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

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

Sheridan Eyes Consecutive Wins Record

Four Questions to Answer

What are you watching for in 4A this year? Two big streaks. Sheridan enters the season with a 31-game winning streak and three consecutive state championships. Four more victories would break the state winning streak.

You said TWO big streaks -- what's the other? This one isn't as positive, but Cheyenne South enters 2024 tied for the state record longest losing streak at 38 games. If the Bison can shake the streak, it would mean a lot to the program and to players who have never known a varsity victory.

Can anyone else catch Sheridan? Absolutely. The Broncs aren't loaded with returning talent -- no all-staters return and just one all-conference player. Many of 4A's other teams find themselves in similar circumstances, as only four players come back with all-state accolades -- two at Thunder Basin, one at Campbell County and one at Cheyenne Central.

Any programs on the rise? Three of the four programs who finished near the bottom of the 4A standings last year have new head coaches. Rock Springs, Kelly Walsh and Laramie welcome Kasey Koepplin, Randy Roden and Jake Chick, respectively.

Four Key Games

Cheyenne East at Sheridan, Sept. 20. If the Brones can somehow come through unscathed in the first three games, this game represents what could be consecutive win No. 35 --

the one that would set the state record for consecutive victories.

Natrona at Cheyenne East, Sept. 27. 2023's four semifinal teams (East, Sheridan, Thunder Basin, Natrona) all play each other in the first five weeks of the season, capping with this game between the Mustangs and T-Birds in Week 4.

Campbell County at Thunder Basin, Oct. 11. When Thunder Basin opened its doors eight years ago, this is the game everyone knew was possible in Gillette. It took a while to get there, but the Camels' absolution has been astonishing to watch.

Campbell County at Sheridan, Oct. 18. One week after what will likely be a highly emotional cross-town rivalry game, the Camels draw the defending champs, on the road, in a renewal of the Energy Bowl.

Way-too-early Title Game Score Prediction

Sheridan 38, Campbell County 28. Of all of the seasons in Sheridan's current championship run, this one is the most tenuous. The first few weeks will be telling to a season full of uncertainty.

Players to Watch

Mason Drube, Campell

County. Drube caught the attention of several college programs before verbally committing to Wyoming this summer. He is 4A's top returning passer, throwing for 2,067 yards last season.

Logan Mendoza and Cort Catlin, Thunder Basin. Mendoza was Thunder Basin's No. 1 tackler last year with 68, while Catlin was close behind with 64. They will lead an experienced defensive group.

Brycen Bailey, Cheyenne Central. The classification's only returning all-stater who plays on the interior, Bailey's presence will be key for Central to stay in the championship conversation.

Trent Rosenau, Campbell

County. Rosenau had 1,107 rushing yards last season, including 15 touchdowns, as well as an all-state nod. However, Rosenau won't have to do it all on a team that is multidimensional.

Tucker Sides, Natrona. Sides

put up a huge number of tackles, 105 to be exact, to lead a stingy Natrona defense that ranked first in 4A in yards allowed per game last season.

Bridger Peldo, Sheridan. The only full-time starter who's returning for either Sheridan's offense or defense, Peldo is an offensive lineman who will be a key piece of the Broncs' success this fall.

Camels Have Experience to Compete

CAMPBELL COUNTY CAMELS

The Campbell County Camels will be a paradox of football strategies this fall.

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Under second-year coach Orah Garst, the Camels will be experienced on both sides of the ball, returning nine starters on defense and six on offense.

And where the offense can add complexity and flexibility to what it does, the defense will simplify and help players play fast. The Camels return five first-

The Camels return five firstteam all-conference selections, three more than any other Class 4A team. That group is led by returning all-state pick senior Trent Rosenau and seniors Mason Drube, Adam Gibson, Garrett Herther and Raynor Ranum.

"We've got height, we've got speed, we've got size," Garst said. " ... Last year we had like six or seven seniors, and this year we have 19, and they're all (physical) freaks."

Drube is the top returning passer in Class 4A after completing 134 passes for 2,067 yards and 22 touchdowns against just four interceptions last season. This summer, he verbally committed to play for Wyoming.

play for Wyoming. Rosenau added 151 carries for 1,107 yards and 15 touchdowns. Gibson was the Camels' top receiver, leading the team in catches (34), receiving yards (575) and receiving touchdowns (eight).

Herther finished third on the team with 20 catches for 247 yards and four touchdowns. Rosenau added 14 catches for 164 yards. In all, Campbell County returns six of its top eight receivers from 2023.

Also in the mix in the passing game is 6-foot-7 sophomore Jack Andela at tight end and 6-foot-5 junior Ethan Masteller at wide receiver; Gibson is also 6-foot-3.

Garst said Drube has given the ability to audible or adjust receivers' routes at the line.

"Now we're not talking about plays, we're talking about adjustments," Garst said. "... We

went from the peewee version to the college version in one year." The defense, which returns eight of its top 11 tacklers, will do

the opposite. "We found out what the kids are good at, and on that side of the ball, we simplified," Garst said. Ranum leads the Camels'

returners on defense after finishing second on the team with 51.5 tackles last season, including tying for the team high with 10 tackles for loss.

Junior Tyler Rambo had 42 tackles, good for third on the team, and tied for the team lead with 3.5 sacks.

Senior Patrick Lynch had 33 tackles, with 10 for loss and 3.5 sacks to tie for the team lead.

Junior Treyton Sukut had 33 tackles, seniors Danny Carsrud and senior Michael Biggs had 26 tackles apiece, senior Cavalli Gibson had 24 and senior Jacob Pelton had 23.

"Every single one of them is a year older, and some of them are 40 pounds heavier," Garst said.



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Central has Numbers on its Side

The switch has flipped for the Cheyenne Central football program.

When seventh-year coach Mike Apodaca started at Central, he knew he needed to see more offseason commitment from his team.

Now, Apodaca is looking for his players to meet a new set of expectations.

I feel like the program is at a place now where we've got kind of a football mindset," Apodaca said. "That was a work in progress when I got here. But we took 110 players to camp this summer, which are numbers we've never had."

This season, the Indians will have experience, with seven offensive and six defensive starters returning.

"We bring back a lot of people, but we were also really young," Apodaca said. "At the end of last year we started seven sophomores."

Senior Tate Berry, a first-team all-conference choice last year, led the Indians in defensive points and tied for the team lead with 54 tackles. He also had team highs with 10.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks, three blocked kicks and two forced fumbles.

Senior Will Pauley also had 54 tackles, including 2.5 for loss.

Senior Bryson Filbin had 33 tackles, senior Kolby Moon had 31 and senior Aiden Herget had 22.


In total, the defense returns its top two

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"It's going to be really important that that group really take ownership in our games early on," he said.

The offense's strength is up front. The line has good experience with Bailey, Moon, juniors Jack Garrett, D.J. Sayers and senior Nate Sack, as well as Berry and DiManna at tight end.

Junior Lane Clement returns at quarterback after completing 67 of 122 passes for 617 yards and five touchdowns.

DiManna and junior James Pillivant tied for No. 3 on the team in both catches (12) and yards (99) and are the Indians' top returning receivers. Of Central's top six receivers, they are the only two to return.

The Indians graduated their top three rushers, and no returner broke triple digits last season.

Apodaca said he likes the balance he sees in his returning group, with both talent and experience spread throughout a variety of positions.

Still, Central will have to rely on several younger players to cultivate success.

"I think we've got some growing pains that we have to get through, but it's a group of kids that has the ability to get through that," Apodaca said. "... They're still young, learning how to take that next step as a varsity player."

Cheyenne East Thunderbirds T-Birds are Knocking on the Door

In 16 of the 18 years Chad Goff has been the head coach at Cheyenne East, the Thunderbirds have reached at least the semifinals of the playoffs.

Each of the past two years, the Thunderbirds have made it to the state title game.

Despite both championship games ending with East on the losing side, Goff said the experiences have made this year's refurners eager for another chance.

"To actually be there, it makes you hungry... and it makes you reflect on how you can do better," Goff said. "... They've been there, but they want to be in that end zone, hugging their families, taking every picture you can imagine, and you don't really do that if you don't end with a W.?

East graduated eight all-state and 10 first-team all-conference players, though, with senior lineman Jesse Kirkbride the only first-team allconference player retained from 2023. Moreover, the Thunderbirds graduated their quarterback, top

three rushers, top five receivers and top seven tacklers. Senior Nolan Horton completed

16 of 22 passes for 213 yards and two touchdowns in spot duty under center. Horton is also the team's leading returning receiver after catching 10 passes for 159 yards and a touchdown last season.

Horton, senior Tanner Stehwein and junior Kaenan Zowada are all in competition for quarterback, Goff said.

Senior Liam Fox, who had 27 carries for 184 yards and two touchdowns, is the top returning rusher. Horton added 27 carries for 127 yards and a score, while senior Jaxon Farella contributed 23 carries for 106 yards.

Senior Wyatt Dean is East's top returning tackler; he had 37 a year ago, good for eighth on the team, and also had three interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

Horton added 35 tackles and led East with four interceptions.

Senior Bobby Mathews (28 tackles), senior Camden Hassler (23 tackles) and senior Hunter Sallee (20 tackles) also saw extended playing time on defense.

Goff said this year's team will benefit from comfort and familiarity with each other combined with a sense of immediacy.

They just seem very energetic, very excited to have their chance and their shot at getting on the field and representing this high school," Goff said.

East's consistency starts with administration, Goff said, and works its way through the coaching staff to players.

"I could probably go through the last 18 years and point out what that class brought to that program," he said. "... The younger kids see that and they build upon that to keep things going. "... We've been really blessed

with really good leaders in our junior and senior classes the past few years. You just hope that trickles down, and it has trickled down.

South Look to End Dubious Streak

CHEYENNE SOUTH BISON

Cheyenne South's weight room has a countdown clock that can be adjusted for the upcoming opponent.

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As soon as the 2023 season was done, Bison coach Eli Moody didn't hesitate.

"We started that countdown at like, 240-some days," he said. "I posted it in the weight room before the schedule was even shared with the public.

South's season starts with a road game at three-time defending Class 4A champion Sheridan, which brings a 31game winning streak into this season. Meanwhile, Cheyenne South enters 2024 in the opposite direction, with losing streak that has now reached 38 games - tied for the longest in state history in tow.

But the Bison's reaction to the countdown clock, spurred by a group of returning players who have managed to stay focused on the positives despite four consecutive 0-9 seasons, has Moody optimistic.

"I'd say the kids have done a great job of rallying and saying, 'Hey, let's go prove that we can actually do something," he said. " ... We have a great group of kids

who want to play football, who want to be out there and do what they're passionate about.'

South has several gaps to fill, particularly on offense, but the Bison defense returns six of its top 12 tacklers. However, South does lose its top two tacklers from 2023.

Senior Trey Downham was third on the team last year and leads South's returners with 46 tackles last year. He also led South with two interceptions and three pass break-ups.

Senior Carson Garey added 27 tackles, good for fifth on the team. Four juniors also contributed, with Cameron Trujillo and Daniel Serna notching 18 tackles, Jaden McNeil 16 and Dane Barton 13.

Moody said the Bison will be junior-heavy, but he said being exposed to the varsity level as sophomores has inspired a renewed offseason commitment from that group, he said.

"We're still a super-young

team," Moody said. "The bulk of our guys will be juniors as far as varsity goes. We have a lot of sophomores who got varsity reps (last year).

... They're probably unfairly put in a situation where they had to get reps before they were ready.

On offense, South graduated its top four rushers, every player who completed a pass last year, as well as two of its top three receivers.

Downham, who was second on the team with 146 receiving yards and tied for second with eight catches, is the top returning receiver. McNeil added eight catches for 98 yards.

Trujillo (six carries, 28 yards) is the top returning rusher.

The offensive line returns two starters, though, in seniors Jacob Murphy and Maddax Haws.

"Overall, the attitude's positive and excited right now," Moody said.

Roden Looking to Bring Change

Randy Roden is blunt in his assessment of what needs to change for Kelly Walsh's football team to develop the success he's looking for.

The first-year coach, who's been KW's head boys basketball coach for the past 13 years, sees potential in his team but also sees a small, young group that needs to grow.

We must use our talent efficiently and differently on both sides of the ball," Roden said. " ... Everything will be a huge change for us.

