The Eagles also entered into a co-op agreement with Western Heritage Lutheran Academy in Riverton; through that, the Eagles will have junior Kaden Dower, a two-time Class 1A champion in the 100-meter dash, join the squad.

Brost said the addition of Dower – a 6-foot-2-inch, 190pound tailback – adds "another wrinkle that we've never had before, so we're going to try to utilize him to the best of our ability.'

The Eagles bucked six-man trends by fielding a massive offensive line last year. That changes this year as those players have graduated, leaving smaller, but faster, players to fill those spots.

"It's going to be a much different dynamic on the offensive

line," Brost said. "We're going to have a much more traditional sixman setup.'

Also, center Salem Ynostrosa, who missed almost all of last season after suffering a concussion in the first game of the year, is back for this season. And Brost also said two incoming freshmen, Bluebird Talksdifferent and Virgil Monroe, could have immediate impacts.

Even with all the returning players, Brost said the one thing he's not sure about yet is leadership. Although he expects to have about 18 players total, "right now, no one has stepped up to be that leader."

Still, Brost said he has high hopes for his team, which hasn't qualified for the playoffs and has gone a combined 3-45 in the six varsity seasons it's had since resurrecting football at St. Stephens.

"If we don't make the playoffs this year, something went drastically wrong," Brost said. "That has to be the expectation this vear."

Rattlers loaded for a run

Snake River has two keys working in its favor this fall: numbers and athleticism.

With a senior class full of committed athletes and a group of underclassmen in position to provide depth, the Rattlers could make a deep playoff run this sea-

Moreover, coach Jack Cobb said Snake River brings an intangible not every team can match, a work ethic that shines through everything they do.

"As a coach, you can't ask for anything more than that, is give me all vou have." Cobb said. "And that's one thing I don't think I have to worry about with this team."

The Rattlers return a pair of all-state selections in seniors Riggen Myers and Wyatt Duncan – as many all-state returners as the rest of the West Conference combined. They are part of a senior class that will run seven or eight players deep, a wealth of talent for six-man.

Myers led Snake River's rushing game with 129 carries for 1,398 yards and 24 touchdowns; he also led the Rattlers with 207

defensive points, 71 total tackles. 29 solo tackles, six fumble recoveries, seven interceptions and six pass break-ups.

"I've never coached anyone as competitive as Riggen," Cobb said. " ... Whatever season it is, whether it's football or basketball or rodeoing, it's 100 percent. He's dialed in and concentrating on that. No one's every criticized him for not giving effort.

"He can bring a lot of different options for us, and the fun thing about this year is we have kids who can join in with him so he doesn't have to carry the load."

Cobb said where Myers leads by example, Duncan leads vocally. He led the Rattlers with 248 receiving yards and added 52 tackles and a team-high nine

The depth grows from there. Senior Tony Enriquez was an all-conference choice last season; he had 77 carries for 515 yards, as well as 48 tackles and four interceptions on defense.

Senior Taylor Otte took care of the bulk of the quarterbacking duties, throwing for 639 yards and six touchdowns, while Myers added 252 passing yards and three more scores.

Senior Oscar Herrera added 109 receiving yards and more than 30 tackles, classmate Karter Evans runs the center position and leads blocking calls – and also had more than 30 tackles on defense – and sophomore Zander Risner chipped in 328 rushing vards, 41 tackles and five fumble recoveries.

The Rattlers' defense returns its top six tacklers in Myers, Enriquez, Duncan, Risner, Herrera and Evans.

"These kids have committed to it, and it's going to be a fun year just watching them compete and seeing the younger kids raise their game to match what the seniors bring," Cobb said.

Pioneers return with enthusiasm

After a year away, the Ten Sleep football team is scheduled for its return in 2019.

With low numbers, the Pioneers could not field a team for 2018. For now, though, Ten Sleep has a new coach, a full schedule and aspirations of returning to six-man.

Taylen Arnett, a 2012 graduate of Lusk and a rancher near the Ten Sleep area, will be the team's new head coach this fall.

Arnett did not make himself available for an interview despite multiple voicemails and text messages.

With only four students showing interest in football, Ten Sleep dropped the sport for 2018, marking the first time since 1990 that the Pioneers didn't field a football team.

From the Pioneers' 2017 roster, only three players are potential returners. Those players are senior Will Loveland and juniors Boe Nichols and Aidan Searfoss.