Roden said he was attracted to the position for two reasons - the challenge of bringing victories to a program that has struggled for them and the chance to "try to help the kids

find success." Kelly Walsh has finished with a winning record just once in the past 14 years and has won four playoff games in the past four decades, so rebuilding will come slowly. Schematically, Roden said

his offense will try to control the clock, while the defense will try to be aggressive up front and put teams in challenging situations.

"I know what we have, who we have and what they are capable of," Roden said. "I have seen limited success in the program for 10 years, and have been able to formulate a plan that tries to alleviate some of the issues KW has in football. But the bottom line is that the past recent years is that our talent is very, very limited.'

KW will rely on a group of young but enthusiastic players to help with the transformation process.

Senior Landon Walker and junior Ethan Hague return as first-team all-conference selections.

Walker was KW's top receiver in 2023, catching 47 passes for 414 yards and two scores. He was also No. 2 for the Trojans in rushing last year, carrying 45 times for 247 yards and four touchdowns.

Hague is KW's top returning tackler; he was second on the squad last year with 58 total tackles and tied for the team lead with three pass deflections.

Offensively, junior quarterback Carter Alvar completed 119 passes for 1,251 yards and six touchdowns.

Senior Kaecen Paden was No. 4 for the Trojans in both catches (10) and receiving yards (139).

Junior Jaxsen Terry added 28 carries for 133 yards, good for third on the team.

Junior Aidan Chinn will lead the returning linemen.

The defense returns a host of players who contributed in 2023. Senior Wyatt Humble was third with 51 tackles, Walker tied with senior Mekhi

New Coach Offers a Challenge

In describing what he wanted to see from his team, first-year Laramie head coach Jake Chick consistently repeated one word: 'competition.'

For Laramie to break its string of 23 consecutive losing seasons, Chick said the Plainsmen will have to inspire internal competition to make Laramie more competitive against external foes.

That starts with position battles, where Chick said he isn't afraid to try players at new spots.

"If anyone penciled in (to a position), it's about as light a pencil mark as you're going to see," said Chick, who has taught and coached throughout the Laramie schools for the past 10 years.

To that end, Chick said he is seeing "a mentality shift right now. We did a three-day install camp two weeks ago that first week of their summer and we had 70 kids show up for that. In all my time as an assistant coach, I don't know if I've ever seen 70 kids on the field, much less for a summer install

camp."

On defense, the Plainsmen return four of their top eight tacklers from 2023. Seniors Fisher Frude and Max Alexander were second and third, respectively, for the Plainsmen in defensive points last year. Frude tied for third on the team with 47 tackles and led Laramie with 25 solo tackles. Alexander had 39 tackles, deflected a teamhigh four passes and also tied for the team lead with two interceptions.

Senior Noah Kirsch tied with Frude with 47 tackles and leads Laramie's returners with nine tackles for loss last season. Senior Evan Crum added 35 tackles and two interceptions.

Other returners who saw significant defensive playing time last year are juniors Tyler Gale (18 tackles, two pass deflections) and James Vasek (12 tackles) and seniors Will Brinegar (15 tackles), Andres Isidro-Sisneros (14 tackles), and Dealyn Robinson (10 tackles).

On offense, Frude completed

98 of 177 passes for 1,118 yards and six touchdowns last year.

He returns two of his top three receivers from a year ago. Alexander led Laramie with 46 catches for 780 yards and five touchdowns. Junior A.J. Sirdoreus added 10 catches for 124 yards. The Plainsmen had no rusher

top triple-digit yards last season; the leading returning rusher, Alexander, ran 19 times for 47 yards.

Vasek will add depth to the line, while senior transfer Jeremiah Hutcheson has impressed in summer workouts.

Chick said Laramie will also work to build three tiers worth of games – varsity, junior varsity and freshman - something that hasn't happened in his decade in Laramie.

"I always want those younger guys to feel like they have an opportunity to compete for a spot, and we don't win unless we build competition within our own program," Chick said.



Mustangs Have Questions to Answer

Right now, the "who" of Natrona's approach is still a question mark.

The "what" will fall into place from there.

Natrona retains just two of its 10 first-team all-conference choices, seniors Rogan Potter and Tucker Sides.

Who will handle most of the other positions, coach Steve Harshman said, is unclear -a problem Harshman said he'd to like to end soon.

"We've been in this deal the last three, four years where we don't really have our quarterback figured out and our offensive line figured out," Harshman said. "Nobody's got anything tattooed on them, a title, everyone has to earn everything. But we've been in this situation in the last few years.

"... We've got some work to do there, and somebody's got to emerge at that quarterback spot. Those are obviously key areas and that'll be a big part we have to get solved."

On the offensive line, the Mustangs return Josh May and Tays Turnbull, seniors who played significant minutes last

year. Potter was Natrona's leading receiver last year, catching 40 passes for 458 yards; he scored three receiving touchdowns. With nine carries for 83 yards, Potter is also Natrona's top returning rusher. "We'll get the ball in his hands as much as we can," Harshman said.

Senior Aiden Youmans was second for NC with 18 catches and third with 221 receiving yards last

season. Of the Mustangs' top six receivers from 2023, only Potter and Youmans return. The Mustangs also graduated their top three rushers.

As for that quarterback spot? Well, no returning player completed more than one pass last season.

Harshman said three players have emerged as potential starters, and "we'll give them all a chance. They're all working hard this summer, and a few months is a big time in a young man's life."

Sides led Natrona's defense with 105 tackles last season, including team highs in solo (36) and assisted (69) tackles. He also led Natrona with three forced fumbles and recovered one, as well.

"I think he's going to have to



be a key guy for us," Harshman said. He's going to be right in the middle of our defense, kind of the quarterback of our defense, really running things."

However, Šides is the only one of Natrona's top seven tacklers to return.

Senior Jameson Siemens had 30 tackles, including seven for loss, while senior Gus Bertagnole contributed 29 tackles.

Potter added 27 tackles and four pass deflections, and senior Zaven Thomas had 21 tackles and five pass break-ups.

Seniors Payton Maggi, Tyler Palermo, Gage Brooks and Charlie True will also contribute.

"I think we've got some nice returners, particularly all those stand-up positions – running back, receiver, linebacker, defensive back," Harshman said.

"We've been in this deal the last three, four years where we don't really have our quarterback figured out and our offensive line figured out."





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Broncs Embracing Historic Streak

Sheridan, the three-time defending Class 4A state champion, has won 31 games in a row.

The state record, which has stood for more than 60 years, is 34.

Coach Jeff Mowry said his team has embraced the streak but isn't using it as unnecessary pressure.

"A no-hitter in baseball never gets talked about (in the dugout)," Mowry said. "We've taken the opposite approach, and we've embraced that. Kids can't feel like, 'We can't let them down.' We can't do that. We've just got to go out and play our best football."

To continue its success, the Broncs will need to rely on players who didn't see much varsity time last season. Sheridan graduated all eight of its all-state players and 12 of its 13 first-team all-conference players. Only senior Ty Gilbertson returns from that group.

The defense, despite not returning any starters from last

season's championship game, does return several players who saw significant time.

Junior Keegan Rager led the Broncs with 51 tackles last year, including three for a loss, and recovered two fumbles. Senior Kelten Crow had 33 tackles, Gilbertson added 30 tackles and had two interceptions and senior Garrett Way tallied 29 tackles.

Junior Breck Reed added 25 tackles and four interceptions and also led Sheridan with three defensive touchdowns. Seniors Harvey Fryberger (25 tackles) and Karson Chase (20 tackles) and juniors Beck Haswell (22 tackles), who returns after missing much of last year with a broken hand, and Will Greer (20 tackles) also saw extensive playing time on defense.

Mower said players gained varsity experience through their reserve roles last year, and "we were really, really fortunate last year to have a lot of time to be able to do that."

On offense, the Broncs graduated their top four rushers,

their quarterback and their top two receivers but return two starting offensive linemen in seniors Bridger Peldo and Josh Davis. Davis returns after tearing his ACL last season.

said. He also said he likes the blend of experience and youth on the roster, and he said he sees several underclassmen who could contribute right away. That will help offset the changes needed in team philosophy, schemes and terminology, which will come with a learning curve.

Senior Sam Thornhill, Rock Springs' top returning rusher and tackler, is the only allconference players to return this year.

Thornhill was Rock Springs' top tackler last year with 68 total tackles, leading the Tigers with 31 solo tackles and tying for the team lead with two fumble recoveries.

On offense, he ran 35 times for 232 yards and a pair of touchdowns last year and added six catches for 36 yards. Sophomore Boston James added 35 carries for 148 yards. No other returners topped 25 yards last year on the ground.

Senior Logan Condie, who completed two passes for 13 yards, is the only player back who completed a pass last season.

James, whose 40 receiving yards on six catches ranked him sixth on the team last year, is the top returning receiver. Junior Ben Fowler added 37 receiving yards on a pair of catches.

The Tigers return just three of their top eight tacklers this year but do return several players who saw time on that side of the ball.

Bolts Backed by Senior Leaders

One of the weirdest oddities in Class 4A is happening at Thunder Basin this fall – and it's a good sign for the 'Bolts.

Thunder Basin returns two all-state players in seniors Cort Catlin and Logan Mendoza; the rest of Class 4A, all nine teams, returns just two combined.

The mathematical advantage ends there, though. The 'Bolts graduated four other all-state and seven other first-team all-conference players, including their quarterback, their top three rushers, three of their top four receivers and seven of their top nine players in defensive points.

Éven so, coach Trent Pikula said he sees a lot of strengths in this year's group. "Although we don't return a lot of starters,

we do return a lot of kids with experience," he said. "We played a lot of kids last year at most positions.

The defense, specifically, benefits from the return of its all-state members.

Mendoza led Thunder Basin with 68 tackles last year and also led the team in defensive points. He notched 10 tackles for loss, three sacks, four pass deflections, two fumble recoveries and an interception.

Catlin was second on the team with 64 total tackles and tied for the team lead with two interceptions.

Cort and Logan both had very good seasons last year, leading our defense as juniors," Pikula said. "Their role will be to lead this team and continue to do what they started last season.'

Several other seniors-to-be saw extensive time on defense. Parker

Wagner added 42 tackles and an interception, Riley Bertsch had 26 tackles, Jack Bouzis had 22 and Cameron Pilcher had 21.

The offense returns four starters. Catlin was second for Thunder Basin with 293 receiving yards and tied for second with 22 catches. Wagner added 14 catches for 166 yards.

Senior Wyatt Black ran 28 times for 140 yards and two touchdowns, good for fourth on the team last year; he's Thunder Basin's top returning rusher.

Junior Hadley Hudson saw spot time at quarterback, completing 11 of 12 passes for 92 yards and a touchdown. He will compete with sophomore Ty Eisenhauer for the starting spot.



Hodgs Steps Up to Lead Bearcats

It's hard to call Douglas coach Drew Hodgs "new." While 2024 will be Hodgs'

first year as head coach of the Bearcats, as former coach Jay Rhoades moves to the activities director's chair, Hodgs knows the Douglas program about as well as anyone.

He played for the Bearcats in high school, and he has coached for nine years as an assistant on

Archuleta, by far, led the Bearcats with 117 total tackles, including a team-high 13 for a loss. He also had two interceptions.

Hodgs said the responsibilities for Archuleta, who already has Douglas' career tackles record with a season to go, will increase as a senior.

"He's going to have a big load on his shoulders this year, because this year he's going to have a lot more reps offensively," Hodgs said. "... He's going to be our guy, no doubt about it. I don't think it's a secret.'

Archuleta is Douglas' top returning rusher, notching 33 carries for 104 yards to finish third on the team last year, scoring five rushing touchdowns along the way.

On defense, Tillard added 45 tackles, four interceptions and two fumble recoveries. He is also the top returning receiver after finishing second on the team with 331 receiving yards on 27 catches last year.

Archuleta added 16 catches for 130 yards, but no other returner reached double-digit receiving yards last season. However, Hodgs said juniors Jarrett Jones and Owen Meyer would add depth at wideout.

Hodgs said senior Anthony Henson will lead the offensive line, which Hodgs said lacks depth, while junior Collin Roberts will step in to start at quarterback.

"The competitive edge he has is unmatchable," Hodgs said. "He's an even-keeled guy... and he's going to be a great game manager for us.'



Across the line, the defense returns numerous

players who filled important positions last year, but the Tigers also lost their top two tacklers to graduation.

Baker and Larvie are Lander's top two returning tacklers; they tied for third on the team last year with 37 tackles apiece. Larvie added 11 tackles for loss and two sacks.

Senior Landon Jones added 35 tackles, two fumble recoveries and an interception.

Junior Barrett Moffat added 29 tackles, junior Cody West had 27 tackles, junior Kaleb Hamilton notched 20 tackles and two sacks, and senior Jackson Conder had 18 tackles, two fumble recoveries and an interception.

Burton also said sophomore Finn McFadden and junior Parker Burton are athletic players who can fulfill multiple roles on both sides of the ball and will be counted on to contribute this season.

"Both sides of the ball, we'll have a little more experience," coach Burton said. "Kids will do a little less thinking, a little more playing.'

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Wolverines Continuing to Build

RIVERTON WOLVERINES

The most important thing that Riverton coach Mark Lenhardt learned about his Wolverine team in his first year as head coach was learning how the players would respond when they learned to compete.

After a slow start – the Wolverines started 0-4 - Riverton found its direction in the conference season. In turn, Riverton shared the Class 3A East Conference championship and hosted its first playoff game since 2019.

"We all have a system," Lenhardt said. "We run an offense, we run a defense, but you never know what you have until you have a chance to see your kids compete."

Now in his second year as head coach, Lenhardt said he has continued to try to find ways to challenge his players to compete - something that's easier now that he knows what makes each one of his players motivated to do their best.

Lenhardt said expectations are higher, weight room attendance is improved and three-sport athletes have become more commonplace, all ways in which competitive fires can be stoked prior to the start of fall practice.

Moreover, the players are now in their second year with Lenhardt's system. "It seems like there's less re-teaching,

like they're picking it up faster, and that's been a real positive," he said. " . Hopefully going into year two, you don't have such a big learning curve.'

However, this year's Riverton team will have to rely on some as-yet unproven talent. The Wolverines graduated eight of their 10 all-conference choices, returning only senior Ryan Cox and junior Kayden Liebrecht from that group.

The Wolverines graduated their quarterback, their top three receivers and their top two ground-gainers, as well as five of their top eight tacklers from the defense.

Junior Blake Gantenbein is the top returning passer, rusher and receiver for Riverton's offense. He completed 25 of 44 passes for 272 yards and two touchdowns

and ran 58 times for 181 yards and another TD last season. He also caught 13 passes for 119 yards. Lenhardt said

Gantenbein will likely take over at quarterback this year.

Junior Hunter Saltsgaver added 28 carries for 103 yards last season.

Defensively, senior Jackson Larsen is the leading returning tackler; he had 59 total tackles last year to rank second on the team. He will also contribute on offense at wide receiver

Liebrecht added 34 tackles and two fumble recoveries, and senior Tyree Harris also had 34 tackles.

Gantenbien and Cox had 26 tackles apiece, with Gantenbein notching two fumble recoveries. Senior Hunter Rieman added 17 tackles and senior Jordan May had 15.

Junior Clay Sheets will add depth at wideout and in the defensive backfield, while junior Ayden Sanchez will contribute on the offensive line and at linebacker.

Trailblazers Return to 3A Battles

Torrington represents the closest thing Wyoming high school football will ever have to soccer-style promotion.

After winning the Class 2A championship last season, the Trailblazers will shift to Class 3A this fall, swapping spots with Worland in the reclassification shuffle.

However, Class 3A is not a new place for Torrington, having spent most of the past 50 years in that classification, making the move to 2A only in 2020.

"(Our) players are excited for new challenges and playing tough teams in 3A," coach Russell Stienmetz said. "Most of the players have older siblings that played in 3A, so they want to play the same teams."

The Trailblazers will have some rebuilding to do, as senior Kaden Romig is the only one of eight all-state players returning to the Trailblazers this season. Stienmetz said Romig's presence, both on the line on offense and as a linebacker on defense, will be key.

"No one ever outworks that kid," Stienmetz said. "He is skilled at getting to the ball and making the tackle due to his preparation. Kaden's motor is great also and he never comes off the field. He is a great leader for us everywhere he goes."

Romig led Torrington's defense in tackles with 81 and was second in defensive points. His totals included eight tackles for loss and two sacks.

In all, the defense returns four of its top nine tacklers from 2023.

Senior Mac Hibben had 51 tackles and three interceptions, while junior Landre

Greiman added 47 tackles and led Torrington with five interceptions.

Senior Nathanial Stull added 42 tackles and also deflected five passes.

Seniors Andrew Haffner (23 tackles) and Ryan Moorehouse (22 tackles) also saw significant playing time on defense, and senior Jeremiah Haffner - Andrew's twin brother - also figures into the Trailblazers' plans.

On offense, the Trailblazers lost their top three rushers and four of their top five, leaving Greiman (22 carries, 146 yards) as the top returning rusher.

Greiman was also a threat through the air: he was second for the Trailblazers in

receptions (27) and receiving yards (403), scoring three touchdowns via the pass. Stull chipped in 12 catches for 120 yards, and Hibben had 11 catches for 99 yards.

Moorehouse, who went 4-for-6 with 41 passing yards, is the top returning passer and is penciled in to take over at quarterback. Senior Brayden Hime will be one of the

leaders on the line. Stienmetz said the momentum from last

vear's championship has carried over to this year's team. He said last year's seniors "wanted to do whatever they could to help the team in any way possible. The upperclassmen saw what it took to accomplish the task and want to keep rolling."

Cody Sticks to Winning Formula

In four years, Cody has reached four Class 3A championship games, securing two titles and a combined record of 41-4 along the way.

The Broncs, though, continually

stay focused on the process. "Our program really is about more than football," said coach Matt McFadden, who has helped Cody win four state titles in his 11 years as head coach. "It sounds like cliché, but the more we focus on character (and) leadership the better we are at football. The opposite doesn't always hold true.

After finishing one game short of another championship last season, Cody returns one of 3A's most talented groups. The Broncs return six all-state players, tied with Star Valley for the most in the state at any level.

They're all seniors: Maddax Ball, Wyatt Barton, Chase Hatch, Grady McCarten, Trey Smith and Warren Sorensen.

Ball handled duties under center, completing 67.5% of passes (181 of 268) for 2,130 yards and 27 touchdowns; he also ran 87 times for 421 yards and nine more TDs, finishing second on the team in rushing yards.

Experience will help Cody install base concepts more quickly and allow for more adjustments sooner, McFadden said

"We are confident putting a lot on (Ball's) shoulders," he said. McCarten led the rushing game

with 1,199 yards on 132 carries, including 16 touchdowns. Hatch led Cody with 551

receiving yards and nine receiving touchdowns and tied for the team lead with 36 catches last season.

Barton and Sorenson, meanwhile, will help anchor the offensive line, which McFadden said is smaller but has

"We have some new pieces that are very talented but it may take a few games to get them used to working

Coach Steve Moore, whose players achieved that cursebreaking success in his first year as head coach, said the energy from that postseason success has carried the returning players into the offseason.

"Our numbers are looking good and players are starting to understand what it takes to compete at a high level," he said. "I have noticed great excitement and energy from our athletes this spring.

spring. "... Athletes know the expectations of the program and how we do business. We have set high standards and goals, and we are all on the same page in what needs to be done to achieve them."

The Red Devils graduated four all-state players but return a pair of all-conference choices in seniors Tarrin Haws and Jordan Mendez.

Senior Brecken Rich is the top

returning rusher and was fourth on the team in both carries (17) and rushing yards (52) last year. Senior Braunson Sims is

the only returning player who completed a pass last season; he was 2-of-4 for 16 yards in limited duty. He and junior Brayden Wallace will compete for the starting spot at quarterback.

Senior tight end Clayton Cook was third in receiving yards (240) and fourth in catches (12) for Evanston last year and had a pair of receiving touchdowns. Of the four players who reached triple-digit receiving yards last year, he's the only returner.

Moore, however, said that the lack of varsity experience among the backs and receivers has created a swell of competition.

"We have some guys that I think will fill in nicely and compete at a high level for us," Moore said. "We are going to have some good competition this summer and fall with our skill positions that are going to bring out the best in them."

The defense also lacks varsity experience. Of Evanston's top nine tacklers from 2023, only three return. Rich is the top returning tackler and an on-field leader; he finished tied for fourth on the team in total tackles with 60. He had six tackles for loss.

Seniors Jeran Welling and Jordan Welling will add depth to the offensive and defensive lines, while both Wallace and senior wide receiver/defensive back Brooks Searle will be asked to contribute on both sides of the ball, too.

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Wolves Hungry for Winning Season

The community pressure placed on players in Green River to succeed has not wavered, not even as the Wolves have struggled to find consistent onfield success recently.

Green River has won three games in three years, with last year's only victory of a 1-8 season coming by one point against winless Lander.

This year, though, the players are embracing the high expectations bestowed upon them and are, in the opinion of second-year head coach Blaine Christensen, "miles and miles ahead of where we were (last year)."

As for the external expectations?

"I think our players feed off that (pressure)," Christensen said. "They're excited. They want to make this community proud. I can really sense that now."

The Wolves will look to several juniors this season but will also rely on a senior class pushing close to 20 deep.

Senior James Herwaldt finished second for the Wolves last season with 47 total tackles. He had 6.5 tackles for loss, including 2.5 sacks, and had a pair of fumble recoveries.

Herwaldt also ranked second on the team last year with 208 rushing yards on 55 carries and is Green River's top returning rusher.

"He's going to be our guy this year," Christensen said. "We're going to lean on him pretty heavily."

Junior Maddux Hintz completed 85 of 154 passes for 740 yards and three touchdowns; he also ran 94 times for 198 yards and a team-high four rushing touchdowns, as well.

The Wolves graduated their top five receivers, though, with senior Chaz Helmandollar, whose single catch last season totaled 31 yards, the top returning receiver.

Junior Dax Taylor added five catches for 19 yards and Herwaldt had three catches for 16 yards.

Up front, juniors Ethan Morrell and Declan Henderson and seniors Jayce Stewart and Jacob Lloyd will be key. "I think our line has made the biggest jump from late October last year to now," Christensen said. "... They're doing everything they can to make sure they do their part, as well."

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Of the Wolves' top 14 players in defensive points last season, they return six.

Henderson was third on the team with 39.5 tackles, with 7.5 coming for a loss. Taylor contributed 26 tackles and two interceptions. Senior Jayce Stewart had 24 tackles and four tackles for loss.

Morrell tallied 16 tackles and junior JD Walther had 15.

Christensen said the juniors this year took some hard lessons on the field as sophomores, but they emerged as tough, gritty players ready to take on more.

"Our players are familiar with our coaching style and our language... and our scheme," Christensen said. "They know the expectation with the weight room in the offseason now, and we've had a great offseason."

New Jackson head coach Keith Johnson has already installed change.

Simultaneously, he has seen Jackson football have success, and he said understanding the players returning to the Broncs will help smooth the transition between old and new.

"You have to know the kids, and I think for the kids to know me and be comfortable with me and not have that sort of awkward gap has helped the program just continue to move forward," he said. "There were some good things that came out of the last couple years. ... We've doubled down on a lot of those things."

Still, Jackson graduated its top three rushers and its top three receivers in addition to every player who completed a pass, while the defense graduated its top three tacklers and nine of its top 10 players in defensive points from 2023.

"We don't have a lot of kids that have seen a lot of varsity reps, so we're going to have some work to do there," Johnson said.

Senior Jack Berezay ranked fourth on the team with 41 tackles and led the Broncs with three fumble recoveries.

Junior Connor Scott had 25

tackles, junior Tyson Kendall added 18 and senior Tate Wiley had 10.

Senior Waylon Cosby, with 13 carries for 24 yards last year, is the top returning rusher; no other ball carrier reached double-digit yards last season.

Kendall had 12 catches and was fourth on the team with 123 receiving yards last year and is Jackson's top returning receiver – the only one of Jackson's top six to come back.

Johnson said senior Aidan Kim-Miller will provide leadership on the line, while senior Mattias Wilson, a world juniors champion skier, will fit in at running back and middle linebacker.