In 2017, Loveland was second for the Pioneers in defensive

Last year, Ten Sleep's players were given the option to play for Worland in a co-op agreement. However, none of the Ten Sleep player names showed up on the Worland roster or in the Warriors' end-of-year statistics.

In July of 2018, Ten Sleep activities director Sarah Novak said the declining participation numbers were the key reason why the Pioneers could not field a team.

"In talking with our administration, we have kind of struggled... with participation numbers over the last two or three years," she said. "We've had to forfeit games or quit at halftime and we're just not having a positive experience right now.'

Before deciding to cancel its 2018 season, the Ten Sleep football program was fighting for relevancy. The team finished with one victory per year in 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017. The team also had three different head coaches in the three years from 2015-17 – Andy

Ray, Jake Zent and Ross Hauptman, respectively.

Combined in those four years. the Pioneers finished 4-26. Three of those four victories came against St. Stephens; the fourth victory, in 2016, came against Hulett. The Pioneers' last playoff appearance came in 2011, when they finished 6-4. That year, Ten Sleep lost to Midwest in the playoff quarterfinals.

Ten Sleep last won a playoff game in 2010. That season, the Pioneers went 5-2 in the regular season and defeated Meeteetse 93-38 in the Class 1A six-man quarterfinals before falling to Hanna 33-32 in the semifinals. The 2010 playoff victory was one of just two postseason victories in program history; the other came in the Montana six-man playoffs in 2005.

Ten Sleep is one of four active programs to have never appeared in a state championship game, joining Class 4A programs Chevenne South and Thunder Basin and Class 1A 11-man Wyoming Indian

Encampment's football history is limited to only five seasons – a pair of six-man seasons in 1956 and 1957 and three seasons of eight-man and nineman play from 1988-90. Since the end of the program, Encampment

players who wanted to play football had to go to Saratoga, 20 miles up the road. For years, that co-op agreement worked for both

schools. However, this year, Encampment struck out on its own to start a six-man football program.


The change didn't come from coaches or community members or parents.

"The motivation to start a program in Encampment came directly from the students in our school," Willford said. "This group of boys really want to have their own identity for football and have a lot of pride in representing their school. ... (They) really feel like they have the numbers to sustain a six-man team moving forward."

School board financial support for the program was initially tentative, but the board has agreed to pay officials for home games. Willford said. Beyond that, the program has been supported through fundraising, donations and Encampment's "E Club"

"Encampment is a very giving community and takes great pride in the school and its programs." Willford said.

The Tigers' plan is to play sub-varsity this year

and move to a full varsity schedule in 2020 as part of the Class 1A six-man classification.

Between 13 and 16 players will be out for the team this fall, Willford said – a good showing for a program in its infancy. Only two of those are seniors, setting up the program well for future success.

Junior Kelton Koehn might be the most experienced player the Tigers have. Last year, playing for Saratoga's six-man team, Koehn finished sixth in defensive points, notching 29 total tackles, a sack and an interception.

Junior Dalton Peterson was also part of the Saratoga program, but only as a freshman. That year, he was the Panthers' No. 4 tackler, No. 2 receiver with five catches for 52 yards, and No. 4 rusher with 21 carries for 51 yards.

Junior Kagan Gilbert was also part of Saratoga's team as a freshman, finishing seventh on the team in defensive points.

Willford said senior Dayne Anderson and sophomore Koye Gilbert have also previously played, giving depth to the team.

Willford said one of the team's strengths is chemistry - the Tigers consistently have a competitive basketball team and finished as the Class 1A runners-up in 2018. But they lack consistent football experience and need to learn the ins and outs of six-man football

gave Riverside a diverse passing attack.

Buck said he has three players he trusts at quarterback. Buck also said the running game could have a bigger effect on the Rebels' fortunes.

"(The running game) was solid, it was good, but I think

it's going to be a lot better this vear," Buck said.

Boreen and Clutter led the defense last year, with Boreen leading the team in solo tackles (20), sacks (four), fumble recoveries (seven) and blocked kicks (five), and Clutter fronting the Rebels in total tackles (67) and tackles for loss

Miller added a team-high five interceptions and six pass break-ups, while Ellis Rudd, O'Roake and Zapata also played significant minutes on defense.

With that diversity of experience, Buck said he wants to add a few new wrinkles.

"We're definitely going to be able to do a lot more this year," he said. "The understanding of our offense and defense is going to be completely different, because (last year) we were really working with a crew where we were starting from scratch... The core of our group, (they) kind of had to get