Senior Colin Pape, a former lineman, is slated in at tight end and defensive end, while junior Grant Johnson is penciled in at quarterback and junior Liam Logan will see time at wide receiver.

"We're coming in with a lot of belief that we can compete," Coach Johnson said.

Powell **Eyes Postseason Success**

Powell has fallen into a frustrating trend the past three seasons.

Solid regular seasons have not translated into playoff success for the Panthers, who are 0-3 the past three seasons in postseason play.

Last year's first-round loss might have been the most frustrating for coach Chase Kistler.

'I think their biggest reminder (from the playoff loss) is once you're in the playoffs, it's a new season," he said. "What you've done up to that point doesn't really matter."

The Panthers have the capability to change that trend this year with a massive, experienced and talented senior class out front. Powell returns three all-state players in seniors Doug Bettger, Dusty Carter and Keona Wisniewski, as well as two all-conference picks in seniors Trevon Abraham and Jacob Eaton.

They're the spear points of a senior class more than 20 players deep. "This will be the biggest senior class we've had in a long time," Kistler said. "Usually your seniors are your leaders, but with 20-

plus, you're going to have solid leadership." Up front, Bettger, Carter and seniors Zane Graft and Jacob Eaton will lead a physical group of returners where only one starter was lost.

"We are big, experienced, and they communicate really well up front, which is a coach's dream," Kistler said. "... They have their calls down, they know their assignments. It doesn't matter if

the defense shifts on them at the

line."

Despite missing several games due to injury, senior Cody Seifert, returning this year, was the team's top rusher last year, carrying 132 times for 819 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Abraham was second for the Panthers in both receptions (24) and receiving yards (376) last year. Senior Evan Whitlock notched 15 catches for 233 yards to finish third on the team, while Wisniewski added 11 catches for 175 yards and junior Caden Nelson had 10 catches for 105 yards. Each had two receiving touchdowns last season.

Kistler said either Wisniewski or Nelson would move to the quarterback position to fill that gap this season.

Powell returns three of its top five tacklers, including its top two, and seven of its top 11. Wisniewski led the Panthers with 91 tackles,

a tally that included 18 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks. He also had three fumble recoveries to lead the Panthers.

Abraham was second for Powell with 72 tackles; he also had three tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries.

Senior McKale Foley had 39 tackles, Whitlock had 35 and Graft had 27 tackles, 3.5 sacks and three blocked kicks. In addition, Carter had 25 tackles and Seifert 23.

Also returning is senior wide receiver/ defensive back Alex Jordan, who missed most of last season with a broken leg.

Star Valley Sets the Bar Higher

After six championships in nine seasons, Star Valley has had to look beyond one season for program goals.

Like a three-peat. The Braves have won consecutive championships five times since the 1990s. In that effort, they have yet to win a third consecutive title after winning two in a row, going 0-for-5 in such attempts.

A three-time champion has never happened in the Super Bowl era in the NFL, and it's been nearly 90 years since any NCAA FBS-level program has won three consecutive national championships. "We had two chances in the last decade, and


came up short," coach McKay Young said. "This group is motivated to join that elite fraternity.'

Star Valley has a good chance to do so. The Braves return five all-state players, second only to Cody for the most in Class 3A, in seniors Garrett Carlson, Cooper Lawson, Smith McClure, Bryson Nield and Grant Thomson.

Beyond that, Young noted the success of Star Valley's sub-varsity teams – the JV only lost to out-of-state teams, and both the sophomore and freshman teams went undefeated - as a place where the program continues to grow.

"We really pride ourselves in the development of our guys," Young said. "... All of those reps equate to guys that you haven't heard of as juniors because they played JV who have all-state seasons as seniors.

McClure was efficient under center, completing

73.2% of his passes (139 of 190) for 1,600 vards and nine touchdowns. He also ran 65 times for 390 yards and six touchdowns, good for second on the team in all categories, and is the Braves' top returning rusher. Thomson added 19 carries for 127 yards,

good for third on the team, and junior Cooper Lancaster contributed 21 carries for 115 yards.

Nield was Star Valley's top receiver last season, leading the Braves in all major receiving categories with 44 catches for 669 yards and five touchdowns.

However, he is the only one of Star Valley's top six receivers to come back. Despite that, Young said he had confidence in his receiving corps, which will include Lancaster, as well.

Lawson, Carlson and junior Ryan Talbot will bring experience to the offensive line; all three started at some point last year.

Thomson, who will be starting for a third consecutive year, led the Braves in tackles with 92, including a team-high 46 solo. However, of Star Valley's top four tacklers from last season, he's the only returner; of Star Valley's top 10 tacklers from 2023, eight have graduated.

Lawson had 47 tackles, including 8.5 for loss and a teamhigh four sacks.

Senior Riley Erickson had 28 tackles. Carlson and senior Jayden Kunz had 17 tackles apiece and Nield had 14.



Avon Barney, Big Horn. Not many quarterbacks who crack the 2,000-yard passing barrier are underclassmen, but that's what Barney did last year as a junior while earning all-state accolades. He threw for 2,016 yards and also contributed 47 tackles.

Davin Crosby, Lovell. Class 2A's leading passer in terms of yards per game last year (213.9), Crosby was both efficient (56.9% completion) and a long-ball threat (15 yards per completion). He also had 46 tackles.

Eli Gill, Upton-Sundance.

As a sophomore two years ago, he was second in 2A in defensive points per game (25.1); last year, he led 2A (26.0) and tied for the classification lead with nearly 15 tackles per game.

Brody Thiel, Worland. The Warriors' only returning all-state choice is a throwback fullback/ tight end/linebacker who causes a lot of havoc on defense, notching 69 tackles, including 12 for loss, last season.

Max Gregory, Lyman.

One of Class 2A's most efficient defensive players, Gregory has led the Eagles in defensive points each of the past two years and also was effective as a freshman; over three years, he has 270 tackles, including 46 for loss.

Four Questions to Answer

Is there a clear-cut favorite in Class 2A? Yes, but it's complicated. Big Horn was the most consistently named program by coaches this summer. That said, several other teams have the potential for deep playoff runs, including but not limited to Mountain View, Lyman, Cokeville, Worland, Wheatland, Upton-Sundance, Lovell and Newcastle.

Why Big Horn? Because of last year. The Rams were East Conference champions and runners-up to Torrington, and then Torrington made the move to Class 3A. Big Horn also returns two all-staters; no other team in 2A has more than one.

Wait... what was that about Worland? Oh, yeah. After years and years and years of 3A play, the Warriors' student population has fallen far enough for the move to 2A to happen. That will mean an opportunity for a fresh start for a program that's had 14 consecutive losing seasons.

Is the West Conference ahead of the East? Yep. At least one team that's strong enough to make a deep playoff run won't even make the playoffs; that's how much parity could exist in a traditionally tough conference this season.

Four Key Games

Wheatland at Big Horn, Sept. 13. Wheatland traditionally has good numbers and has some good athletes returning, so the Rams' early expectations will have a good early test. Upton-Sundance at Newcastle, Sept. 13. Both the Patriots and the Dogies figure to be improved teams this fall. When they meet in their East Conference openers, we'll all find out quickly whose hopes are legit.

Worland at Cokeville, Oct. 18. Worland and Cokeville are on different ends of the enrollment spectrum but both figure to be players in the West Conference title chase. This Week 7 game will be the first football game between the schools.

Lyman at Mountain View, Oct. 25. Both the Eagles and the Buffalos should be among the top teams in the West title chase this year, and the fact that they're only six miles apart is a nice little added cherry on top.

Rams Look to Continue Success

With 15 championship game appearances since 2000, four more than any other program in Wyoming, the Big Horn Rams know how to succeed.

After a Class 2A championship in 2022 and a runner-up finish last year, the Rams enter 2024 as once again one of the 2A favorites.

Coach Kirk McLaughlin said the Rams aren't planning their trip to Laramie just yet, though.

We work hard in a lot of areas but especially on our culture and our leadership, (and) we take nothing for granted," he said.

"We have a lot of support from our parents and administration too, they help us run this program in a positive direction and without their support we wouldn't have the success that we have."

This season, Big Horn returns two all-state selections - the most in 2A - in seniors Avon Barney and Kolby Butler, a dynamic aerial combination.

Barney completed 130 of 247 passes for 2,016 yards and 22 touchdowns last year. Butler was the top receiver for the Rams, leading them in catches (34) and yards (497) and tying for the team lead in receiving touchdowns (five).

Sophomore Cruz Hernandez, an all-conference choice last year, led Big Horn with 105 carries for 924 yards and 13 touchdowns. Barney added 368 rushing yards and 10 rushing touchdowns.

Senior Daniel Walker finished second on the team in catches with 24 and fourth on the team with 347 receiving yards; he had four receiving touchdowns. Sophomore Bridger Doke chipped in four catches for 138 yards.

Big Horn also took home all five of the top five places in both the 100- and 200-meter dashes at the state track meet in May, with Hernandez and senior Owen Petty among that group. "The boys have worked hard in

many areas of their athleticism," McLaughlin said. "We feel like we have some strengths on this team that we can take advantage of with our schemes."

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The Rams' defense returns four of its top five tacklers.

Petty, an all-conference choice, was second for Big Horn last season with 99 total tackles, including a team-high four sacks.

Walker was third with 73 tackles and also had a team-high five interceptions.

Butler chipped in 59 tackles, including four tackles for loss, and also had three interceptions.

Several other returners had key roles on defense last season. Senior Jackson Davies had 55 tackles, Barney added 47 tackles, senior Billy McCool had 46, senior Will Taylor had 31, junior Paul Lobdell had 27 and Doke had 26.

"We feel we have a good crew coming back and that we should be sound on defense," McLaughlin said. "We have some good athletes coming up that will try new positions, which should make us a better defense overall."

Broncs Gained Valuable Experience

In trying to take a step forward in 2024, the Burns Brones don't need to look far for inspiration.

Burns' 2023 season was a challenge. Outscored by an average score of 39-8, the Broncs' only victory of 2023 came in overtime against winless Glenrock. In every other game, Burns lost by at least 20 points.

Most of the Broncs are returning from that challenging season, though. The inspiration provided by last year's struggles should translate into growth in 2024, coach Travis Romsa said.

"Last year was tough," he said. "We have had a lot of kids buy in this year and show up to the weight room and summer stuff."

Romsa said the Broncs will still be young, but will still have about seven seniors leading the way on a roster of somewhere between 40 and 45 players. In all, seven starters return on both sides of the ball.

Romsa said the returners are both numerous and athletic. especially on defense. The Burns' defense lost its top two tacklers but returns a host of players with significant experience.

On offense, the Broncs will

rely on a pair of senior Masons quarterback Mason Medley and wide receiver Mason Terry – to set the pace.

Medley Mason Medley is the only one of Burns' three all-conference picks coming back in 2024. He completed 72 passes for 865 yards and three touchdowns, but was plagued by 15 interceptions.

Terry led Burns with 39 catches for 499 yards and three touchdowns last year.

"Both Masons should be a big asset for us," Romsa said. "I expect them to be leaders and be the best players on the field. To go with them, we have a lot of young talent. Our passing game should improve this year."

Junior Hunter Munson chipped in 13 catches for 118 yards and one touchdown.

Burns lost its top two rushers to graduation, though, leaving

Medley and his 39 rushing yards – and four rushing touchdowns - as the best among the Broncs'

returners.

Junior Stephen Archer leads returners on the line.

Senior Cooper Sanchez, who was third for Burns with 49 tackles last year, fronts the defensive returners. Sanchez's totals include four tackles for loss.

Terry added 47 tackles, good for fourth on the team, and led Burns with four pass deflections.

Munson had 31 tackles, sophomore Hagen Cowley had 29 and junior Anthony Acton had 21, giving Burns a solid set of players who know the system and who are ready to take a step up for 2024.

"We will have some new kids starting this year and we are smaller," Romsa said. "With that, though, we are smart and tough.

... We have some great kids to fill those spots."

Barrett notched 21 tackles, sophomore Brody Allen had 20 and junior Brady Dona had 17.



With a big group of underclassmen leading the way this season, Newcastle coach Matt Conzelman wasn't sure what to expect this season.

After summer camp, he came away excited by what he saw from his returning players. "This group of guys has potential," Conzelman said.

"We've just got to put in the work."

Newcastle will rely on a big junior class to grow into their roles this year, but most of them already have varsity

experience. "Now they're finally at it where it is their team," Conzelman said. "We're going to have a lot of guys on the field with a lot of experience, so that's exciting." The Dogies return three all-conference players in juniors

Cole Erb and Teddy Troftgruben and sophomore Landon Hatheway, who was also Newcastle's only all-state selection last year.

Hatheway led Newcastle's backfield with 142 carries for 741 yards and eight touchdowns. He didn't start the season as the No. 1 running back, but when junior Collin McConkey – who also returns this season – broke his elbow in an early game against Buffalo, Hatheway had to step into



the top running back spot as a freshman. "I was happy how he finished that year out," Conzelman said. "We talked about it at camp (this

summer) a little bit with him that there's no pressure on him. I told him, 'This is probably the year where I've had the most skill position (players).... Don't feel like you have the be "the guy."

Troftgruben completed 32 passes for 404 yards and two touchdowns and also ran 80 times for 332 yards and two more scores.

Sophomore Dane Crabtree added 28 carries for 226 yards and three touchdowns. The Dogies retain three of their top four rushers from last year. Conzelman said senior Connor Stolhammer will also contribute in the backfield.

Junior Cort Perino, with three catches for 63 yards good for second on the team last year - is Newcastle's top returning pass-catcher. Hatheway added five catches for 35 yards.

The line will be led by seniors with center Danye Evenson, tackle Jonathan Anderson and guard Aidan Butler.

At camp, Conzelman said, "I was pleased with how efficient the offense was and how fast they're retaining even some new stuff we're throwing in.'

Newcastle's top five tacklers from last year are all back. Junior Jace Rich led the Dogies' defense last year with 54 tackles. Butler had 48 tackles, including nine for loss, while Erb had 42 tackles, with a team-leading 10 for loss and three sacks.

Troftgruben added 41 tackles and Hatheway had 39. Other returning defensive contributors are Crabtree (27 tackles, four for loss, and two interceptions); Anderson (20 tackles); Perino (18 tackles); and McConkey (17 tackles).

Eagles Will Grapple With Opponents

Partly by design, partly by necessity, the Tongue River football team will look significantly different in 2024 than it did in 2023.

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First, the necessity: Tongue River graduated six of its seven allconference players, with senior Jack Melger the only one returning from that group.

Second, the design: Coach Steve Hanson saw this coming, and he knew a change in strategy would benefit the roster he has.

Where last year's Eagles benefitted from athleticism, size and confidence, this year's team will benefit from technique, unity and physicality. Hanson said the Eagles' small

stature - no player over 6 feet tall or over 200 pounds – allows some rethinking of what the Eagles do and how they do it.

"We're not a physically imposing team," Hanson said. "We're not going to look great getting off the bus.

On the field, though, the Eagles will rely on being physical and using technique to get the better of opponents. Nine of the Eagles' 11 projected starters are wrestlers, Hanson said, "which I love. Wrestlers tend to bring a different physicality (to football)." Still, Tongue River returns

just one starter on offense (quarterback Carter Maslowski) and three on defense.

Melger was second on the Eagles' defense with 62 tackles last season and was third in defensive

points. His tackle totals included 10.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks.

Junior Cash Vollmer had 35 tackles and senior Caleb Vollmer, his brother, added 31, including 9.5 for loss and three sacks. Senior Kaden Hill had 26 tackles.

On offense, Maslowski completed 101 of 164 passes for 1,474 yards and 16 touchdowns.

However, the Eagles' top three receivers graduated, and junior Hagen Walker (two catches for 64 yards) is the top returning receiver in terms of yards.

Hanson said sophomore Kenyonn Snell could have a breakout season at wide receiver.

Hill was third on the team last year with 245 rushing yards on 33 carries, including two touchdowns. Melger added 23 carries for 118 yards.

Seniors Nathan Heser and Nate

Ridgeway will be counted on to set the pace for others on the line. Cash Vollmer will also contribute at center.

Hanson said size on the line won't be there, but scheme will help the Eagles overcome that, particularly on defense.

"They're not gap control guys, so we can get away with playing 160-pound dudes, even inside, because we teach them to create havoc," he said.

Hanson said the offense will focus more on misdirection, power running and play action. "They know that there's not a

superstar who can overcome a deficiency," Hanson said. "They have to be together. ... These guys know that they've got to do it together, and they're actually excited about that team focus this year.'



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Wolves Making Jump to 2A

The word floating around Moorcroft football right now is "change."

The Wolves have a new coach in Cameron Braden, are in a new classification after moving to Class 2A, and are playing a new style of football in moving from nine-man to 11-man.

"This year will be a good test for us and see how we can compete," Braden said. "I have faith in these guys that they can step up a level." Also new this year is playoff eligibility, something the Wolves didn't have as a Class 1A

nine-man team. Braden, a Moorcroft native who has spent five years coaching with Moorcroft's football programs at the high school and junior high level, said a playoff opportunity has been a positive for the players.

The Wolves return two all-conference players in seniors Braydnn Terry and Oliver Gorsuch. Terry was an all-state pick last year for his work

Braden said for as talented as Terry is, he can't be everywhere all at once. Depth has to grow for Terry to have chances to catch his breath every so often.

The offense will maintain the principles that let Terry have a solid season, though, Braden said. "I'm going to do my best to have the guys on the field get their chance to shine," he said.

Every rusher who gained positive yards is back this season, as are the team's top two quarterbacks. Senior William Ripley and sophomore Hayden

Amende split time under center, with Amende taking over after Ripley was injured. Amende completed 15 passes for 332 yards, while Ripley completed 18 passes for 154 yards. Amende added 56 rushing yards while Ripley had 172.

Braden said Ripley will take the snaps this year and that Amende has the versatility to play many different positions.

Junior Lathan Dewey added four catches for 40 yards.

Gorsuch will lead the returners on the line. The Wolves' defense returns its top three tacklers and six of its top 10.

In addition to Terry, senior Trenten Gray added 60 tackles, good for second on the team, and five tackles for loss.

Gorsuch was third on the team with 36 tackles, including seven for loss. Junior Riley DeHaven added 21 tackles, junior Truck Lowery added 20 and sophomore Brady Garoutte had 14.

Braden said his goal this year was to instill a confidence in his players that even if they have less raw talent, "we can out-work our opponents."

Patriots Put Youngsters to Test

UPTON-SUNDANCE PATRIOTS

On a team that won't have a ton of depth, at least by Class 2A standards, the Upton-Sundance Patriots will not need to look far for leadership.

Senior Eli Gill, Upton-Sundance's only returning all-state or all-conference player, will be at the forefront of the Patriots' plans. It makes sense; Gill is already a two-time all-

state selection. Gill led the defense with 117 total tackles, including 42 solo and 10.5 for loss. He also recovered three fumbles and broke up eight passes, both team highs.

On offense, he was second for the Patriots in both rushing and receiving yards last year, tallying 248 receiving yards on a team-high 39 catches and running 60 times for 210 yards. He scored five touchdowns.

"The expectations are high for him to get our young kids bought in to what we're doing and just kind of lead our team for this season," coach Andy Garland said.

Garland said he expected about 20-25 players out, with a senior class of about five or six. Garland said he will rely on a lot of ninth-graders

to contribute immediately. "We have a really good younger freshman class coming in," he said. "They will see a lot of playing time this year, and they're a pretty good group."

Offensively, the Patriots will need a new quarterback but do return a couple contributors in addition to Gill. Senior Jayden Keller notched 32 carries for 111 yards, and senior Rhett Watt

chipped in 10 catches for 151 yards and two touchdowns.

Up front, senior Ryan Baker will lead a group that has several players returning from injuries last season. Senior Jackson East and junior Reed Banker will also be counted on for solid line play.

"A big thing for us is just keeping those guys healthy that were banged up last year," Garland said. "We had three starters, o-line, who were injured for a big part of the year.

It's just going to be a learning curve week to week. It seems like every year playing 2A, you've got to have a significant force up front to compete. ... Hopefully, with those kids getting healthy and another year under their belt, that should help us at least a little bit."

The defense returns with seven of its top 10 tacklers returning from 2023, with Gill leading the way.

Keller had 48 tackles, including three for loss while junior Trey Schneider added 46 tackles. East had 31 tackles and senior Ryan Baker had 30.

Sophomore Lyman Halverson had 25 tackles, while senior Jake Schommer had 23 tackles and a team-high three interceptions and Banker had 16 tackles.

His Bulldog team this season will look different from last year's squad, both in approach and in personnel.

The Bulldogs graduated their top four rushers and their quarterback, as well as their top two receivers; they return no players who attempted a pass or accumulated double-digit rushing yards. They also graduated six of their nine top tacklers.

However, entering his second year as head coach, Borton said the Bulldogs have good experience, just not always at the varsity level. With a group of about a dozen



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seniors leading the way for a roster that will start in the mid-40s total, Wheatland will be in position to be competitive.

"We have a pretty good core of guys that are bought in to what we're doing, (and) good leadership," Borton said. "... We have a really good attitude overall."

That starts with the senior class. Senior Jake Hyche was an all-state choice, and senior Bode Stone was an all-conference selection.

Hyche, a defensive end, led Wheatland in defensive points and tied for the team lead with 60 tackles. His 10.5 tackles for loss and seven sacks led the Bulldogs.

Stone added 47 tackles, fourth-best on the team, and 7.5 tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and the team's only safety last season.

On offense, Hyche will move under center this season, a role he fulfilled in backup duty last year. Borton, who will also be taking over as offensive coordinator this fall, said the Bulldogs will probably run a scaled-down version of what they ran last year with some new formation wrinkles to boot.

"It's going to be simpler," he said. "My hope is that the guys are just free to get downhill and play hard.

free to get downhill and play hard. "… I'm going to really focus on execution. You may know what's coming, but we want to run it perfectly." Senior Waylon Milnes, with 12 catches for 81 yards, is the top returning receiver. He ranked third on the team in both categories last year. Hyche added six catches for 69 yards.

Defensively, Milnes had 31 tackles, two interceptions and six pass deflections, and senior Abad Luna had 26 tackles. However, no other returner reached double-digit tackles last season.

Borton said senior Quincy Palmer will also add depth to the linebacking corps.

One quirk of 2024? Wheatland will mostly have to be a road team. The Bulldogs have their first four games on the road and only have three home games compared with six road games total.

"That's a tough break for (our seniors), but the way it shook out last year, we played better on the road than at home," Borton said.

Panthers Relying on Tradition

As the smallest Class 2A football school, Cokeville's players now they have to both show up and show out.

That's rarely a problem for a tradition-rich program that's been doing that for decades.

Coach Marty Linford said about 90% of the boys in the school are out for this year's Panther football team – totaling around 33 players – and each one of them has been committed to getting better.

"We've got some good kids coming back and they've been working hard in the offseason," Linford said. "We've had great attendance in our weight room, so that's a positive thing."

The Panthers return four allconference selections, tied with Big Horn for the most in Class 2A, in seniors Kalob Haderlie, Justin Moyes, Ryder Pope and Kayson Walker. The four all-conference players were anchors on Cokeville's defense last year, all finishing in the top six on the team in tackles.

Kayson Walker had 94 tackles, No. 2 on the team, and had seven tackles

for loss, two fumble recoveries and two interceptions.

Pope was third with 81 tackles, including two sacks, while Haderlie was fourth with 79 and had six tackles for loss.

Moyes, meanwhile, had 60 tackles, three fumble recoveries, two interceptions and four pass deflections.

"We've got a lot of them coming back, and they've been playing football for a long time," Linford said. "They've been starting since they were freshmen and sophomores."

Sophomore Kashton Walker added 31 tackles and senior Brodie Dean, who missed much of last year due to injury, added 25.

Junior Trip Reece and sophomore Flint Linford will add depth at the linebacker position, while senior Brenden Hymer will help anchor the defensive line.

Offensively, Kayson Walker completed 36 of 77 passes for 521 yards and four touchdowns. He's also Cokeville's top returning rusher with 263 yards and two touchdowns on 67 carries last season; the Panthers graduated their top two rushers and no other returner reached even 50 yards last year.

Coach Linford said the senior will likely move to running back this year to solidify the Panthers' run-first offense.

"He's going to touch the ball a lot on offense," coach Linford said. Kashton Walker will likely move to

quarterback, coach Linford said. Moyes led the Panthers with

14 catches and was second with 180 receiving yards; he had two touchdowns receiving.

Dean will add depth to the backfield. Senior Gavin Weske, who returns after a year away, will play tight end and defensive back.

Last season's narrow loss to eventual state champion Torrington in the quarterfinals has given Cokeville confidence, as well.

"If we had a break or two go our way, that could have been us playing in that state (championship) game," coach Linford said.

Rangers Relying on Experience

It would be easy for Kemmerer's opponents this season to be confused by the Rangers; after all, this year's Kemmerer team looks almost identical to last year's.

With nine defensive and eight offensive starters returning, the 2024 squad will look quite a bit like 2023's bût will be a year older, a year better and a year more experienced.

That said, Kemmerer's 14th consecutive season without a playoff victory was a challenge; last year's only victory came in the season opener against winless Glenrock.

From that team, though, the Rangers return almost all of their contributors.

Every player who caught a pass for the Rangers last year also returns. Junior Bryson McGill was Kemmerer's top receiver with six catches for 71 yards and the team's only receiving touchdown. Emery and Fox each had four catches for 22 yards and Rogers also had a catch for 15 yards.

Defensively,

Kelley was second for the Rangers with 69 tackles, leading all returners.

Other returners who saw significant defensive time include senior Owen Barton (55 tackles),

Krell (49), senior Bridger Anderson (48), senior Roany Proffit (42), Rogers (41) and Emery (38).

Kelley led the Rangers with 3.5 tackles for loss, while Rogers and Krell had two fumble recoveries apiece.

McGill added 19 tackles and an interception and also led Kemmerer with three pass deflections, and sophomore Noah Parks had 11 tackles.

Jernigan said he hoped this year's defensive returners would be sound in the Rangers' schemes.

"Now hopefully we can take that next step in season, game planning and that kind of stuff," Jernigan said.

with a young, exciting group of athletes and a great coaching staff," Lake said.

Turning around a program with just one winning season and one playoff berth since 2009 will not come easily, but the Wranglers do return several players who saw significant minutes last season, including six starters on offense and seven on defense. Bobcats Have Wealth of Experience

In a season where Thermopolis will have a lot of stability carrying over from last season, one big change highlights the first few weeks of the season.

Thermopolis' renewal of its rivalry with Worland, happening in the Class 2A West Conference opener for both teams in Week 2, has put an interesting spin on the first bit of 2024 campaign for the Bobcats. "I've asked around about who was

our rival when I first got here, and the answer was, 'We aren't sure," second-year coach Boone Bowker said. "So having an actual rivalry game where there's a little more on the line is going to fun."

The team that takes that field this season for Thermopolis will be an experienced and talented group, with eight starters back on offense and

The Bobcats return their quarterback, as well as every rusher and pass receiver who reached double-digit yards. On defense, of the 14 players who had at least 20 tackles last year, Thermopolis returns nine.

"What I'm excited for is we started to lay our foundation of what we wanted last year," Bowker said. "Now we get to start framing it. ... We were learning how to compete last year, and now we get the

opportunity to compete this year." Seniors Ryan Arends, Del Dukes and Zane Stam were all-conference choices last year for the Bobcats, who went 2-6 in 2023.

Stam led the rushing game with 137 carries for 550 yards and two touchdowns.

Del Dukes led the receivers in all major categories with 16 catches for 381 yards and three touchdowns.

Junior quarterback Armani Dukes completed 41 passes for 627 yards and six touchdowns; he also ran 113 times for 364 yards and six more TDs.

Stam and Arends went 1-2 for the Bobcat defense last year in tackles, with Stam leading the way with 69 tackles and Arends notching 64. Stam also recovered three fumbles while Arends tied for the team lead with three sacks.

Armani Dukes tied for third on the team with 45 tackles. Del Dukes added 28 tackles, four pass deflections, two fumble recoveries and an interception.

Several other defensive returners give the Bobcats both depth and experience across the board. Hastie added 36 tackles, senior Brody Sorensen had 28, junior Bridger Peil had 25, junior Cruz Mascarro had 24, junior Cody Bomengen had 21 tackles and four pass deflections, and senior Logan Dafoe had 20 tackles,

three sacks and three forced fumbles. The defense has "a lot of guys returning and (they) understand the scheme," Bowker said. Bowker said this year's returners

were dedicated to both track and to the weight room, and that work "will help them and us tremendously."

Warriors Could be 2A Bullies

With nine returning starters on both offense and defense and numerous players who saw quality time last year, Worland has the opportunity to improve on last year's 3-6 finish. Also helping? A move from

Class 3A to Class 2A, a move that makes the Warriors the secondlargest school in the classification in terms of enrollment.

Class 2A is nothing new to first-year head coach Marty Wrage, who is aware of the challenge that 2A football presents from his time

as head coach at nearby Greybull. "Coming from 2A in the past, I understand the quality of teams, players and coaches in 2A," Wrage said. "We are working hard to get ready for the transition and changes of a new staff. We are really just focusing on what we can control."

With change comes some new looks, Wrage said, as players adapt to new positions. Regardless, the Warriors bring back four all-conference players, tied with Big Horn and Cokeville for the most in 2A, in seniors Brody Thiel, Masen Decker, Daniel Lopez and Fisher Martinez.

The seven players who gained at least one yard rushing all return this season, as do the Warriors'

top five receivers from 2023.

Senior Cale Cheatham led the Warriors in rushing, carrying for 267 yards last season, while Decker was second with 104 yards.

Decker and junior Colt Weber both saw time at quarterback. Weber finished with more yards (344) and touchdowns (five) on his 29 completions, but Decker completed more passes (42) on his way to 285 yards and one touchdown.

In receiver-by-committee, Decker led the way with 12 catches for 169 yards and three touchdowns; senior Will Slagle had 12 catches for 161 yards and three scores; senior Ryan Deniz had seven catches for 123 yards;

senior Roman Parra had 25 catches for 122 yards; and Cheatham had 11 catches for 75 yards.

The defense is also stacked, starting with Thiel, an allstate choice who led the Warriors with 69 tackles, 12 tackles for loss and six sacks. In all, three of Worland's top four tacklers are back.

"I would say the

strength of our team at this point is the defense," Wrage said. Parra had 59 tackles to finish

second on the team. Junior Gunner Mascaro had 50 tackles, two fumble recoveries and two blocked kicks. Martinez had 37.5 tackles.

A host of others who saw extended playing time also return. Lopez had 25 tackles, Slagle had 24 tackles and four pass deflections and senior Bronson Newell had 23 tackles. Decker had 22 tackles, led Worland with three interceptions and tied for the team lead with five pass breakups



What's new? Longtime Southeast coach Mark Bullington retired. Former assistant coach Shawn Burkart is more than capable of helping the Cyclones continue without missing a step, but it will feel weird for a while not having Bullington behind it all.

Four Key Games

Rocky Mountain at Big Piney, Sept. 27. How much did graduation losses hurt the Punchers repeat chances? Are the Grizzlies really the West's heir apparent? We find out in the first week of West Conference games.

Lingle at Southeast, Oct. 10. It would be easy to overlook the Doggers' Goshen County neighbors this year. However, the Cyclones may represent Lingle's biggest East Conference challenge this season.

Wind River at Big Piney, Oct. 12. It's hard to look away from a state championship rematch, but this game will far from resemble the one that happened in Laramie last November. Both teams had heavy losses due to graduation.

Pine Bluffs at Lingle, Oct. 18. If Pine Bluffs doesn't blow a 24-point lead and doesn't lose in overtime to the Doggers last season, maybe we're talking about the Hornets as this year's frontrunners.

Louden Bremer, Lingle. Bremer was Class 1A nine-man's offensive MVP last season after leading the Doggers in both rushing and receiving. He had 1,106 rushing vards and 405 receiving yards. He was also Lingle's leading tackler.

Caden Clifford, Big Piney. The number 1,286 -- the number of yards Clifford had last season -- sticks out like crazy among nine-man's returners. But he is also Big Piney's top returning tackler.

Kaiden Riggs, Lingle. After a one-year stopover in Torrington, where he helped the Trailblazers win a Class 2A championship by running for 1,275 yards and 10 TDs, Riggs is back where it all started for his senior season.

Junior Conner Bristow added 43 carries for 129 yards and sophomore Jayden Wagner-Gross had 60 carries for 76 yards, as the Vikings return their top three rushers.

Junior Corbin Weinkauf was second for Guernsey last season in receiving yards with 179; he had 20 catches. Wagner-Gross added 26 catches for 125 yards.

Lingle Looks to Take Next Step

Lingle had a taste of success last season.

This year's goal isn't to just taste, though. It's to feast.

The Doggers went undefeated in the regular season last year, but eventual state champion Big Piney rocked the Doggers in Lingle in a

51-27 loss that ended the season. "Losing in the semifinals gave our kids an idea of what it will take to jump levels and compete for a state title," coach Brandon Gifford said. "We learned a lot about ourselves as football players and the areas where we have to improve if we are going to chase a championship."

The Doggers are in good shape to do just that this year. Despite graduating six seniors, Lingle returns all four of its all-state choices in seniors Louden Bremer and Cooper Smith and juniors Anthony Arnusch and Colt Brown.

In addition, the Doggers will benefit from the return of senior Kaiden Riggs, an allstate selection with Lingle as a sophomore who helped Torrington to the Class 2A championship last year. Riggs notched another all-state selection after rushing for 1,275 yards and 10 touchdowns last year with the Trailblazers. Bremer, the Class 1A nine-man

offensive player of the year in 2023, led the Doggers' rushing game with 150 carries for 1,106 yards and 19 touchdowns last season. He was also Lingle's top receiver, catching 28 passes for 405 yards and another five touchdowns.

Brown chipped in 539 rushing yards, good for third on the team, on 86 carries, including seven touchdowns.

Junior Brady Cook completed 71 of 123 passes for 898 yards and 10 touchdowns. He returns his top four receivers from 2023. Senior Ned Nelson was the

Doggers' No. 2 receiver with 27 catches for 293 yards and five touchdowns, while Arnusch added 14 catches for 259 yards and three TDs.

The defense returns its top

four players in defensive points in Bremer, Smith, Brown and Arnusch, and seven of its top nine tacklers.

Bremer led the Doggers with 104 tackles and also had two fumble recoveries, two interceptions and two blocked kicks.

Brown added 97 tackles, while Smith had 89, including team highs in tackles for loss with 22 and sacks with 10.

Arnusch had 29 tackles but led the Doggers with four interceptions and 17 pass deflections.

Junior Colter McFarlin added 31 tackles, Nelson had 27 and junior Brayden Posten had 24.

"I think with the success we had last year it just helped validate to our kids and our coaches that we are on the right track and that we are doing the right things," Gifford said. "We realize that we need to continue to get better, understanding that if we aren't growing, we are dying.²

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Tigers have Something to Prove

Lusk's 2023 season looked like one big bell curve – down, up, down.

After an 0-2 start, Lusk won four of its next five games and was looking like a contender for postseason success.

That finish never happened, though. In the final two weeks of the season, blowout losses to Wright (39-0) and Wind River (68-6) ended the Tigers' season. In two weeks, a promising season turned into frustration, then inspiration, coach Chris Skeen said.

'They were embarrassed by the way the season ended last year,' Skeen said. "It seems they are more bought in this year. So far we have kids participating in off-season activities and wanting to put in the time.'

Lusk is in good position to be improved this fall thanks to a bevy of returners. Lusk returns both of its all-state selections in senior Jackson Smith and sophomore Raynce Brott, and two other all-conference picks in senior Ridge Kupke and junior Nathan Miller.

Smith completed 73 of 122 passes for 1,260 yards and 16 touchdowns last season. Miller was his favorite

target; he caught 34 passes for 757 yards and nine touchdowns to lead the team. However, the Tigers graduated their No. 2 and 3 receivers; no other returner had more than 33 receiving yards last year.

"One of the main goals this year is to be more effective in how we attack defenses," Skeen said. "We need to have a legit threat running the ball and be more balanced than last year. Hopefully (we) use some more play-action and (do) less out of the shotgun."

Kupke was second for the Tigers in rushing last year, running 53 times for 206 yards, and led Lusk with seven rushing touchdowns. Miller had 18 carries for 146 yards.

Skeen said the offensive line will need to come along for the offense to be

effective. The Tigers' top five players in defensive points and top eight tacklers all return.

Brott led the Tigers in defensive points. He was second on the team with 71 tackles but had a team-high

20 tackles for loss as well as four blocked kicks.

Miller led the Tigers with 85 tackles and had a team-high three pass deflections.



As the Cyclones' defensive coordinator with Bullington for the past 25 years, and as someone who played under Miller's tutelage in high school, he knows the school, the program and the players well enough to keep the momentum strong for a program that has won nine state titles since 1999.

Burkart said Southeast will have "some new wrinkles, certainly, but you're not going to see drastic changes.'

Burkart also retains a team just on the cusp of another breakthrough. In last year's 7-3 season, the Cyclones lost three games by a combined five points room already, speed and agility workouts."

Southeast retained a pair of allstate selections in senior Ayden Desmond and junior T.J. Moats, as well as all-conference choice senior Emmett Coxbill.

Moats (21 catches, 241 yards, two TDs) and Sauer (11 catches, 123 yards, two touchdowns) from last year's receiving corps.

Coxbill returns to the line, while senior linemen Sebastion Brumley and Alex DeMarce and junior Liam Haas will also be counted on for interior play. Seniors Ayden Shimic and Kannon Tippets and junior Beaux Shimic will add depth at wideout.

Defensively, the Cyclones retain two leaders in Moats and Desmond. Desmond led the Cyclones with five interceptions and seven pass deflections and finished third on the team with 70 tackles. Moats, meanwhile, had 67 tackles, including 21 for loss and 10 sacks, and three fumble recoveries.

Sauer added 45 tackles, Coxbill had 39 including three sacks, and senior William Knowlton added 34.

Grizz Have Strong Foundation

For second-year Rocky Mountain coach Jessee Wilson, the 2024 season will be about growth.

Players are physically growing bigger, stronger and faster than they were last year, and they're mentally growing into a system that will allow for more flexibility than last season.

"I think it was really important last year to build that foundation of knowledge for our kids, and now we can open things up a bit more, which I'm really looking forward to," Wilson said. "... They're older and bigger and stronger, so we can be a little bit more creative because we have kids that are capable of doing some of those things.

And how - Rocky Mountain, 4-5 last season, returns five all-conference players, most in the Class 1A nine-man West Conference. They include seniors Lafe Files, Tucker Jackson and Hayden Wambeke and juniors Tayt Beall and Triffen Jolley. Jackson is the lone returning

all-state pick. He led the Grizzlies with 23 catches for 452 yards and three touchdowns. On defense, Jackson topped the team with six interceptions, including three defensive touchdowns, and was fourth for Rocky with 41 total tackles.

"It's nice to kind of have a cheat code on your team like that,' Wilson said.

Under center, Files completed 80 of 170 passes for 989 yards and nine touchdowns. He also ran 68 times for 251 yards and six touchdowns, and is the only Grizzly returner who broke the triple-digit rushing yardage mark last year.

However, Wilson said he wanted to take advantage of his experienced linemen, including Wambeke and Beall, and rely more on the running game this season.

"We're big, tough and physical (up front)," he said. Junior Clayton Thompson added 10 catches for 119 yards and one touchdown. Aside from Jackson,

no other returner had more than 26 receiving yards.

On the other side of the ball, Jolley and Thompson were by far the Grizzlies' top two tacklers last season. Jolley led the team with 84 tackles, including 54 solo, 16 for loss and five sacks. He also led Rocky with three fumble recoveries.

Thompson added 74 tackles,

with 12 for loss, and four sacks. Total, Rocky Mountain retained eight of the 10 players who had at least 20 tackles last season. Senior Matthew Crosby had 27 tackles, Wambeke had 25, Beall had 23 and senior Hudson May, who is returning from an arm injury that limited his action last season, added 20.

Wilson also said the competitive fire on the practice field is helping "We're building a little bit of

depth there," he said. "We've got probably another eight sophomores and we've got another really big freshman class of 12 or 13 kids that are ready to play.

Cougars Could Contend Again

Wind River coach Rod Frederick won't call 2024 a rebuilding year.

After all, the Cougars return about five seniors who have been with the program for three years. The returners showed their mettle last fall, when Wind River went 8-2, won the 1A nine-man West Conference and finished as state runners-up.

Frederick also said returning players were good about both attending camps and weight room sessions this summer.

And they're not newbies.

"One of the things that I really stressed last year, (especially) in the games we were up big in, we wanted to get our JV kids in," Frederick said. " ... They got to see varsity action. They weren't starting the game, but at least they got to see the speed and see what it's like.'

Even so, the Cougars graduated six of their top nine rushers (and lost another to transfer), every player who completed a pass, all but one player who caught a pass and all but one player who had doubledigit tackles.

Senior Brayden Tatro was the only one of seven all-state and eight all-conference selections not lost to graduation. Tatro was second for the Cougars with 322 rushing yards last season, racking up four touchdowns. He also was third on the team with 182 receiving yards, scoring twice on nine catches. He's the only returner to catch a pass last season.

Defensively, Tatro was third in defensive points and tied for fourth in tackles with 42. He notched four tackles for loss, two sacks, two interceptions and three pass deflections.

Frederick said Tatro, by default, will be one of the Cougars' leaders.

"I'm hoping that this year he steps it up and can take that role on, because he's going to be one of our main weapons either at a running back or a quarterback spot," he said.

Junior center Troy Tidzump is the only other returning starter. Senior Jacob Hardcastle

chipped in eight carries for 75

yards; no other returner had more than 3 yards rushing. Defensively, the Cougars

graduated eight of their top nine tacklers from 2023. Senior Mato Amos, who had nine tackles last season, is second behind Tatro in tackles among the Cougars returners.

Who will start under center is still a question, but Frederick said Tatro, Amos and senior Remyngton Martinez were all up for the position.

Junior linemen Isaiah Remacle and Holden Yeates will be counted on to fill in up front on both the offensive and defensive lines. Junior Ben Snyder will also contribute from an end's spot on offense and either a defensive end or linebacker on defense.

"They're a little bit smaller, but we're hoping that we get some quickness out of them," Frederick said.

Eagles Looking For Some Stability

Without question, the team that enters the 2024 season with the most question marks is the St. Stephens Eagles.

The football program has been in a tumble for several years, often due to circumstances beyond the control of players and coaches.

In the four seasons since 2019, the Eagles have only played eight games – five in 2021, three in 2022 - and went 1-7 in those games.

The Eagles did not play last season; that came on the heels of canceling their final five games of the 2022 season. The Eagles also did not field a team in 2020 due to COVID-19 precautions. This season, St. Stephens will

not be competing for a playoff

spot, playing a patchwork schedule of six-man and nineman games. A full schedule has not yet been set. Despite the setbacks, coach Matt House said one undeniable fact has become apparent to him in his time working with his players.

"I can tell you that our players want to play football," House said, "and football has not been looked at as a priority sport here at St. Stephens.

House said the Eagles, who are technically classified as a Class 1A nine-man school by enrollment, will mostly play a six-man schedule both this year and next year.

"The numbers were not there with the schedule that was put in front of us," he said. "We had to cancel most games because of eligibility and numbers of participants.

I envision a little bit easier time for eligibility and numbers because we were moved down a level in WHSAA. (Six-man) football should be easier to field a team."

House said he's not sure what the Eagles will do after that, especially if St. Stephens is again classified in nine-man.

"Moving forward, football may always struggle for numbers, and we will try to do the best we can for those who participate," he said.

House said he will have about a dozen players out, including senior wide receivers Ethan Fighting Bear and Daniel Black. Junior Tristan Monroe will be a key player in the backfield, either at quarterback or at halfback, and junior Tyson Whiteplume will help on the line.

Of the group, Black was the only one who showed up on the stat sheets from the last time the Eagles played organized football in the first half of 2022.

Reico Shakespeare (senior) and Mooney Blackburn (junior) are other upperclassmen who will contribute. House said, as well as sophomore Clifton Monroe. House also said he is expecting a trio of freshmen to be a part of the team in Gabriel Torres, Ashton Monroe and Johnny Roberts.

And it's clear what they want to accomplish this season. "They want to play," House

said.

If there's any program in need of a fresh perspective, it's Wyoming Indian. This year, thanks to a

motivated group of players and parents, the Chiefs are in position to shake off several years of disappointment.

Coach Nate Reinhardt said this year's team, led by its seniors and juniors, has put in the work to improve in the offseason, something previous groups have struggled to do.

"They want to do more than just show up in August and play," Reinhardt said. "I have some that want to win. They're starting to correlate that they've got to do something in the offseason, and hopefully that's going to carry over to our younger ones."

The Chiefs finished 0-7 last season, failing to score more than eight points in any game while being outscored 427-42.

For a program with just one playoff berth in program history (1996), Reinhardt said a big part of the Chiefs' offseason motivation has been playoff eligibility. Wyoming Indian is playoff eligible this year after being ineligible the past two.

Reinhardt said, in particular, the junior class has latched on to the possibility of breaking that postseason streak.

"Maybe not this year, but something for their senior year

Reinhardt said year's team will have some athletic players with lots of versatility.

Junior Ben Niedo will lead the returners on the line, and senior Seth Spoonhunter is a versatile "tweener" that can play most anywhere but will contribute specifically as a linebacker on the defensive side of the ball.

Wyoming Indian did not compile individual statistics last season.

"We looked really good in the seven-on-seven (camp)," Reinhardt said. "The problem will be if we can block for them to do anything." The mentality shift for Wyoming Indian has come in part from family support. Reinhardt said the ability for the Chiefs to go to camps at Black Hills State and Thermopolis this summer was in large part due to fundraising that families did.

"I've had very active parents and grandparents help me with making sure we get to do fun stuff like that," Reinhardt said. "... It's really good to just see overall family (and) community support for those kids for something that normally (isn't)."

In the process, Reinhardt said his team has drawn numerous compliments from opposing teams at camps, which drove the Chiefs to continue competing.

"They're wanting to change things around," he said.

Encampment at Casper Christian, Sept. 28. Both the Tigers and Mountaineers have high hopes this season -- Encampment thanks to a deep playoff run last year, Casper Christian thanks to more experience at six-man and nearly a roster full of returners.

Riverside at Burlington, Oct. 18. The Rebels are the big wild card in six-man this year. But if they can't beat their regional rivals, then they'll have to take the long way if they have any hopes of reaching Laramie.

Snake River at Encampment, Oct. 26. In a year with a lot of furnover, this game between the Carbon County rivals is still a critical piece of the state title puzzle.

Huskies Loaded to Defend Crown

After winning their first state championship since 1994, the Burlington Huskies are looking for a new challenge.

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"After chasing a championship for so long, I'm not sure I know how to approach a season without trying to catch up with another team," said coach Trent Aagard, whose team won its first Class 1A six-man title and its third title in school history while finishing 10-1 last season. "So my hope is we come out with the same desire to improve and get better this year.

Burlington has a great place to start – a huge, talented senior class.

Burlington returns four allstate players, more than the rest of Class 1A six-man combined (which has three), in seniors Rykael Andrew, Joe Bassett, Jordan Casey and Weston

Gotfredson. In addition. seniors Jordan Broederlow and Kyler Winters were all-conference choices. Total, Aagard said he expects

nine seniors to lead the repeat attempt, and "all of them were contri-

butors last year. We should also have good depth on the team this year."

In all, the Huskies return their top three receivers and several other contributors on offense in addition to five of their top six tacklers on defense.

Bassett led Burlington's defense with 135 tackles, including 84 solo and 13 for a loss.

Gotfredson finished third on the team with 48 tackles and also had four fumble recoveries and three interceptions.

Broederlow contributed 42 tackles, three interceptions and five pass deflections. Winters had 39 tackles, four tackles for loss, four pass breakups and three fumble recoveries. Andrew added 37 tackles, with three for a loss.

On offense, Bassett was Burlington's No. 2 rusher last year, carrying 88 times for 528 yards and 13 touchdowns. Casey contributed 24 carries for 233 yards and five touchdowns, while Broederlow had 26

carries for 230 yards and three touchdowns.

Bassett and Andrew also threw the ball, with Bassett finishing second on the team with 324 passing yards and five touchdowns on 16-of-23 passing, while Andrew finished 18 of 38 for 286 yards and three scores.

Gotfredson was Burlington's top receiver in yards (500) and tied for the team lead with seven receiving touchdowns, while Bassett had 387 yards and six touchdowns on a team-high 25 catches. Casey added 15 catches for 370 yards and seven scores.

While the Huskies' senior class will lead the way, Aagard he expects only one junior, "so it will be a challenge to bridge that gap and maybe see which of our underclassmen are prepared to contribute.

"I think we might have some kids wanting to participate and work hard so they can be part of the team," he added. "Overall, I think people have been excited about football in Burlington as they ever have."

The Hulett Red Devils had a huge conundrum last season.

Their offense could score pretty much at will.

Their defense, though, made opposing offenses feel the same way.

Junior Kyle Smith is the only one of Hulett's three allconference players to come back this fall. Backen said Smith, along with fellow juniors Benjamin Harrison and Hudson Reilly, will be the strength of what will be a young team, with only two seniors anticipated on the roster of about 12-13 players.

Backen also noted that senior Justen Foster will also be a key piece of the equation this season.

"Their experience and leadership should help us move forward this year," Backen said. "They have been through two learning experience seasons and I feel they are ready to step up and help us win hopefully more games this year."

juniors Jacob Moody and Max Potas.

Moody led the team in carries with 97 last season and was second with 668 rushing yards and seven touchdowns.

Sophomore Remington Harris added 16 carries for 150 yards and three touchdowns, while Potas had 22 carries for 82 yards.

Potas has more experience at quarterback than any other returner; he was second on the team with 42 completions on 65 attempts (64.6% completion) for 362 yards and seven touchdowns. However, Potas is also Meeteetse's leading returning receiver in terms of yards, piling up 298 on 19 catches, including a team-high five receiving touchdowns.

"He is very versatile and can play multiple positions," Hagen said, "but hopefully he can step into more of a permanent (quarterback) role.

Moody led Meeteetse with 20 catches last year and was fourth

on the team with 124 receiving yards; he scored four receiving touchdowns.

Harris leads the defensive returners with 72 tackles last year, good for second on the team, and 8.5 tackles for loss. Potas was third on the team with 61 tackles, with five for loss, and led Meeteetse with four interceptions.

Moody added 34 tackles, junior Johnathan Ogden had 20 and junior Aiden Elliott had 17.

Both sides of the ball will benefit from the return of senior Luukas Rhyti, who missed a good chunk of the 2023 season with an injury. In a year with a thin senior class, Hagen said Rhyti's presence will be valuable.

"I think they will understand the game a lot better as a unit,' Hagen said. "I think getting Rhyti back after missing almost all of last season due to injury will be a big boost as he brings great tackling and speed to our defense.'

Oilers Face Some Challenges

Small in size and small in number is far from ideal conditions for a football team.

Somehow, some way, Midwest is going to try to make it work this season – they don't have much of a choice.

The Oilers only expect two or three seniors to dot their roster of about a dozen players. None of them are buffet busters, either.

"We're a little small, so it's kind of tough to tackle," coach Joe Campbell said. "We don't have any big men. ... I'm hoping some other kids step up."

What the Oilers lack in size, they make up for in athleticism and urgency, particularly from their two senior leaders, Gage Palmer and Quincy Paris.

"Physically, they're a couple more inches taller and a lot stronger than last year, for sure," Campbell said. "I think the mental side is coming to them, finally, about being a leader.'

Paris is the team's top returning rusher and receiver. Paris led Midwest's receivers last year with 26 catches for

413 yards and six touchdowns. Meanwhile, he was second on the team in rushing yards with 366 last year, carrying 47 times for seven touchdowns.

Palmer, Midwest's only allconference pick last season, split time at quarterback but also filled in all over the offensive spectrum. Palmer completed 30 passes for 408 yards and four touchdowns; he also ran 55 times for 269 yards and five touchdowns; he also had 11 catches for 137 yards and two touchdowns.

This season, Campbell said Palmer will take over at quarterback full-time in part thanks to his accuracy with his passes. Paris, the school recordholder in the high jump, also has the ability to high-point passes as a receiver.

The two also lead what the Oilers want to do on defense.

Palmer led Midwest's defense with 74 total tackles, including 44 solo and eight for loss. He also led Midwest with four interceptions and three blocked

kicks.

Paris was second with 45 total tackles and led the Oilers with eight pass break-ups.

In all, the defense returns its top three tacklers and five of its top six from 2023. Sophomore Noah Dickerson

was third with 30 tackles, senior Draco Del Rio had 19 and junior Travis Mosteller had 18.

Campbell said the returning experience on that side of the ball brings him comfort, particularly what he saw from its youngest member last year.

"Noah came in as a freshman and had to play a lot of minutes,² he said. "He took a lot of bumps."

Meanwhile, the seniors still set the pace for how the rest of the season will go. In their last season, Campbell said he's seen good things happening.

"We're way more urgent, honestly," he said.

As Riverside prepares for a new type of football this season, coach Jason Mitchell knows he can depend on something that works no matter what level of the

The Rebels make the move from Class 1A nine-man to Class 1A six-man this year after a 4-5 season and a loss in the quarterfinals.

"They haven't done (six-man) before, but I think you'd rather be making this transition with seniors," Mitchell said.

Senior Curtis Strohschein was a Class 1A nine-man all-state choice, and seniors Avery Clifford and Reece Whisenant were allconference picks last year. Still, the Rebels will be in a transitional phase, at least to start

the season. "We've already figured out that we're going to struggle with just a lack of experience with a new set of rules," Mitchell said. "... It goes against all of the instincts you grew up learning. Your quarterback wants to take off and he can't. Most of the time you're pitching or handing the ball off

before the play's even started." Whisenant is Riverside's top returning rusher, running 49 times for 245 yards and a pair of touchdowns last year. He's the only one of the Rebels' top three rushers to return.

Clifford saw some time at quarterback, completing 16 passes for 245 yards and a touchdown, and will likely fulfill that role this season, Mitchell said.

Senior Ryder Kozisek is the top

returning receiver after finishing third on the team in receiving yards (130) and fourth in catches (seven). Whisenant added eight catches for 59 yards.

The defense lost two of its top three tacklers but retains at least five of its top eight from 2023.

Whisenant had a big season with 59 tackles, including eight for loss, and two fumble recoveries.

Strohschein had 54 tackles, with 5.5 of those coming for a loss, while Kozisek had 53 tackles and led the Rebels with three fumble recoveries.

Senior Wyatt Daly-Patterson had 40 tackles, led the team with seven pass deflections and tied for the team lead with three interceptions. Senior Hyson Hill also had 40 tackles.

Mitchell said the coaching staff's offseason goal was to put the Rebels in position to adapt to six-man from day one, and that includes some of the basics other six-man teams may take for granted.

"We don't have our playbook. We don't have our terminology," he said. "So we're starting from ground zero than whatever baseline we might have built up."

Pioneers Looking to Make Gains

TEN SLEEP PIONEERS

After several years of frustration, Ten Sleep football may finally be back.

Although the Pioneers still have much to learn and many challenges to overcome, first-year coach Corey Rice, a 2018 graduate of Ten Sleep, said the energy and excitement for the Pioneers' resurgence is noticeable.

The challenge this year's team faces is that the full turnaround might yet be another year, as Ten Sleep enters the 2024 season with the prospect of having zero seniors on the roster.

However, Rice said, the junior class has solid experience and the freshmen coming up were on a team that finished 5-1 last season.

The Pioneers' last victory came on Sept. 19, 2020, a 57-32 victory against now-defunct NSI Academy.

Rice said one thing he wanted to develop in his players was game sense.

"We've got enough athleticism," he said. "We just need to learn the game. ... High school (football) becomes not just playing. It really becomes a game of breaking things down.

"... I've played the six-man game, all through middle school and high school. I had four different coaches throughout my high school career, and I think having all of those perspectives helped me.'

This year's team will be led by its juniors, by default. That group includes defensive end and passcatcher Payton Norman, lineman Eric Harstad and running back/ linebacker Jesse Blazo.

Sophomore Wyatt Turgeon will also be in the middle of things as the Pioneers' quarterback and middle linebacker.

The Pioneers did not compile individual statistics last season.

Rice said he expected a roster of eight to 10 total players this season. After that, the next two classes now eighth and seventh grades at Ten Sleep's middle school – are big enough to keep the positive momentum going.

Rice, who has spent several years working with Ten Sleep's middle school program, said this year's group contains players he had in his first year of coaching.

"I think it's kind of cool to see that full circle," he said. "The parents are great, the community's tight-knit, (and) everyone's there for each other.

Moreover, the Pioneers are starting clean. Last year, it was new jerseys; in 2025, the Pioneers will have a new football field in close proximity to their new school.

"The excitement's through the roof," Rice said.

One of the hardest things for any new football program to establish is tradition.

It's even harder to do that with small senior classes.

As Casper Christian enters year three of football, and year two of its varsity program, the Mountaineers will finally have an opportunity to build that tradition from player to player as opposed to being driven by coaches alone.

After graduating just two seniors from last year's 4-4 team, coach Ryan Harrison said he's excited to see this year's senior class, which won't be huge but will be bigger than last year's, take on leadership roles that will help develop young players faster.

"The development of the younger guys will be spurred on a bit by those older guys getting that experience they can pour into them," Harrison said.

For the fourth consecutive year, Encampment was a threat to win the Class 1A six-man championship.

Although the Tigers came up short – losing to eventual state champion Burlington 80-73 in the semifinals – coach Kegan Willford said he sees the program continuing to build in the right direction.

In big part, Willford said, the success Encampment has built in such a short time is due to the ownership the players feel for the program. The Tigers came back in 2019 after nearly three decades without a team.



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Rattlers Reload for Another Title Run

What was supposed to be Snake River's crowning moment became its missed opportunity.

And its inspiration.

A 42-39 loss to Burlington one in which the Rattlers' fourth-and-goal play from the 1-yard line was stopped by the Huskies with less than two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter – ended both a multi-year winning streak at 30 games and a championship streak at two.

'It's ate at them since then, and coaches, too," Snake River coach Jack Cobb said. "It was a tough way to end a three-year streak that we had, knowing that it was

right there in our grasp. "... The boys, they've felt it since then, and I'm hoping they're keeping their focus and that hunger to get to that title game and to finish it.

Still, no team in six-man can claim what Snake River has done recently, reaching four of the past five six-man championship games and winning three.

Moreover, the Rattlers get back a pair of all-state picks in seniors Bridger Cozzens and Mason

Jones, as well as all-conference pick Alexander "Jandro" Kunsman, a junior.

Cozzens was second for the Rattlers in rushing, piling up 1,513 yards on 132 carries (good for an 11.5 yards per carry average) and a team-high 31 rushing touchdowns.

Jones completed 52 of 92 passes for 1,109 yards and 23 touchdowns while only throwing two interceptions.

Kunsman was second for Snake River's receiving corps with 14 catches for 270 yards and tied for the team lead with seven receiving touchdowns. Cozzens added six catches for 168 yards and two touchdowns.

Cobb said the Rattlers' depth has grown during the offseason, and they won't have to rely on ironman players.

"It'll be nice to give kids some rest," he said.

The same rings true on defense. Of the nine players who saw consistent defensive playing time last season, six return. Cozzens led the Rattler defense with 125 tackles last

year, including 18 for loss. He also led Snake River with five interceptions.

Senior Hunter Jones added 54 tackles, four interceptions and 14 pass deflections. Junior Ervey Marquez had 47 tackles, with seven for loss, junior Granit Ready added 37 tackles, sophomore Tymber Cozzens had 26 tackles and junior Deke Latham had 25.

Also back for the Rattlers is senior Jaciel Giron, who missed last season.

The Rattlers don't need to look too deep into the season for inspiration. In an odd coincidence, Burlington and Snake River will face each other in the Week 1 opener in Baggs. "I think if you ask both

teams, I think we both think it's important to set the tone," Cobb said. "It's a long way from a championship game, but it's an important one.

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

Ramirez led the Miners in defensive points and was second in total tackles with 87. He tied for the team lead with 10 tackles for loss and led HEM with five fumble recoveries.


Other defensive contributors returning this year include Nelsen
